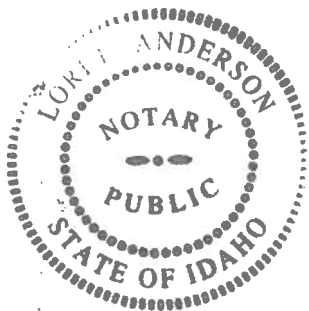



1 MIKE MOYLE,
 2 first duly sworn to tell the truth relating to
 3 said cause, testified as follows:
 4 EXAMINATION
 5 QUESTIONS BY MR. FEREDAY:
 6 Q. Please state your name.
 7 A. Mike Moyle.
 8 Q. And your occupation?
 9 A. Farmer.
 10 Q. What do you farm?
 11 A. What do I farm? I raise crops like
 12 peppermint, spearmint, alfalfa seed, sweet corn,
 13 wheat, things like that.
 14 Q. What's your education, Mr. Moyle?
 15 A. Very little. I graduated from high
 16 school. I've got no further education than high
 17 school. My father got in an accident, and I've
 18 been back farming after that.
 19 Q. Do you have any education in analyzing
 20 demographic trends, or economics, or real estate
 21 market, or subjects like that?
 22 A. Just the road of hard knocks. I have
 23 played that game a little bit.
 24 Q. Which games have you played amongst
 25 those?

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1 A. Land development and things like that.
 2 Q. Anything other than land development
 3 and farming?
 4 A. Farming, you look at trends. You look
 5 at markets. You look at those sort of things.
 6 (Exhibit A marked.)
 7 Q. (BY MR. FEREDAY) I would like to show
 8 you what's been marked as Deposition Exhibit A,
 9 which is a Notice of the Deposition. Do you
 10 recall receiving this?
 11 A. I got an email.
 12 MR. FEREDAY: Could we go off the
 13 record for a moment, please?
 14 (Discussion held off the record.)
 15 MR. FEREDAY: Back on the record,
 16 please.
 17 THE WITNESS: I've got a phone call and
 18 an email.
 19 Q. (BY MR. FEREDAY) From?
 20 A. From one of your assistants, Jeff, or
 21 did you call me? I think it was you. And then I
 22 got the email from your assistant.
 23 MR. FEREDAY: We would like to mark
 24 that as Deposition Exhibit A, if you haven't
 25 already.

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1 Q. (BY MR. FEREDAY) Did you bring any
 2 documents with you today, Mr. Moyle?
 3 A. Just some of the stuff I copied when I
 4 was trying to figure out -- when I was trying to
 5 figure out what you wanted to talk about today,
 6 and just a few of the different things that I
 7 would -- kind of played with, when I was looking
 8 through what was going on with the water right
 9 application up there, and some of those things.
 10 Q. Are these all the documents you have
 11 concerning the M3 Eagle Application No. 63-32573?
 12 A. Yes, I didn't print everything off the
 13 internet. You know, I can get the rest of it.
 14 MR. FEREDAY: Let's go off the record.
 15 (Discussion held off the record.)
 16 MR. FEREDAY: Let's go back on the
 17 record.
 18 (Exhibits 1 through 5 marked.)
 19 Q. (BY MR. FEREDAY) So Mr. Moyle, we've
 20 marked as Exhibits 1 through 5, five documents
 21 that you've brought today; correct?
 22 A. Yes.
 23 Q. We will return those in a minute, once
 24 we've made copies of those.
 25 Did any other protestants, Mr. Smith,

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1 or any of the other protestants, ask you to
 2 prepare any documents or testimony for today?
 3 A. Un-huh, talked to them, but they didn't
 4 tell me how to prepare anything.
 5 Q. What were the substance of those
 6 conversations, and who did you speak to?
 7 A. Oh, there is a few of the neighbors
 8 there. And we just, basically, talked about what
 9 they saw -- the facts, and how they applied to
 10 them, and what had happened during the
 11 procedures. Kind of how they felt left out when
 12 Strickland had asked them to be involved with the
 13 decision, and they weren't. It was stuff like
 14 that. Just broad spectrum stuff.
 15 Q. When you say, met with some of the
 16 neighbors, who was included in that group?
 17 A. I don't remember all the names.
 18 Q. Would it have been John Thornton?
 19 A. He was there.
 20 Q. David Head?
 21 A. I don't remember David Head.
 22 Q. Norman Edwards?
 23 A. Un-huh, I don't know him. I really
 24 don't remember. Mary Taylor was there.
 25 Q. Mary Taylor.

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1 A. Meissner was there.
 2 Q. Charles Meissner?
 3 A. There was a few people.
 4 Q. And Alan Smith was there?
 5 A. Alan was there.
 6 Q. And Jason Smith?
 7 A. Uh-huh.
 8 Q. What was your understanding from those
 9 conversations, as to the purpose of this remand
 10 hearing for which this deposition is being taken?
 11 A. Well, we didn't really talk about that.
 12 That's why I brought three questions, because
 13 after talking to you, I needed to know -- I
 14 needed to know what happened to them, and their
 15 side of the story. And I wanted to know what you
 16 wanted to talk about. And tried to figure out
 17 how it applied to me.
 18 Q. Did any of the protestants that you
 19 spoke to, indicate what this hearing was about?
 20 A. We talked about broad spectrum stuff.
 21 That's why I wanted the three questions when you
 22 and I talked on the phone, because I believe from
 23 what you told me, that's what this hearing is
 24 about. It's not about some of the other things.
 25 I don't think you want brought up, some of the

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1 other things. So I assume it's from those three
 2 questions, from what you told me.
 3 Q. You are not a protestant in this case;
 4 correct?
 5 A. Correct. I wish I was.
 6 Q. Why do you say that?
 7 A. Because your study shows that the
 8 impact of my wells are going to be greater than I
 9 thought they were. So now, I'm kind of
 10 concerned.
 11 Q. What do you understand about the M3
 12 Eagle City application?
 13 A. In what regards?
 14 Q. With regard to how much water it seeks,
 15 what the purpose of it is, so forth.
 16 A. I understand it's for development up
 17 there. I understand that they came in wanting, I
 18 believe, it was 23 cfs or 22. I understand that
 19 the director recommended less two or three,
 20 something like that. I understand it went to
 21 district court. I understand that a judge said,
 22 that you were to work with the protestants. I
 23 understand that Homan and Baxter, from what I
 24 get, didn't.
 25 Q. Didn't work with the protestors?

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1 A. Didn't work with the protestors. And I
 2 understand that then you got another order, a
 3 final order. I don't know how many final orders
 4 he goes before he stops, and that's where we are
 5 today.
 6 Q. Have you ever read the M3 Eagle
 7 application?
 8 A. Not all of it.
 9 Q. Are you a member of the North Ada
 10 County Foothills Alliance?
 11 A. No.
 12 Q. How about the North Ada County Ground
 13 Water Users Association?
 14 A. No, un-huh.
 15 Q. Are you familiar with either of those
 16 organizations?
 17 A. Familiar, in that, in the legislature
 18 I've got letters from them concerning about
 19 what's going on up there. I do get letters from
 20 some members of them sometimes of those
 21 organizations, because they say they are who they
 22 are. They are not happy with me, by the way.
 23 Q. They are not happy with you; those
 24 organizations?
 25 A. No, they think I could do some stuff

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1 legislatively, to fix some of the problems that
 2 are going on up there. Part of the reasons,
 3 though, you have seen what's going on, is to send
 4 money up for the study to see what's going on.
 5 Q. Has anyone from any of those
 6 organizations, or any of the protestant groups,
 7 ever approached you with regards to legislation
 8 pertaining to the M3 Eagle application?
 9 A. Not with legislation. But they wanted
 10 to know we hadn't something legislatively, since
 11 they think what has happened, has happened.
 12 Q. And what is it that they describe, that
 13 they think will happen?
 14 A. Wells going dry, water tables going
 15 down. Some of that stuff came up, too, when we
 16 had the Treasure Valley Committee on -- you know,
 17 aquifer committee.
 18 Q. And what was the relevance of those
 19 discussions with regard to this application?
 20 A. Well, for example, Christian Petrich
 21 was talking about how there was declining water
 22 tables in North Ada County, and I believe -- I
 23 have to go back and look at the notes -- and also
 24 by Lake Lowell. He was concerned with what was
 25 happening with the limited resources along North

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1 Ada County; hence, the reason the State is
 2 spending money monitoring wells, and trying to
 3 make sure what's going on up there.
 4 Q. I would like to show you what's -- I'd
 5 like to have marked as Deposition Exhibit B,
 6 which is Applicant's Exhibit B.
 7 (Exhibit B marked.)
 8 Q. (BY MR. FEREDAY) Have you seen this?
 9 A. I'll look at it. I don't know.
 10 Q. I'll represent to you, that it's a copy
 11 of the protestants revised witness list, dated
 12 October 4th of this year.
 13 A. I haven't seen it, but I've heard about
 14 it. They asked me if they could use me as a
 15 witness, and I said they could.
 16 Q. And that was, again, Mr. Smith asked
 17 you that?
 18 A. Uh-huh, Mr. Smith.
 19 Q. And what did he ask you to testify
 20 about?
 21 A. We really didn't talk about much on
 22 what I had to testify about. I could tell him,
 23 though, that we had damage from when the Legacy
 24 project went in. And I would talk about what
 25 happened in that process, if they would allow me.

1 artesian pressure. That it is important. It is
 2 a 1930s water right. And the artesian pressure
 3 is because there is no power. There is no pump.
 4 They are out in the middle of nowhere. They have
 5 been there since the '30s. They didn't need the
 6 power pump, because they have artesian pressure.
 7 And if it goes down 12 foot, it would probably
 8 eliminate it.
 9 Q. Those wells are flowing today; correct?
 10 A. They are today.
 11 Q. So is it your contention, Mr. Moyle,
 12 that your testimony in this case will involve
 13 water supply issues, or issues of hydrogeology,
 14 or injury to your wells?
 15 A. I would like to talk about that,
 16 including some other things.
 17 Q. What other things would you talk about,
 18 other than those?
 19 A. Well, I think the annexation process,
 20 and what happened in that regard is kind of a
 21 joke. I think as you look at Eagle service area,
 22 it's a land grab. They can't service that area
 23 with what they have today, and no intention to.
 24 It makes no sense to be at annex at
 25 10,000, for example, a 10,000 head feedlot was

1 Q. Now, that damage that you refer to is
 2 damage to, what; your right?
 3 A. We lost well pressure in a water right
 4 that we have.
 5 Q. How much pressure did you lose?
 6 A. You guys did the studies. Ed Squires
 7 monitored the wells. And they kind of came back
 8 up when they quit pumping in the Legacy. We will
 9 know more when you see in the subdivision and
 10 they start pumping again. They haven't pumped,
 11 this last year.
 12 Q. So you can't tell me how much pressure
 13 you lost?
 14 A. You could probably tell me, because
 15 your guys did the study. Ed Squires did it as
 16 part of the M3 project. When I asked him for it,
 17 he said he would get it to me, and hasn't.
 18 Q. And hasn't?
 19 A. Un-huh. M3 monitored our well, one of
 20 our wells, on part of the study of what its
 21 effects would be if your water right was granted.
 22 And I believe if you read your study, you will
 23 find that it says, that the effects to our wells
 24 would be pretty good. I think he's talking about
 25 12 foot where we are at, which would take the

1 to, solely, to get to where they could annex M3.
 2 Solely, to get annexation, to get on contiguous
 3 M3. It makes no sense to annex federal ground.
 4 I'm not saying it's illegal. I'm saying, it
 5 doesn't make sense.
 6 Q. Are you saying that the City of Eagle
 7 should reverse its annexation; is that your
 8 contention?
 9 A. I'm saying, if Eagle can't provide
 10 services, which they can't do now, they shouldn't
 11 be annexing and creating this service area when
 12 they don't have the mechanism to service it.
 13 Q. Are you familiar with the arrangements
 14 between the City of Eagle and the developer of
 15 the M3 planned community with regard to service
 16 of utilities in that area?
 17 A. If you are saying, am I familiar with
 18 the fact that if they get the water right, they
 19 give it to the City? Is that what you are
 20 getting at, Jeff?
 21 Q. No. I'm just asking you, what
 22 familiarity do you have with the arrangements
 23 between the City of Eagle and the developer?
 24 A. Very little. I know there is no sewer
 25 lines up there. There is no water lines up

1 there.
2 Q. Okay.
3 A. There is no roads up there.
4 Q. Let's go to your exhibits at this time.
5 I would like you to describe those for me. I
6 think we have copies back of them.
7 A. Can I have mine back?
8 Q. I believe that is yours.
9 A. Yes.
10 MR. FEREDAY: Let's go off the record
11 for a second.
12 (Discussion held off the record.)
13 MR. FEREDAY: Okay. Let's go back on
14 the record.
15 Q. (BY MR. FEREDAY) Mr. Moyle, with
16 regard to Deposition Exhibit No. 1, that you
17 provided. I see it's page 2, of something called
18 an "Order Limiting Presentation of Evidence at
19 Supplemental Hearing," and this includes three
20 numbered sentences.
21 Is it your understanding that this is
22 what the evidence for this upcoming remand
23 hearing will be limited to; do you understand
24 that?
25 A. From what you told me, Jeff, this is

1 area. Sometimes reality is better than having an
2 educated person that can show you numbers.
3 Q. So you are in agreement then, I take
4 it, that you will not be testifying, or
5 attempting to testify on issues having to do with
6 any question, other than those encompassed by
7 these three?
8 A. Say that again.
9 Q. Are you in agreement that your
10 testimony will be restricted to these three
11 areas?
12 MR. ALAN SMITH: We don't know that
13 yet, Counsel. It's very unclear as to what Mr.
14 Spackman is going to allow, and what he isn't.
15 And I don't think asking the witness to speculate
16 about it helps a bit.
17 Q. (BY MR. FEREDAY) I'm asking the
18 witness what he understands.
19 A. It's my understanding, that as I look
20 at those three questions, that they are broad
21 enough where they ought to go in regards to
22 current damage from existing water rights and
23 future damages.
24 Q. Excuse me, when you say --
25 A. I think that's why, when he talks about

1 what it's limited to. But I think that those
2 questions are broad enough, they can go other
3 places with them.
4 Q. What other places would you contend
5 that you can go on any of these?
6 A. Well, when you talk about planning
7 horizon and reasonable anticipated future
8 municipal needs. I think if you look at the
9 growth factor right now, Eagle doesn't need what
10 you are claiming they need. I think you can talk
11 about some of these other issues in regards to
12 what has taken place, what they have versus, what
13 is going to happen if they get what they want.
14 Q. You aren't contending, are you, that
15 you are an expert able to give opinions with
16 projected growth; are you?
17 A. Not at all. But I live out there. And
18 I know what is going on out there, and I can
19 testify what's happening. I can go show you
20 what's happening, and go show you the service
21 area with a big feedlot in the middle of it.
22 That makes no sense. There is no roads. There
23 is no sewer. There is no services. It makes no
24 sense. And I know what houses are going for, and
25 I know how many are empty, sitting in the same

1 future needs, anticipated needs, service area,
2 things like that. So I think there are other
3 things that can be discussed, depending on what
4 the director decides to allow.
5 Q. When you say "damage," do you mean
6 injury to one's ability to pump water or
7 drawdowns in the aquifer is similar?
8 A. I'm talking about injuries to a water
9 right that exists.
10 Q. And those are injuries which you
11 believe you have evidence of?
12 A. I think you have evidence of them. I
13 think your guy, Ed Squires, monitored my wells,
14 and can tell you what those are, if you talk to
15 him.
16 Q. But you don't have any of that evidence
17 here today; do you?
18 A. Not with me, no.
19 Q. You have not seen it; have you?
20 A. Un-huh.
21 Q. Okay. Now, let's go to Exhibit 2.
22 A. Your own stuff, though, shows that the
23 damages will be pretty big.
24 Q. Let's go to Exhibit 2, please.
25 A. All right. 2. We're off to 2.

1 Q. 2 is pages 1, 5, 19, and 26 of a
2 January 25, 2010 amended final order signed by
3 Gary Spackman; correct?

4 A. Yes, correct.

5 Q. Why did you bring this today?

6 A. Well, as I've gone through, and kind of
7 highlighting, trying to figure out what's going
8 on with this stuff, and I have a long way to go,
9 Jeff, and I apologize for that. Some of the
10 comments that were made by the director,
11 particularly, on page 5: "M3 Eagle encourages
12 the interim director to subscribe to the
13 following maxim: Believe the results of a
14 scientific study even though the data and input
15 are unreliable. This suggestion is untenable."

16 It tells me right there, that he has a
17 concern about what your model, and what you are
18 trying to say is going to happen if the water
19 right is granted.

20 Q. And this is an issue having to do with
21 hydrogeology; correct?

22 A. Correct, it is, I think.

23 Q. What else is relevant in this, in your
24 view, Mr. Moyle?

25 A. What's relevant about it, it tells me

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1 that the department and the director, himself,
2 have concerns about the water right, and whether
3 or not the water right is available there. And
4 it sounds to me like he has questions about the
5 model he made.

6 Q. And why, again, is that relevant in
7 this remand hearing?

8 A. That's relevant, because if you are
9 talking about future needs, the City of
10 Eagle -- wherever that paper I had -- if you are
11 talking about these questions, if the water is
12 not there, that addresses what these things
13 (indicating) can say or do.

14 Q. Referring to Exhibit 1?

15 A. Referring to Exhibit 1, and the
16 questions that will be before the Hearing
17 Officer.

18 Q. What else about the amended final
19 order, Mr. Moyle, that you find important for
20 this hearing?

21 A. He lowers the water right, gives it
22 back -- and I have to apologize, Jeff, I haven't
23 gone through it enough, and studied it enough.
24 So that's the only ones I brought that stuck in
25 my mind. And I'll do a better job about that if

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1 I'm allowed to testify.

2 Q. How about Exhibit 3? Exhibit 3 is
3 something entitled "Re-Analysis of 16 Aquifer
4 Tests in the Greater Eagle-Star Area of North Ada
5 County, Idaho," dated July 4, 2008. And I note
6 that you've included the cover page -- cover
7 pages and page 241.

8 A. Uh-huh.

9 Q. Do you agree that this concerns
10 hydrogeology and ground water pumping issues?

11 A. I agree that it concerns with your
12 perceptions of what will happen, and it is your
13 study. And, yes, it does deal with water
14 hydrogeology, whatever the word is.

15 Q. And I note that on page 241, you've
16 highlighted paragraph 20?

17 A. Correct.

18 Q. That also has to do with effects of
19 pumping; correct?

20 A. Correct. No. 20 says, "Development of
21 additional wells and full development of existing
22 municipal water rights will cause artesian
23 pressures to decline over time throughout the
24 Star-Eagle area. This decline of artesian
25 pressures may cause some wells that flow at

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1 ground surface (or above) to cease doing so.
2 Wells currently relying on artesian flowing
3 conditions to provide water supplies may require
4 pumps to produce water for use in the future."

5 That concerns me, because of our other
6 existing water rights, and what would happen if
7 those artesian flows go away.

8 Q. Is it your position that any reduction
9 in artesian flows, or ground water levels, are
10 actionable injury under Idaho law; is that your
11 contention?

12 A. I think if you are pre-1951, yeah. If
13 your water right is pre-1951, yes.

14 Q. That's your view?

15 A. That's my view.

16 Q. Okay. Let's go to Exhibit 4. Please
17 describe what Exhibit 4 is, Mr. Moyle, and why
18 you brought it to us today?

19 A. Well, as I was playing around and
20 trying to come up with what was going on in the
21 Treasure Valley, this is the study that was done
22 in 1996 and 2000 by the Department. And one of
23 the things that I've actually experienced, even
24 though I'm not a hydrologist in the Eagle area,
25 with wells that are not super deep, I found, for

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1 example, just below your proposed project. If I
 2 put in potatoes and sprinkle the ground, the
 3 wells in the 40-acre subdivision to the south, go
 4 dry. In fact, Gary loves me, because he has to
 5 drop down and go deeper to get to water.
 6 And if I plant a crop like corn or mint
 7 where I irrigate flood irrigation and recharge,
 8 that their wells work just fine. It's when I
 9 don't recharge, when I sprinkle, that their wells
 10 decline.
 11 And in this document, the one that kind
 12 of stuck out with me, it talks about how in areas
 13 where there is recharge in agricultural use, that
 14 they don't have the problem, basically, with loss
 15 in ground water versus the area where there is no
 16 agricultural recharge.
 17 The area you are proposing for your
 18 subdivision has some agricultural use, and you
 19 have ground water rights, surface water rights,
 20 and you do irrigate some up there. And that
 21 water right comes out of the Farmers Union ditch.
 22 One of the things I've also thought that
 23 municipalities ought to be looking at a surface
 24 water, instead of ground water for the need.
 25 Especially, for the M3 project, where there is no

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1 recharge. There is no agricultural use going on
 2 up there in regard to flood irrigation
 3 re-charging.
 4 Q. Mr. Moyle, do you agree that Exhibit 4
 5 pertains to hydrogeology, and the effects of
 6 ground water pumping, and similar issues?
 7 A. In North Ada County, yes.
 8 Q. Exhibit No. 5 is a copy, apparently,
 9 from the internet --
 10 A. Oh, yeah. I did that this morning.
 11 Q. -- of Idaho Code Title 42 Section 203A.
 12 And what was the purpose of bringing this to us
 13 today?
 14 A. I didn't really know you were going to
 15 get what was in my book. I was just reading
 16 through the statutes today looking at different
 17 options that the director had, the protestants
 18 had, and some of the things that the director had
 19 to look at. And that's why I copied it down.
 20 Q. And do you contend that this is
 21 relevant to the remand hearing in this case?
 22 A. Well, I think it can be. It talks
 23 about being able to, financially, being able to
 24 finish the project. It talks about what the
 25 director has to look at. And I think as you look

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1 at the Eagle service area and what we're trying
 2 to accomplish, that this could be applied to it.
 3 But I haven't studied it enough, Jeff,
 4 to fill you in with all the details. I just
 5 printed it off this morning. So I really just
 6 played around my computer, because I didn't want
 7 to come in here halfcocked. I didn't know you
 8 were going to ask for it.
 9 Q. So just to wrap this up. You've
 10 brought five documents with you today, which
 11 we've marked as Exhibits 1 through 5. Can you
 12 tell us how these documents pertain to the
 13 subject matter of this hearing?
 14 A. I think the director on the first one
 15 has concerns; hence, the reason he said what he
 16 said, about what's going on there.
 17 Q. You mean the pumping?
 18 A. The pumping, and what the proposed
 19 effects could have. And the fact that he doesn't
 20 think your model is -- he has a concern about the
 21 model used to apply for the water right.
 22 MR. LAWRENCE: To be clear, you were
 23 just indicating Exhibit 2.
 24 THE WITNESS: Sorry. I'm just going
 25 through, whatever.

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1 And in Exhibit 1, you are talking about
 2 what you wanted to ask me here. And I think
 3 those questions are broad enough to allow me to
 4 go to other areas, if I'm allowed to testify.
 5 Exhibit 2, the director talks about
 6 some of his concerns with your water model, and
 7 whether or not the water is really available
 8 there for the purposes sought.
 9 Exhibit 3 is your own study. And I
 10 think it proves that I should have some real
 11 concerns with my water right, even though I'm
 12 down the road a little ways.
 13 Exhibit 4 talks about how even IDWR has
 14 concerns with the recharge, and with what's going
 15 on in North Ada County.
 16 And Exhibit 5 is statutes that, I
 17 think, that maybe give the Department leeway to
 18 adjust what they are trying to do in regards to
 19 the water right, but I haven't studied it enough
 20 to tell you how it affects it, Jeff.
 21 (Exhibit C marked.)
 22 Q. (BY MR. FEREDAY) Okay. I would like
 23 to show you our Exhibit C, please. And I
 24 apologize if this is going over areas -- some
 25 areas that we've already have gone through, but I

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1 just want to make sure you are clear on this, Mr.
 2 Moyle.
 3 Deposition Exhibit C, it's an August
 4 2nd, 2011 notice of hearing and pre-hearing order
 5 pertaining to this remand case for the City M3
 6 water right application. And near the bottom of
 7 page 2 of that exhibit, I think you will note
 8 that near the top of page 2 -- I'm sorry -- that
 9 these three items that we discussed before are
 10 listed there. Do you see those?
 11 A. Uh-huh, the three are right below it,
 12 under scheduling order.
 13 Q. Right. Do you recognize that as --
 14 A. Exhibit 1.
 15 Q. The same as Exhibit 1?
 16 A. It looks like it to me. It's pretty
 17 close.
 18 Q. That was --
 19 A. Those questions were the same, correct.
 20 Q. Actually, earlier than Exhibit 1; is it
 21 not? This is dated August 2nd.
 22 A. August 2nd, correct.
 23 (Exhibit D marked.)
 24 Q. (BY MR. FEREDAY) I'm showing you
 25 Deposition Exhibit D now, Mr. Moyle. And this
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1 I'll represent to you, is the September 8th
 2 pre-hearing order, 2011, limiting discovery to
 3 certain items. And on page 2, I would like to
 4 direct your attention to the language that states
 5 that, quote, "Parties shall not conduct discovery
 6 or offer evidence at the hearing concerning other
 7 matters, such as technical water supply issues,
 8 hydrogeology, and potential injury from pumping."
 9 A. And where is that at?
 10 MR. ALAN SMITH: Way at the bottom, the
 11 last sentence.
 12 THE WITNESS: Okay. Got it.
 13 Q. (BY MR. FEREDAY) Do you see that,
 14 Mr. Moyle?
 15 A. I see it.
 16 Q. And do you see that as consistent with
 17 your own Exhibit 1?
 18 A. In regards to those are the three
 19 questions?
 20 Q. Yes.
 21 A. I see the three questions, and I think
 22 that those questions are broad enough to bring in
 23 other stuff.
 24 Q. Did Mr. Smith, or any other of the
 25 protestants indicate to you anything about these
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1 pre-hearing orders or the restricted scope of
 2 this hearing?
 3 A. He said they were restricted, and
 4 that's why I got the three questions. And so did
 5 you. You told me it was about those three
 6 questions. So I think those three questions were
 7 broad.
 8 Q. Did he tell you those three questions
 9 were broad; Mr. Smith, or someone else among the
 10 protestants?
 11 A. No, I told myself when I read them.
 12 Q. But Mr. Smith did represent to you,
 13 that this was a restricted hearing; correct?
 14 A. Yeah, he told me that it was
 15 restricted.
 16 Q. So, Mr. Moyle, this sentence that we
 17 just read, the parties shall not conduct
 18 discovery or offer evidence at the hearing
 19 concerning matters such as technical water supply
 20 issues, hydrogeology, and potential injury from
 21 pumping, how does that allow you to offer
 22 testimony at the hearing, in your view, on those
 23 subjects?
 24 MR. ALAN SMITH: We would object to
 25 that as asking for a conclusion of the witness on
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1 a point of law.
 2 Q. (BY MR. FEREDAY) That's fine. You can
 3 go ahead and answer.
 4 A. I don't think it does. I think if
 5 you --
 6 Q. You don't think it --
 7 A. I think if your evidence is part of
 8 what he is granting a water right for, and we are
 9 having a hearing on the water right, talking
 10 about Eagle's future needs, and everything else,
 11 that your evidence ought to be able to be used in
 12 that hearing to talk about why there is no water
 13 there for the purpose you sought, or the purpose
 14 of Eagle City is seeking in regards to future
 15 needs.
 16 Q. So I take it your contention,
 17 Mr. Moyle, is that this restricts you not one
 18 iota with regard to raising issues of injury; is
 19 that your position?
 20 A. Personal injury, or injury as a whole?
 21 Q. Injury to your water right or any other
 22 water rights.
 23 A. I think that the questions are broad
 24 enough, that the case could be made, that the
 25 effects of that water right on North Ada County
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1 as a whole, need to be discussed. And I think
 2 the reason he asked the questions he did, offers
 3 the opportunity to use the stuff that was
 4 discussed before, in granting the water right to
 5 be brought up at.
 6 Q. So your answer to my question would be,
 7 yes, that this language does not, in fact,
 8 restrict your testimony at the hearing; is that
 9 correct?
 10 A. I love the way you answer my question
 11 for me. My answer is, yes, I think the stuff
 12 could be brought up that was brought up before,
 13 including the stuff you used to apply for the
 14 water right.
 15 Q. Okay. Are you familiar with the
 16 district court's order remanding this matter to
 17 the Department of Water Resources?
 18 A. Familiar, only enough to know that the
 19 protestants weren't happy, and weren't involved,
 20 and that's just what I got at our little meeting.
 21 I haven't had the opportunity to talk to Homan
 22 and Baxter to see what happened there, and what
 23 their perceptions of what happened there.
 24 Q. Do you intend to talk to Homan and
 25 Baxter about this?

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1 A. If I'm allowed to testify, I think I
 2 will.
 3 Q. You were not a party to that matter;
 4 were you?
 5 A. Correct, I was not.
 6 Q. So you haven't read the order and --
 7 A. I have not read the order.
 8 Q. Okay. Do you understand that it, too,
 9 limits the scope of this hearing?
 10 A. I did not, because I haven't read it.
 11 (Exhibit E marked.)
 12 Q. (BY MR. FEREDAY) Okay. Let's go to
 13 Exhibit E, just to tie this up. Perhaps to be
 14 redundant, Mr. Moyle, but I just want to make
 15 sure you see this, as well.
 16 This is an order limiting presentation
 17 of evidence at supplemental hearing signed
 18 earlier this month, October 3rd, by Gary
 19 Spackman. And I believe this is the same as
 20 your --
 21 A. This is where I got mine.
 22 Q. This is the same as your Exhibit 1;
 23 correct?
 24 A. Correct. This is where page 2 is the
 25 same as my Exhibit 1.

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1 Q. Correct. And do you see this, again,
 2 raising that same point that we've been
 3 belaboring here?
 4 A. I think those three questions that the
 5 interim director Spackman signed off on, opened
 6 up the opportunity to talk about Eagle's future
 7 needs, and annexation, and water permit. And I
 8 think when you open the door to talk about those
 9 things, you talk about all the other stuff, too,
 10 that you use to try to get the water right.
 11 Q. Including hydrogeology, and alleged
 12 injury, and so forth?
 13 A. Your words, not mine.
 14 Q. Do you agree with that, or do you
 15 disagree with that?
 16 A. I think it does. I think it opens up
 17 everything.
 18 Q. Okay.
 19 A. I can't see, especially, reading the
 20 statute and everything else, how the director
 21 can't take all that into effect when he's looking
 22 at this.
 23 Q. What is your knowledge of the City of
 24 Eagle's annexation of the M3 project lands? You
 25 mentioned it earlier. But I would just like to

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1 make sure we understand about, what you know
 2 about it.
 3 A. I know that they were up there begging
 4 neighbors to let them at it, so they could get to
 5 M3. I know they went to everybody they could try
 6 to get contiguous.
 7 Q. When you said, who --
 8 A. The City of Eagle and M3, they were
 9 both involved in that. I know that they annexed
 10 the feedlot to get around some of the other laws.
 11 Q. Who?
 12 A. The City of Eagle. Hormachea, is the
 13 owner of the feedlot, by the way. And I think
 14 that he was under the assumption, I could be
 15 wrong, but you would have to ask him, but I think
 16 he was under the assumption, that he was going to
 17 get sewer, and water, and other city services,
 18 which I don't see happening. Hence, I think
 19 that's the reason why he put the feedlot back
 20 into production.
 21 I think that you saw what happened when
 22 they couldn't get around one way, they went to
 23 another neighbor, and they bought a little strip,
 24 and annexed federal ground. And I don't think
 25 that was ever the intent of annexation laws;

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1 annexing federal property, or cutting deals with
 2 landowners on a small strip that borders a small
 3 strip. But I don't know.
 4 Q. You agree that the annexation is
 5 complete, though; don't you?
 6 A. I agree that they annexed it, and it
 7 doesn't mean that it was right. And it doesn't
 8 mean that it's going to stand. I don't know that
 9 anybody thought it. I don't know. I didn't look
 10 at that enough, until I saw the question. It
 11 kind of intrigued me that he would put that
 12 question in there, actually.
 13 Q. Do you intend to challenge the
 14 annexation in any way?
 15 A. I have to do more research on whether I
 16 can or can't. I don't know. I don't know if
 17 it's challengeable. Is that a word,
 18 challengeable? I still don't think it makes
 19 sense. They can't service it. They don't -- it
 20 doesn't make sense.
 21 Q. Are you familiar with the City's
 22 population growth trends? Have you studied that,
 23 Mr. Moyle?
 24 A. I haven't studied it. I had the mayor
 25 talk to me about it, a little bit it. He was

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1 pretty excited, because it looked like they may
 2 sell a few houses.
 3 Q. This was Mayor Reynolds?
 4 A. Uh-huh.
 5 Q. When was that?
 6 A. We have bimonthly meetings with the
 7 mayor and local businesses, and it was brought up
 8 there.
 9 Q. Do you think that the actions of the
 10 mayor and the city council has been unwise with
 11 regard to the M3 project?
 12 A. If you are asking, would I have done
 13 what they did? I would not have done what they
 14 did. It doesn't make any sense to me to annex
 15 and swap the ag ground. It doesn't make any
 16 sense to me to annex federal ground to try to get
 17 contiguous to a project. It doesn't make sense.
 18 I don't think that was the intentions
 19 of the law when the annexation laws were put in.
 20 That's just me. That's just speculation. And I
 21 don't know that the current council would do
 22 with -- what the old council did in regards to
 23 that annexation. I don't know.
 24 Q. Are you familiar with the per capita
 25 water use in the city of Eagle?

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1 A. Un-huh.
 2 Q. Is that a no?
 3 A. That's a no.
 4 Q. How about the City of Eagle's existing
 5 water right portfolio? Do you know what's in
 6 that portfolio?
 7 A. I don't know what all is in that
 8 portfolio. I know some of the things they tried
 9 to do with the LID to purchase out the private
 10 provider in Eagle. I know they have gotten the
 11 United Water for part of it. They have the City
 12 of Eagle for part of it. And they have got a
 13 private company.
 14 Q. Okay.
 15 A. I think there is three of them, plus I
 16 think subdivisions have their own. Because I
 17 know that for a fact, because some of them had
 18 their water hooked up backwards, and were
 19 drinking dirt water for a while, which I thought
 20 was funny.
 21 Q. Could you elaborate on that? Who did
 22 you say was drinking dirt water?
 23 A. Well, they had -- I shouldn't have
 24 brought it up. But they had one of the farms I
 25 used to farm, when they put the subdivision in,

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1 they hooked the waterlines backwards. So they
 2 were drinking the water out of the pump in the
 3 ditch. A couple people got sick. It was no big
 4 deal.
 5 Q. Which subdivision was this?
 6 A. I can go show you. I don't remember
 7 the name. I could get it.
 8 Q. It was in the city of Eagle?
 9 A. Yes.
 10 Q. So, Mr. Moyle, what do you expect your
 11 testimony to be if you are allowed to testify at
 12 the hearing, in this matter, next week?
 13 A. I need to do a little more research on
 14 annexation. I would like to talk about, as we go
 15 down the road, and annexation being worked from
 16 the center off, and widening. That as we go to
 17 get the services, and annexing the ground to get
 18 this hopscotch. I think the hopscotch
 19 annexations is a problem.
 20 As we talk about Eagle's future needs,
 21 I think we need to -- I know you want to talk
 22 about growth. But I would like to talk about the
 23 water rights that they have now, but I have to do
 24 research on that to figure out what I would like
 25 to say there, In regards to whether or not they

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1 have enough to maintain what we have now, let
 2 alone, do they need the new water right? Is
 3 there water available in the city to continue?
 4 And I would kind of like to have a look
 5 at what they are trying to accomplish here, in
 6 regards to their -- you know, I need to know what
 7 Eagle's water is now available, and what they are
 8 trying to accomplish in terms of growth. It
 9 makes no sense to hopscotch up, and go nowhere.
 10 This whole thing confuses me. But I've got to do
 11 some research, and find out some questions.
 12 Q. Have you ever dealt with a planned
 13 community project before?
 14 A. Have not.
 15 Q. Do you recognize that a planned
 16 community, typically, takes place on land that's
 17 previously undeveloped?
 18 A. I didn't recognize that. I think it
 19 could happen on developed or undeveloped ground.
 20 I don't think that that matters. A planned
 21 community could do it on either/or; couldn't
 22 they?
 23 Q. I'm just asking what you know about
 24 planned communities?
 25 A. I don't know enough about -- I don't

1 know. If I'm not mistaken, it's not to the
 2 Avimor project, a planned community, too, or
 3 annexed in the city of Eagle, also.
 4 Q. I don't -- I'm not in a position to be
 5 answering your questions here, Mr. Moyle.
 6 A. You are going there, so I'm asking you.
 7 Let's have a conversation.
 8 Q. Did you oppose the Avimor project,
 9 Mr. Moyle?
 10 A. I wasn't involved in the Avimor
 11 project, so, un-huh.
 12 Q. I know you weren't involved in it, but
 13 did you oppose it?
 14 A. If they've got water up there, and it's
 15 not going to affect everybody else in North Ada
 16 County -- when Avimor first came in, if I'm not
 17 mistaken, they were going to bring water from the
 18 Payette side, to use a lot of water from the
 19 Payette River. If that's their original plan, I
 20 don't care. It's not going to affect everybody
 21 else.
 22 MR. FEREDAY: Let's go off the record
 23 for a minute.
 24 (Discussion held off the record.)
 25 MR. FEREDAY: Back on the record.

1 Q. (BY MR. FEREDAY) Mr. Moyle, with
 2 regard to the M3 Eagle project, is this a project
 3 that you oppose, personally?
 4 A. Do I oppose the ability for them to
 5 build houses up there? No, I don't have a
 6 problem with that. But I think that the water
 7 that they get ought to come from the surface, and
 8 not the ground.
 9 My concern is IDWR studies, your
 10 studies, everybody's studies shows there is a
 11 limited resource in ground water. I think they
 12 have the ability today to get the surface water,
 13 instead of using the ground water.
 14 Other than that, if the developer wants
 15 to build the project, carry on with it. But I
 16 think they have to have some sideboards. And I
 17 think that the water issue should come from
 18 surface and not ground.
 19 Q. Do you know how much water is proposed
 20 to be diverted to supply the M3 Eagle portion of
 21 the City of Eagle?
 22 A. I do not know what the total is.
 23 Q. Your contention that they should get
 24 the water from surface water, would that be from
 25 the Farmers Union Canal?

1 A. They've got options. They have the
 2 Farmers Union Canal water right now. That is
 3 actually one of the few ditches that allows you
 4 to move water rights around. And they have the
 5 ability for in-storage basins, similar to what
 6 Micron does. You are seeing surface water being
 7 used by United Water, in two facilities. One in
 8 Boise, and one there in the same Micron area.
 9 Micron even used underground storage. I think M3
 10 could do something similar.
 11 Q. So is it your contention that there
 12 should be no more ground water developed in North
 13 Ada County, Mr. Moyle?
 14 A. It's my contention that the Department,
 15 your study and others show, that you have a
 16 declining resource. And the amount of water is
 17 not there that everybody thought was there
 18 before. I think that that leads credence, that
 19 they ought to be using surface water and not
 20 ground water.
 21 Q. My question, though, is whether it is
 22 your contention that there should be no further
 23 ground water developed in North Ada County? Is
 24 that your contention?
 25 A. It's my contention that the Department

1 has concerns. It's my contention that there is a
 2 study going on right now that shows their
 3 concerns. And I think it would be better to use
 4 surface water than ground water. You have a
 5 declining resource. It's not there.
 6 And what's going to happen if the
 7 Department continues to grant these water rights
 8 for water that doesn't exist, is you are going to
 9 end up with a big mess as people's wells go dry.
 10 Everybody keeps suing everybody. It's not a good
 11 thing. Especially, when they have the
 12 opportunity to use surface water, and actually
 13 you could almost turn it into a recharge project
 14 versus a drawn aquifer. You also have seen it
 15 with the development across the road.
 16 Hillsdale's wells are going down. They had to
 17 dig a well a little deeper. The resource isn't
 18 there.
 19 Q. So I recognize that you are a layperson
 20 with regard to growth trends, Mr. Moyle. But is
 21 it your view that economic --
 22 A. I can see the growth trends pretty
 23 easy. It's going (indicating).
 24 Q. -- the economic development in North
 25 Ada County is really not an option for our

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1 future?
 2 A. Those are your words, and not mine.
 3 Q. Okay.
 4 A. And I think you can do the economic
 5 development with surface water and not ground
 6 water. And I think that if you use the ground
 7 water like you are proposing, you are going to
 8 create an economic mess, as everybody's wells go
 9 dry.
 10 Hence, the reason, I think, use the
 11 surface water. It's being done already in Ada
 12 County. They also have the option that Avimor
 13 had, bring the water over the hill from the
 14 Payette. There is about 40 percent of that water
 15 that hasn't even been appropriated out of the
 16 Payette River. There is plenty of water if they
 17 are willing to put the money in to bring the
 18 surface water up, and turn it into a recharge
 19 project, versus the draw. That's going to have
 20 economic detriment to the place, when everybody's
 21 wells go dry.
 22 If you want to talk about economic
 23 benefit, look at Hillsdale. I mean, that's going
 24 to cost a quarter of million dollars to get the
 25 well deep enough to find the water. That's the

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1 same water you are -- you guys are going into.
 2 It doesn't make sense to me.
 3 Q. So it is your contention, that there
 4 should be no further ground water development in
 5 North Ada; is that right?
 6 A. I would say, that it should be very
 7 limited, at best. And none, until they figure
 8 out what's going on, would be better.
 9 Q. And with regard to supplying a place
 10 like north Eagle with surface water, your view is
 11 that that should be provided from the Boise
 12 River; is that correct?
 13 A. I think you have options currently with
 14 the ditch that goes there. And it's a ditch that
 15 allows the water rights to be transferred, unlike
 16 some of the other. And I think it's an option
 17 that nobody has talked about, and ought to look
 18 at.
 19 I think you are seeing the State doing
 20 that, by the way, Jeff, when you have the
 21 governor and others talking about Twin Springs,
 22 raising Anderson Ranch, all those talks are in
 23 regards to more water for municipal. Everybody
 24 knows, eventually, you are going to have to go
 25 there.

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1 The water supply is limited, in my
 2 opinion, I'm not a hydrologist, but in my
 3 opinion, especially, in North Ada County, the
 4 Department and others have said it for quite a
 5 while.
 6 Q. So, Mr. Moyle, is it your contention
 7 that for there to be any significant economic
 8 growth in North Ada, we're going to have to build
 9 a new dam, such as Twin Springs?
 10 A. No, I think you can go in there right
 11 now, and put any surface water right right now
 12 for any water that you have and develop it, if
 13 you are talking about water rights today.
 14 Q. And what --
 15 A. You just don't want to do it.
 16 Q. And what water rights do we have; do
 17 you know?
 18 A. M3, I don't know. I know they have got
 19 some of up there, coming out of Farmers Union,
 20 because I know they irrigate back there. And I
 21 know the guy farming it said, they want him to
 22 expand. So they must have more water rights than
 23 I thought. Have you been there, Jeff?
 24 Q. Sorry?
 25 A. Have you been there?

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1 Q. Been where?
 2 A. Up there in Avimor -- I mean, the M3
 3 project, where they farm it?
 4 Q. Yes, I've been there many times. Thank
 5 you.
 6 A. It's little pipes right there to go up
 7 there. So they have a water right.
 8 Q. Right. I would like to show you what
 9 we're marking as Deposition Exhibit F.
 10 (Exhibit F marked.)
 11 Q. (BY MR. FEREDAY) It's a copy of the
 12 City's "Reasonably Anticipated Future Needs
 13 Analysis." Have you ever seen this before?
 14 A. No, sir.
 15 Q. Did you know that the City provided
 16 information on Reasonably Anticipated Future
 17 Needs, or sometimes called RAFN?
 18 A. RAFN?
 19 Q. RAFN. To the Department of Water
 20 Resources?
 21 A. I did not know that.
 22 Q. What do you know about reasonably
 23 anticipated future needs, Mr. Moyle?
 24 A. I know that you have a whole bunch of
 25 cities trying to grab a whole bunch of ground,

1 because they are all afraid the other one is
 2 going to get there first. And I think their
 3 biggest problem, they are not taking care of
 4 business from the center out. They are trying to
 5 hopscotch. Similarly, to what we were talking
 6 about today.
 7 Q. Where does the term "reasonably
 8 anticipated future needs" come from; do you know?
 9 A. I do not know. It's probably different
 10 for every city.
 11 Q. What about planning horizons for water
 12 planning? Do you know what that means?
 13 A. I'm assuming it means that what they
 14 anticipate their growth will be, and what water
 15 they will need for the growth.
 16 Q. Do you know where that phrase, planning
 17 horizon comes from?
 18 A. No.
 19 Q. What do you know about municipal water
 20 rights, Mr. Moyle, in any particular? Have you
 21 had any experience with municipal water rights;
 22 looking at them, evaluating them, commenting on
 23 them?
 24 A. I know they trump my ag water rights.
 25 I know the Department had moratorium, and the

1 only one water right they gave me was municipal.
 2 What do you understand? What do you want to
 3 know?
 4 Q. I want to know what you know, about the
 5 subject of municipal water rights?
 6 MR. ALAN SMITH: Can you make the
 7 question more specific, Counsel? That's pretty
 8 broad.
 9 THE WITNESS: That's why I gave a broad
 10 answer.
 11 Q. (BY MR. FEREDAY) I'm asking,
 12 everything you know about municipal water rights?
 13 MR. ALAN SMITH: The same objection.
 14 Q. (BY MR. FEREDAY) You can go ahead and
 15 answer, Mr. Moyle.
 16 A. I know they trump my water rights. And
 17 I know the City is going to continue to do what
 18 they are doing with regards to requests for
 19 municipal water rights. We're going to have an
 20 economic problem, because you are going to drain
 21 everybody else's well, and cause a hardship on
 22 everybody else.
 23 I know, also, that as these cities have
 24 sought water rights, they've been allowed to do
 25 them, where others have not been allowed to do

1 water rights. Especially, when you go to the
 2 Star Road to the east. I know that when the
 3 Department says it's a moratorium, it didn't
 4 include municipals.
 5 Q. Are you familiar with any statutory
 6 provisions pertaining to municipal water rights?
 7 A. Not -- well, to explain to you what I
 8 know, I guess is the word I'm trying to say. I
 9 mean, I know a little bit, but...
 10 Q. What would that little bit be?
 11 A. Just that they trump my ag rights.
 12 (Exhibit G marked.)
 13 Q. (BY MR. FEREDAY) I would like you to
 14 look now at Deposition Exhibit G.
 15 MR. SMITH: Excuse me, Jeff. Is this
 16 marked as an exhibit?
 17 MR. FEREDAY: It is F.
 18 THE WITNESS: So is Exhibit F what the
 19 City anticipates; is that what I'm to understand?
 20 Q. (BY MR. FEREDAY) I'm asking you,
 21 Mr. Moyle, what you know about this document?
 22 You said, you had never seen it.
 23 A. I've never seen it. I'm reading it as
 24 we've been talking, and that is why I asked that
 25 question, is this what they anticipate to have?

1 Q. Well, we would let the document speak
 2 for itself. But I would like you now to focus on
 3 Exhibit G.
 4 A. All right. We're moving on to G?
 5 Q. Yes.
 6 A. G.
 7 Q. G, I'll represent to you, is a document
 8 prepared by the Idaho Department of Water
 9 Resources, dated June 1st, 2011, and revised
 10 October 4, 2011. Have you seen this document,
 11 Mr. Moyle?
 12 A. Just the little thing on the computer,
 13 and I didn't open it up, because I didn't have
 14 time.
 15 Q. So you have not read it?
 16 A. I have not read it.
 17 MR. JASON SMITH: Can I get a copy of
 18 that one, Jeff, that last one G?
 19 MR. FEREDAY: Yes.
 20 Let's go off the record.
 21 (Discussion held off the record.)
 22 MR. FEREDAY: Back on the record.
 23 Q. (BY MR. FEREDAY) Mr. Moyle, I would
 24 like to just go back over an area that I know I
 25 asked you, briefly, about with regard to your

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1 expertise. I would like to confirm that you
 2 don't consider yourself an expert on a reasonable
 3 anticipated future need water rights, in that
 4 you've never appeared as an expert witness on
 5 such a subject; correct?
 6 MR. ALAN SMITH: Objection. That's
 7 been asked and answered.
 8 Q. (BY MR. FEREDAY) You can answer.
 9 A. I can't answer.
 10 Q. You can.
 11 A. Do I have to?
 12 Q. Well, yes. Yes, you do.
 13 A. I can't remember ever testifying as an
 14 expert witness on that, so, no.
 15 Q. Have you ever testified as an expert
 16 witness on anything?
 17 A. Not in court, no. Oh, at one time a
 18 guy stole one of my guns. I guess I was an
 19 expert witness, because I could identify the gun,
 20 whatever that means. But I think by the time the
 21 testimony and the hearing comes, I'll probably
 22 know a lot more about that issue.
 23 Q. What issue?
 24 A. Anticipated future needs.
 25 Q. And what facts do you anticipate

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1 testifying to?
 2 A. I have to do homework before I can tell
 3 you that.
 4 Q. So you don't know that here, today?
 5 A. I don't know that today.
 6 MR. FEREDAY: Okay. No further
 7 questions.
 8 Bruce, exam?
 9 MR. SMITH: Do the protestants have any
 10 questions?
 11 MR. ALAN SMITH: No questions.
 12 (Discussion held off the record.)
 13 MR. SMITH: Back on the record.
 14 EXAMINATION
 15 QUESTIONS BY MR. SMITH:
 16 Q. Mr. Moyle, I'm going to follow-up with
 17 very few questions. I represent the City of
 18 Eagle in this matter. Okay?
 19 A. And Jeff represents M3, correct?
 20 Q. That is correct.
 21 MR. ALAN SMITH: Right.
 22 Q. (BY MR. SMITH) I need mostly to
 23 clarify a couple things. I am not sure, I
 24 understood what the purpose of your testimony
 25 will be. What is the purpose of your testimony

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1 at the hearing that's upcoming?
 2 A. I think, Bruce, that if we talk about
 3 the three questions brought into play by the
 4 director. And we talk about future needs,
 5 anticipated growth. We need to talk about the
 6 impacts that this water right will have on those.
 7 And I would like to talk about that.
 8 Q. Okay. So do you intend to talk about
 9 the impacts of the Water Right 63-32573 --
 10 A. I'm impressed you know the number.
 11 Q. -- on future needs; is that correct?
 12 A. On future needs, and that -- how it
 13 will affect existing people that are there.
 14 Q. Are you testifying personally, or as a
 15 legislator?
 16 A. Personally.
 17 Q. So the opinions --
 18 A. If I was testifying by the legislature,
 19 I wouldn't have done this. I would have just had
 20 a hearing.
 21 Q. So the testimony you will be giving is
 22 as an individual?
 23 A. Mike Moyle, as an individual.
 24 Q. And so the opinions that you would
 25 give, on anything you would testify to, would be

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1 personal opinions?
 2 A. Mike Moyle.
 3 Q. Okay.
 4 A. And I forgot you were left handed.
 5 Q. Sometimes. I shoot pistols right
 6 handed.
 7 You mentioned Treasure Valley
 8 hydrologic project. You are familiar with that;
 9 correct?
 10 A. A little bit, not very well. I need to
 11 go back and read all that stuff. It's been a
 12 while. I know they are working on the new one
 13 now. I am kind of interested in what they come
 14 up with.
 15 Q. And you mentioned Mr. Christian
 16 Petrich. Do you recall that?
 17 A. Oh, yeah.
 18 Q. Do you know Christian -- Mr. Petrich?
 19 A. I know Christian a little bit. He and
 20 I did some work together when we did the Treasure
 21 Valley Aquifer Committee.
 22 Q. Do you understand what Christian does
 23 for a living?
 24 A. Yes, he's a hydrologist.
 25 Q. Do you have confidence in Christian's

1 A. The chairman, most of them came from
 2 the pressure of Eastern Snake Plain as they've
 3 tried to address the issue of declining water in
 4 Eastern Snake Plain. The ground pumpers, and the
 5 spring flows were declining, and all this stuff.
 6 It was a way to try to come up with a way to, I
 7 think, mostly in the end, generate revenue at
 8 that time. At that time, I wasn't in a position
 9 to know what was going on. I was just asked to
 10 be the chairman of the Treasure Valley.
 11 Q. What year was this?
 12 A. I don't remember.
 13 Q. Is it still in existence?
 14 A. Un-huh.
 15 Q. Okay.
 16 A. The camps were kind of an offshoot from
 17 that.
 18 Q. Did you attend any of the camp meetings
 19 with the Treasure Valley?
 20 A. No, I did that on purpose.
 21 Q. And you testified about Mr. Squires
 22 taking measurements at your --
 23 A. Mr. Squires took measurements of our
 24 well for two years when he was doing the study
 25 for M3.

1 opinions?
 2 A. It depends on what he's talking about.
 3 Q. Water.
 4 A. I find that when he talks about water,
 5 it depends on who's paying him.
 6 Q. So you think his opinion is influenced
 7 by who pays him?
 8 A. I think that he works for a living.
 9 And who he works for, says their story.
 10 Q. Do you think everybody is like that?
 11 A. Not everybody. But I know that
 12 Christian has said certain things within that
 13 committee. And those things were different than
 14 what he said when he was working for the City of
 15 Eagle.
 16 Q. And when you said "committee," what
 17 committee are you talking about?
 18 A. The Treasure Valley Aquifer Committee.
 19 It was put together a few years ago when they
 20 started dealing with the Eastern Snake Plain.
 21 They put one together in Mountain Home, Treasure
 22 Valley, north Idaho, as they tried to figure out
 23 how to address the issues of declining water.
 24 Q. When you say, they put it together, I'm
 25 not clear.

1 Q. Mr. Squires would know if you were
 2 injured; correct?
 3 A. Uh-huh.
 4 Q. Okay.
 5 A. Mr. Squires, that's why I brought that
 6 little thing where we talked about that we were
 7 going to do the study we did. I am assuming,
 8 since he was testing my well, my well was one of
 9 the ones that he used, to come up with that
 10 conclusion.
 11 Q. Okay. You were testifying earlier, and
 12 you mentioned a feedlot. When you are talking
 13 about a feedlot, are you talking about
 14 Hormachea's feedlot?
 15 A. Yes. I said that in my testimony, too,
 16 that we talked about them. I think Hormachea
 17 thought that he was going to get water and sewer.
 18 He didn't get none.
 19 Q. Did you talk to him about that?
 20 A. No. I do know he's filling his feedlot
 21 up, running cattle, which he didn't do for a
 22 while. And the annexation took place. They were
 23 shutting it down, and now they are going full
 24 bore.
 25 Q. Full bore with?

1 A. Cattle, full.
 2 Q. It might have something to do with the
 3 market, though; right?
 4 A. It might, but I doubt it.
 5 Q. Okay.
 6 A. I think it had something to do with the
 7 fact that he thought he could turn it into
 8 houses, and now he can't. So let's go back into
 9 putting in cattle.
 10 Q. Now, when you say, Mr. Hormachea
 11 thought, what do you base that on? How do you
 12 know that?
 13 A. Well, I know that the guys that worked
 14 for them talked about, that there was a
 15 perception that he owned a lot of ground up
 16 there. And if he was annexed into the city, and
 17 he had sewer and water to build houses, it was
 18 probably worth more than a feedlot. I believe
 19 Hormachea -- and this is me speculating -- that
 20 he did some developments. Wasn't he involved
 21 with Brookwood, and some of those other
 22 developments in Eagle, if I'm not mistaken?
 23 Q. I don't know.
 24 A. I don't either, but I think so. And I
 25 think that when they went in there, and said,

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1 hey, we'll bring you water and sewer, I mean,
 2 everybody thinking we're going to get the golden
 3 cow here. We're going to get the services.
 4 Q. Okay. But that's what you are
 5 speculating about?
 6 A. I'm speculating from hearsay, from his
 7 employees.
 8 Q. Sure.
 9 A. By the way, the margins on the feedlot
 10 aren't as good as they used to be, because of the
 11 costs.
 12 Q. On your exhibits, the exhibits that are
 13 marked --
 14 A. They were mine. I was looking at them.
 15 I had to give them to you.
 16 Q. Yeah, that's the way depositions work.
 17 There are marks on them, with an "X" with circles
 18 on them. Are those your marks?
 19 A. Some of them are. Some of them aren't.
 20 Q. Who else's would they be?
 21 A. A friend of mine.
 22 Q. Who is that friend?
 23 A. Do I have to tell you?
 24 Q. Yes.
 25 A. I'm trying to think which marks were

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1 made by who. Some would have been made by
 2 Thornton. Some may have been made by -- I don't
 3 think Mary would have made those marks. And some
 4 made by me, when I was copying them. I didn't
 5 bring them all, though, because I didn't copy
 6 them all off the internet.
 7 Q. Okay. I'm going to hand you, those are
 8 my Exhibits 1 through 5, which are my copies of
 9 the ones that you did.
 10 A. Do I need to hand those back? What do
 11 I need to do with them?
 12 Q. I am going to keep them.
 13 So I want you to go through them, and
 14 where there is an "X" marked on it, and here is a
 15 pen. And I would like for you to mark on that,
 16 who made that mark.
 17 MR. ALAN SMITH: If you know.
 18 MR. SMITH: Mr. Smith, I'm pretty sure
 19 that this is an independent witness. That you
 20 not guide him in the questions I'm asking him,
 21 please.
 22 MR. ALAN SMITH: Well, he can't answer
 23 if he doesn't know.
 24 MR. SMITH: Mr. Smith, do not instruct
 25 the witness.

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1 THE WITNESS: Are we going to have a
 2 fight here?
 3 Q. (BY MR. SMITH) So if you would take
 4 those 1 through 5, which I've handed you. Just
 5 mark on there.
 6 A. I don't know who did this one
 7 (indicating).
 8 Q. Okay.
 9 A. These are mine. There is two copies of
 10 this that I have. This (indicating) one is not
 11 my mark.
 12 Q. You are referring to which exhibit?
 13 A. This is your M3's hydrological study.
 14 Q. That's No. 3.
 15 A. I have marked them, but not that one.
 16 Q. So hang on just a minute. So on No. 3,
 17 there is an "X." And the same thing, would you
 18 just put a question mark, since you don't know
 19 who that was?
 20 A. (Witness complying.)
 21 Q. Okay. Thank you.
 22 A. This is a combo.
 23 Q. And that's Exhibit 4, you are looking
 24 at?
 25 A. And you can't see it, but this should

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1 be underlined here, like that (indicating).
 2 Q. So for the record, unfortunately,
 3 Mr. Moyle, when you say, "this," it shows up on
 4 the transcript --
 5 A. Underlying the statement from the
 6 director --
 7 Q. Let's do it this way. You marked on
 8 Exhibit 4 -- you just put a new mark?
 9 A. Correct.
 10 Q. What page is that on?
 11 A. It's on page 5.
 12 Q. Okay. And you --
 13 A. Page 5 of Exhibit 2.
 14 Q. And would you just put a --
 15 A. Combo, what do you want me to put?
 16 Q. Whatever you just marked on it, I want
 17 you to put a star by it. You are from Star.
 18 That's a good one.
 19 A. (Witness complying.) That is a star.
 20 What do you want?
 21 Q. That is fine.
 22 A. Now what?
 23 Q. That was Exhibit 2?
 24 A. Yes.
 25 Q. Now, Exhibit 1, there is no marks on

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1 it. So just pass it back.
 2 A. Well, it's underlined.
 3 Q. Did you underline it?
 4 A. No.
 5 Q. Do you know who underlined it?
 6 A. No.
 7 Q. Okay. So besides Mr. Thornton, did
 8 anybody else mark on these?
 9 A. Besides me and Mr. Thornton?
 10 Q. Besides you and Mr. Thornton, yes.
 11 A. Not unless somebody else did. It could
 12 have been something marked there from Mary, but I
 13 don't know that she did.
 14 Q. Okay.
 15 A. You'll have to ask her.
 16 Q. Are you familiar with the Local Land
 17 Use Planning Act?
 18 A. I wrote the note that it should never
 19 have been passed.
 20 Q. That means you are familiar with it;
 21 correct?
 22 A. That's your annexation stuff; isn't it?
 23 Passed in the '70s. What would you like to know?
 24 Q. I would like to know if you are
 25 familiar with it?

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1 A. Very little, but I'm familiar with what
 2 it is.
 3 Q. Okay. What do you know about it?
 4 A. What do you want to know? It allows
 5 forced annexations.
 6 Q. I want to know --
 7 A. It allows police powers with the
 8 cities, things like that.
 9 Q. Okay. Anything else?
 10 A. I don't know. There is a lot of stuff
 11 in it.
 12 Q. Okay. But I'm just asking you about,
 13 what you know about it?
 14 A. Those are the ones that I brought up,
 15 that come to my mind.
 16 Q. Okay. You mentioned that you were
 17 going to talk to Mr. Homan and Mr. Baxter. And I
 18 think you said, if I am allowed to testify?
 19 A. Yeah, I would like to talk to them and
 20 get their side of the story.
 21 Q. Would you anticipate talking to them
 22 before your testimony?
 23 A. I would try to.
 24 Q. Okay. Have you looked at the
 25 settlement agreement between the Department and

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1 M3?
 2 A. Not all of it.
 3 Q. What part did you look at?
 4 A. Just the front page of it on the
 5 computer, and didn't have time to read it before
 6 I came.
 7 Q. Okay. Do you intend to read it?
 8 A. If I testify, yeah.
 9 Q. Okay. And --
 10 A. How does that work? How does the
 11 Department make an agreement without the
 12 protestants involved? How does that work?
 13 Q. Well, unfortunately, in a deposition, I
 14 ask questions. You answer. If you have
 15 questions, it's not part of the deposition.
 16 A. I don't get -- it's not a two-way
 17 conversation.
 18 Q. It is not. It's unfortunate, but
 19 that's the way it goes.
 20 A. So we could go off the record, and shut
 21 the tape down, and I could tell you.
 22 Q. Yeah, I could.
 23 A. You wouldn't, though, it sounds like?
 24 Q. Well, I just need to get through your
 25 deposition, if you don't mind.

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1 So you had responded to one question.
 2 You intended to testify about the annexation
 3 process about Eagle's future needs, what is
 4 Eagle, quote, "trying to accomplish," and impacts
 5 on your water?
 6 A. I think you've got to look at the
 7 impacts, not only to mine, but everybody else's.
 8 Q. Okay.
 9 A. It needs to be broader than that.
 10 Q. All right. You indicated that in your
 11 opinion, cities should be using surface water;
 12 correct?
 13 A. Yeah, you and I have had that
 14 discussion before.
 15 Q. Where would the surface water come
 16 from, for the M3 project?
 17 A. You tell me.
 18 Q. You don't know?
 19 A. It's not my project. I know they have
 20 a surface water right now. I think if they have
 21 one now, they could change it over, and use it
 22 for the other.
 23 Q. And would it be enough for the M3
 24 project?
 25 A. I don't know. I do know they are on a
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1 ditch, though, that allows more water to be
 2 transferred if they wanted to go purchase it.
 3 Q. And you are a farmer. You know that
 4 the water in the Farmers Union ditch is owned by
 5 someone else; don't you?
 6 A. Uh-huh.
 7 Q. Okay.
 8 A. But I also know, that someone else has
 9 been willing to make deals with Micron and United
 10 Water. So I think it could be done, you have got
 11 examples of that already taking place.
 12 Q. Okay.
 13 A. And also with in basin storage, and I
 14 think that that plays -- that that might be
 15 conducive to that, although I am not a
 16 hydrologist.
 17 Q. But those are your opinions about what
 18 a private party should do; correct?
 19 A. Maybe they need to have a statute to
 20 help them get there.
 21 Q. But that is your opinion about what a
 22 private party should do with their property;
 23 correct?
 24 A. It's my opinion, that when a big
 25 developer comes in, and is going to affect
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1 everybody else's water right, we ought to look at
 2 a solution to the problem. And I think a
 3 solution to the problem would be surface water.
 4 So those are my opinions.
 5 Q. Those are your opinions about what a
 6 party should do with its own private property;
 7 correct?
 8 A. Those are my opinions on what ought to
 9 happen on this project.
 10 Q. Okay. You made the comment that we
 11 have a declining resource. IDWR says so. How do
 12 you know that?
 13 A. Hence, the reason that Christian
 14 Petrich brought it up in the committee. IDWR had
 15 concern about North Ada County. The director had
 16 concerns when he had issue with -- well, one of
 17 his orders that I read. And quite frankly, their
 18 own study from M3 addressed it, that there is a
 19 decline in water.
 20 I also know that the subdivisions to
 21 the other side of the road from this proposed
 22 project, are lowering their wells, because they
 23 are going down. So that tells me that there is
 24 declining water in North Ada County. And the
 25 Department -- the reason they are doing the study
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1 there is, there is a concern. They wouldn't be
 2 doing a study if there wasn't a concern with
 3 North Ada County.
 4 Q. So you don't think the Department would
 5 do a study just to gather information, so they
 6 can make informed decisions?
 7 A. I think the Department is low on
 8 resources, and they are going to focus on areas
 9 of concern. And I think that when we, the
 10 legislature, put the money together for the North
 11 Ada County, the reason it stayed on the top of
 12 the list was, because we were concerned about
 13 declining water levels.
 14 And it was brought to their attention,
 15 I think, in part by Christian Petrich. If I'm
 16 not mistaken, didn't he do the study, early on,
 17 that had the concerns? And the two places that
 18 Christian Petrich mentioned were concerns, if I'm
 19 not mistaken, were North Ada County and Lake
 20 Lowell, down by Lake Lowell, south somewhere.
 21 Q. That issue, you say, the availability
 22 of the water supply, you would have confidence in
 23 Mr. Petrich's opinion?
 24 A. I'm saying, Mr. Petrich says things,
 25 whoever is paying him to do it. I think that you
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1 could go look at what he said before with his
2 concerns in North Ada County, and look at other
3 places, and they don't always say the same thing.
4 But that's my opinion.
5 Q. I hope you can understand why I'm
6 having trouble establishing between your opinion
7 as a layperson and a legislator. That's why I
8 asked the question.
9 A. I apologize.
10 Q. I recognize it's hard to draw the line
11 sometimes.
12 A. I'm not good at drawing lines.
13 Q. The comment you made, that cities are
14 trying to grab water. What were you referring to
15 there?
16 A. I think they are.
17 Q. What are you referring to?
18 A. For example, this water right. They
19 don't need that much water for the first phase or
20 two. Let's see if it works. I think that is why
21 they have these huge planning areas. I think
22 that goes with their questions there under future
23 planning needs and anticipated growth.
24 I think that they are trying to grab
25 area before somebody else grabs it. I think you

1 saw that in regards to Eagle and Star, in their
2 area of impact. The City of Eagle said, they
3 wouldn't go past Linder. And then they said,
4 they wouldn't go past Palmer. And then they
5 wouldn't go past 16. And every time they made
6 these arbitrary make believe marks in the sand,
7 they went past them. And in the meantime, they
8 couldn't provide sewer or any services to them.
9 It was just, hurry up and grab it before somebody
10 else got it. It's crazy.
11 Q. Is it your understanding that the City
12 of Eagle provides sewer service?
13 A. They don't. They have a private
14 company. The same as Star. But when they do
15 their development agreements, that's my
16 understanding, that's part of the agreement. So
17 while it may be Eagle City sewer, it's really the
18 City of Eagle. They work hand-in-hand on doing
19 it.
20 Q. Okay. As a general principle, do you
21 believe cities shouldn't plan for the future?
22 A. I think cities should plan from the
23 center out.
24 Q. What does that mean?
25 A. I think you grow this way (indicating).

1 Not that way (indicating). I think that you grow
2 from your center. You work your way out. You
3 don't do what they are doing with the M3 project,
4 where you go eight miles from the city and create
5 a whole new enclave, and annex all this ground in
6 between with no anticipation to providing the
7 services to develop between them for years to
8 come. I think that's a mistake. And the cities
9 need to grow from the center out.
10 Q. Okay. And again --
11 A. It's easier for them to provide
12 services.
13 Q. And again, that's your own personal
14 opinion; correct?
15 A. It's just common sense.
16 Q. And you made the comment, I wish I had
17 protested this application. Do you remember
18 that?
19 A. Yeah. If I had known the effects it
20 was going to have on my wells, I probably would
21 have. I had no idea. And I think that's the bad
22 situation with regards to the process now.
23 Because until Squires' study, you know, I didn't
24 think it was going to affect us as bad as Ed
25 thinks it will.

1 Q. Did you review the application filed by
2 M3 when it was filed?
3 A. No. I think at that time, you and I
4 were playing on another one.
5 Q. At the very beginning of your
6 deposition, you indicated that you had talked to
7 Mr. John Thornton, Mary Taylor, Mr. Meissner, and
8 Alan Smith, and Jason Smith; correct?
9 A. Yeah.
10 Q. Any others?
11 A. There were others. I don't remember
12 their names.
13 Q. Do you remember their faces?
14 A. No.
15 Q. Okay. Have you ever talked to Eagle?
16 Have you ever talked to the City of Eagle about
17 this?
18 A. Formally, no.
19 Q. Informally?
20 A. Oh, the Norm Semanko and I have touched
21 off on it just a little bit, but not really the
22 water right. Just issues with M3, what was going
23 on. He talked to me the other day at a chamber
24 meeting about CIDs. I think that was in the
25 paper.

1 Q. But not about this particular water
 2 right?
 3 A. Un-huh.
 4 Q. And have you talked to the City about
 5 its future planning rights?
 6 A. Un-huh. Now, on the past one, Mayor
 7 Merrill talked about them.
 8 Q. The past what?
 9 A. The past water rights.
 10 Q. No. No. No. Talked about future
 11 planning?
 12 A. We're good.
 13 Q. Have you talked to the City of Eagle
 14 about future planning?
 15 A. No. We're good.
 16 Q. Okay. Are you still raising mink?
 17 A. No, un-huh. The wells went dry.
 18 Q. Which well?
 19 A. The well that supplemented the mink
 20 farm.
 21 Q. So the well that supplied the mink farm
 22 is now dry?
 23 A. Not now. It came back when Legacy quit
 24 pumping into the ditch. Do you want to talk
 25 about that?

1 Q. Sure, tell me about that.
 2 A. The well that supplies the mink farm.
 3 And you go by and the sheds are still there. Not
 4 all of them, but there is five or six sheds are
 5 still there. When Eagle got their water right
 6 for Legacy, and they built a few houses. The
 7 people living in them didn't like the taste of
 8 the water, because it kind of has sulphur taste,
 9 because they went to the same aquifer as the well
 10 at the mink ranch.
 11 So to make the well taste better, they
 12 ran the fire hydrants in the drain all summer
 13 long. They only ran the fire hydrants and the
 14 drain wells all summer long, pretty soon our
 15 wells went from up here (indicating), down to
 16 where there wasn't.
 17 So it cost me a lot of money to go have
 18 buckets and cups, watering thousands of mink,
 19 because the water pressure was gone in the well.
 20 That well was put in in the '30s. There is no
 21 power lines to it. There is no pumps in it.
 22 There is nothing there. It was always just used
 23 for the mink and for ag.
 24 Q. Do you recall how deep that well is?
 25 A. It's 285, something like that.

1 Q. Okay. And so if you've been measuring
 2 the head pressure, what's your head pressure now?
 3 A. Head pressure this summer went up.
 4 This summer when Legacy went broke, they quit
 5 pumping the water in the ditch. The fire
 6 hydrants kept running in the drain, and the
 7 pressure came back up. We would have run mink
 8 this summer if we would have known that they were
 9 quit running in the ditch.
 10 Q. So do you know what the head pressure
 11 is now?
 12 A. I haven't looked at it recently. The
 13 last time I looked it was about eight-and-a-half.
 14 Q. When you say, it came back up, you mean
 15 it ran the artesian?
 16 A. The pressures came back up. The
 17 pressures went down to about two, two-and-a-half,
 18 that's when they wouldn't work for the water in
 19 the mink. When they quit running the fire
 20 hydrants in the drain, the pressure came back up.
 21 But who was to know that they were going to go
 22 broke, and turn the wells off.
 23 Q. So when you made the comment, again, I
 24 just need to clarify that, the City is trying to
 25 grab water. You were referring to this

1 application?
 2 A. I think sometimes, like with Legacy,
 3 and with this water right application, they apply
 4 for more than they need. And I think you saw
 5 that, when the director said they needed less in
 6 this water right. He said the same thing in the
 7 water right that we did before.
 8 So sometimes they try to go for a lot
 9 more than is necessary, and I think that's a
 10 water grab. And they use the excuse of
 11 anticipated future needs. Well, you see what's
 12 going on out there? Their growth rate didn't hit
 13 anywhere near what they anticipated it to be.
 14 Q. What did they anticipate it to be?
 15 A. I don't know. I'm sure it was not what
 16 it is today.
 17 Q. So you are speculating?
 18 A. I'm guessing. But I do remember when
 19 we talked before about the hundreds of houses,
 20 and all the stuff in regards to Legacy. I'm sure
 21 it was probably similar with M3, and all these
 22 homes and stuff that were there. I think that's
 23 why the director pared it down, originally,
 24 before the final, final, wherever we are at.
 25 Q. Okay.

1 A. So I think that the cities asked for
 2 more than they ever anticipated needing or using,
 3 and I don't think that's right.
 4 Q. So when you say, generically, "cities,"
 5 you are referring to the City of Eagle, not
 6 anyone else?
 7 A. I would have to do some research, but I
 8 think I would assume City of Eagle, but I don't
 9 know that for sure. I'm speculating.
 10 MR. SMITH: I have no further
 11 questions. Thank you very much.
 12 THE WITNESS: Thanks, Bruce.
 13 MR. FEREDAY: I guess that's it.

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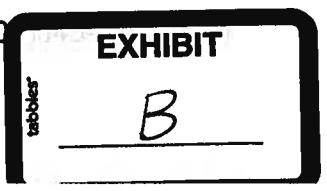

 15 there was something else. That's what I remember
 16 mostly, was the legislation, and the review of
 17 the history of this application we're discussing
 18 about M3.
 19 Q. The legislation that you have
 20 mentioned, what did that cover?
 21 A. I think it was some law that was passed
 22 years ago. And I think the name on it started
 23 with an H. I want to say, Hurlbutt, or something
 24 like that. The legislation had a name on it, but
 25 it started with an H.

1 Q. What was the substance of the
 2 legislation? How did it relate to this matter?
 3 A. I think it had to do with the Eastern
 4 Snake River Plain aquifer.
 5 Q. What discussions did you have with
 6 Mr. Moyle, or Mr. Meissner concerning this
 7 application?
 8 A. Very little. In fact, I don't know
 9 that I have discussed it with either one of them,
 10 other than we just briefly with Mr. Moyle on
 11 Saturday when he was talking about that
 12 legislation.
 13 Q. Ms. Taylor, I'm handing you what has
 14 been marked in yesterday's deposition as
 15 Deposition Exhibit E. And I would like you to
 16 turn to the second page of that.
 17 I would represent to you, that this is
 18 one of these orders that we spoke of earlier,
 19 that limits the scope of evidence in this
 20 hearing, about which this deposition is being
 21 taken. Do you see those three numbered
 22 paragraphs on page 2?
 23 A. Yes.
 24 Q. Do you understand that this hearing is
 25 limited to this type of evidence on these three

 24 there is going to be a public hearing for the
 25 City of Eagle, for annexation of this property

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1 into the City. And it gave a date, but the date
 2 was already past. That's about the limit of my
 3 understanding.
 4 I also understand, that under the law,
 5 people within 300 feet of anything like that have
 6 to be notified. But because this little strip of
 7 ground was in the middle of Mr. Hanson's
 8 property, and he owned everything to the east,
 9 everything to the west, and to the south, and BLM
 10 on the north. He was the only one who fell
 11 within the 300-foot range.
 12 So none of us were notified or had any
 13 knowledge about it. And we would have protested
 14 had -- we would have gone and testified had we
 15 known about it, but it was done before we knew
 16 anything.
 17 Q. You are not contending here today, are
 18 you, Mary, that annexation was in any way
 19 illegal?
 20 A. I have no idea. I know nothing on the
 21 law about that. I just know what happened, of
 22 what we understood, just as neighbors.
 23 Q. You understood that the annexation has
 24 occurred?
 25 A. I assume it had. But because we didn't

1 I have no further questions at this
 2 time.
 3 THE WITNESS: Okay.
 4 MR. FEREDAY: Mr. Smith, or the other
 5 Smith may want to ask you some questions now,
 6 Mary.
 7 MR. SMITH: Questions?
 8 MR. ALAN SMITH: Oh, I only have a
 9 couple here, Mary.
 10 EXAMINATION
 11 QUESTIONS BY MR. ALAN SMITH:
 12 Q. How far is your property from the
 13 Legacy Subdivision? Can you give us an estimate;
 14 a half mile, or a mile?
 15 A. One mile south as the bird flies.
 16 MR. FEREDAY: Excuse me, Counsel. You
 17 asked about the Legacy Subdivision?
 18 MR. ALAN SMITH: Yes.
 19 MR. FEREDAY: Okay.
 20 Q. (BY MR. ALAN SMITH) Was there test
 21 pumping done, involving your property?
 22 A. Yes.
 23 Q. And --
 24 A. We were told there was.
 25 Q. How did you find out about that?

Page 23

1 A. The Department put out an order to the
 2 City of Eagle, and in that order they were told
 3 to notify all protestants and the Department so
 4 that we could monitor our wells, and that the
 5 Department would be present when the pump testing
 6 was done.
 7 Q. And were you notified?
 8 A. No, we were not.
 9 Q. How did you find out about the test
 10 pumping?
 11 A. Word of mouth.
 12 Q. And did you observe any impacts to your
 13 well as a result of that test pumping?
 14 A. At the time the supposed pump tests
 15 were done, my static water level changed, yes.
 16 Q. Do you know how much, or did you have
 17 any measurements made?
 18 A. I did have -- there are measurements,
 19 and I think it dropped from -- this is a
 20 guesstimate. As I recall, those are things that
 21 I can bring copies. I didn't think that was part
 22 of what I was going to be asked about. I think
 23 it dropped from, roughly, 45 to 75 feet.
 24 Q. So you had about a 30-foot drop --
 25 A. Yes.

Page 24

1 Q. -- in the water?
 2 A. Yes, which is dramatic and
 3 unprecedented, from when I've been keeping track
 4 of my well.
 5 Q. Do you know what the amount of water to
 6 be appropriated in the Legacy Subdivision is?
 7 A. I think their application was for 8.9,
 8 but they were given 2.9, I think, from the
 9 Department, if my memory serves me correct.
 10 Q. Where was that test pumping done?
 11 A. It was on wells -- they are about
 12 halfway between Palmer and Linder, and I would
 13 say about halfway between Floating Feather and
 14 44. Pretty much, in the center of the Legacy
 15 property.
 16 MR. ALAN SMITH: I think that's all I
 17 have.
 18 MR. FEREDAY: Before we proceed with
 19 you, Bruce, I would just like to make sure that
 20 we have introduced Exhibit H, and ask the witness
 21 to identify that.
 22 FURTHER EXAMINATION
 23 QUESTIONS BY MR. FEREDAY:
 24 Q. Is this the Notice of Deposition?
 25 A. Yes.

1 meeting that you had to discuss the concerns over
 2 water in North Ada County. Do you recall those
 3 questions?
 4 A. Uh-huh.
 5 Q. By the way, you have to say, yes.
 6 A. Yes.
 7 Q. Because she can't record a nod. Okay?
 8 A. Yes.
 9 Q. Thank you.
 10 When did that meeting occur?
 11 A. It -- to help me answer the question,
 12 maybe you can help me? When was our hearing
 13 before the Water Resource Department on that
 14 first application of the City? Was that 2007,
 15 '08?
 16 Q. December 2007 is probably about right.
 17 A. '07, so it was after that. So I would
 18 say, it was sometime probably, during 2008.
 19 Q. Let me ask you. Mr. Moyle testified
 20 yesterday about a meeting he had with a number of
 21 individuals about this hearing. Okay? He said,
 22 Mr. Thornton was there. Mary Taylor was there.
 23 Mr. Meissner was there. Alan Smith was there.
 24 And Jason Smith was there. Do you recall that
 25 meeting?

1 Q. Do you recall receiving that?
 2 A. Yes, I do.
 3 MR. FEREDAY: Okay.
 4 EXAMINATION
 5 QUESTIONS BY MR. SMITH:
 6 Q. Good morning, Mary. I'm Bruce --
 7 A. Good morning.
 8 Q. I'm Bruce Smith. I represent the City
 9 of Eagle. It's good to see you again. And so I
 10 only have some clarifying questions based on your
 11 testimony to Mr. Fereday's questions.
 12 What is the purpose of your testimony
 13 at the hearing?
 14 A. Which -- what hearing?
 15 Q. The one that your deposition is being
 16 taken for, in which the protestants to the M3
 17 application have called you as a witness.
 18 A. Okay.
 19 Q. What's the purpose?
 20 A. What's the purpose?
 21 Q. Uh-huh.
 22 A. I suppose my concern about the water,
 23 the availability, the adequacy of the water for
 24 the project.
 25 Q. Okay. You were referring to this

1 A. Yes.
 2 Q. When was that one?
 3 A. I think it was -- the one he was
 4 referring to was last Saturday.
 5 Q. Okay. That's what I'm trying to get
 6 at. Okay. Thank you.
 7 Where did that occur at?
 8 A. At Judge Smith's home.
 9 Q. Who called that meeting?
 10 A. The person who called me was Judge
 11 Smith.
 12 Q. Okay. And besides the people that I
 13 named, was anyone else there?
 14 A. Name them again.
 15 Q. John Thornton, Mary Taylor,
 16 Mr. Meissner, Alan Smith, and Jason Smith.
 17 A. This (indicating) is Jason; is this
 18 right?
 19 MR. JASON SMITH: Uh-huh.
 20 THE WITNESS: There was one other
 21 gentleman there. I can't recall his name. I
 22 never met him before, and I don't remember his
 23 name.
 24 Q. (BY MR. SMITH) What did he look like?
 25 A. Oh, I would say, 70s, medium build. He

1 wasn't wearing glasses.
 2 Q. Did he say anything?
 3 A. He was very quiet. No, he did not say
 4 much.
 5 Q. So who did the talking?
 6 A. I would say, Mr. Moyle did mostly.
 7 I -- there was a John. I assume it's this John
 8 Thornton, because I don't recall his last name.
 9 Q. A very tall gentleman?
 10 A. Dark hair, glasses?
 11 Q. Yes.
 12 A. I would say, Mr. Moyle and Mr. Thornton
 13 did the most talking.
 14 Q. So what did Mr. Thornton have to say?
 15 A. He gave a review of the process, up to
 16 this point.
 17 Q. Of what process?
 18 A. Of the hearing we are giving the
 19 deposition for.
 20 Q. So he went through the steps and the
 21 hearing?
 22 A. Yes, just a skeletal sketch of what
 23 they are going through.
 24 Q. Okay. Did he say anything else?
 25 A. I mean, we visited. No, not substance

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1 that I can think of, that would help in this
 2 process. I mean, we visited about the weather.
 3 Q. Okay. What did Mr. Moyle say?
 4 A. Mr. Moyle visited -- shared with us
 5 that legislation I mentioned earlier. But you
 6 gentlemen probably know, especially, you, better
 7 than myself. As I say, it started with
 8 somebody's name that started with an H.
 9 Q. Judge Hurlbutt?
 10 A. The legislation is called by that, as I
 11 recall.
 12 Q. Would that be Judge Hurlbutt?
 13 A. Hurlbutt is the name I remember. I
 14 don't remember him being referred to as a judge.
 15 But it seems as though the legislation was
 16 something of that sort, that name.
 17 Q. Okay. What did Mr. Moyle say about
 18 that legislation?
 19 A. He was just sharing with us that that
 20 law had been passed. I don't know how long ago.
 21 He didn't say. But it was on the books.
 22 Q. And what was the relevance of that law
 23 to the proceeding that we have before us now?
 24 A. It had to do with the adjudication, I
 25 assume, of the Snake River basin. When we had

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1 all that adjudication years ago through the
 2 Department of Water Resources. You had to go in,
 3 I think, and file your water rights, and they
 4 were clearing up -- as I recall that
 5 adjudication, it was clearing up water right
 6 ownerships.
 7 Q. In your opinion, was Mr. Moyle there as
 8 a representative in the legislature?
 9 A. No.
 10 Q. Was he there as an individual?
 11 A. Yes.
 12 Q. Okay. Did he say anything else, other
 13 than talking about the statute?
 14 A. Well, we visited a lot about all the
 15 issues in our neighborhood, how we were all
 16 concerned about water, and resources in that
 17 area. But it was very general. It was nothing
 18 specific that I can call to mind.
 19 Q. Did he offer any opinions?
 20 A. Not that I could recall, no.
 21 Q. Okay. Did you talk about the City of
 22 Eagle?
 23 A. I would say, the conversation involved
 24 more around M3, and this project.
 25 Q. Okay.

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1 A. That's my opinion. Or that's what I
 2 heard. That's how I heard it.
 3 Q. But you were at the meeting, so you
 4 heard the conversation?
 5 A. Yes, that's what I heard.
 6 Q. And you participated in the
 7 conversation?
 8 A. Yes.
 9 Q. And that was last Saturday?
 10 A. Yes.
 11 Q. Did you plan at that meeting for your
 12 testimony?
 13 A. No.
 14 Q. Did Judge Smith have anything to say to
 15 you?
 16 A. Other than just his experience through
 17 the hearing, no. He had nothing to say about
 18 this (indicating).
 19 Q. This being, what?
 20 A. This deposition.
 21 Q. Okay.
 22 A. In fact, I would have to say, he made
 23 it quite clear as a retired judge, he was unable
 24 to do anything like that.
 25 Q. Like what?

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1 A. To advise, or help, or counsel, or
 2 anything of that nature. He was just another
 3 private citizen at a meeting, with concerns about
 4 our property and rights.
 5 Q. So you think you were asked to be a
 6 witness, because you protested the City of
 7 Eagle's prior application?
 8 A. I -- yes.
 9 Q. Do you understand that this is a
 10 different application; correct?
 11 A. Yes.
 12 Q. Other than at that meeting on Saturday,
 13 with the people that you've indicated, have you
 14 talked to anybody else about this proceeding?
 15 A. No. Well, I told my husband.
 16 Q. What did you tell him?
 17 A. I told him I had a meeting this morning
 18 with you.
 19 Q. So you knew I was going to be here?
 20 A. I suspected.
 21 Q. You were talking about the annexation
 22 process, and you said, if you had known about it,
 23 the annexation of M3, you would have protested?
 24 A. If I had known about the piece of
 25 property north of us that had been purchased, I

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1 assume purchased from Mr. Hanson, yes, we would
 2 have gone and testified.
 3 Q. What would you have protested?
 4 A. My concern about making a way to annex
 5 the big part of M3.
 6 Q. So you didn't like the way M3 was
 7 annexed; is that correct?
 8 A. I hate to see M3 annexed into the City
 9 at all, period.
 10 Q. And why is that?
 11 A. Because of the size of the project, and
 12 because that project is going to take resources.
 13 It's going to have to take it from someplace.
 14 And I'm concerned it will be at our expense.
 15 Meaning all of us, who have protested, and have
 16 not protested.
 17 Q. So are you opposed to that development
 18 of the foothills?
 19 A. Yes.
 20 Q. In general?
 21 A. The size of it, yes.
 22 Q. So if M3 hadn't been annexed into the
 23 city of Eagle, you would have protested M3's
 24 development anyway?
 25 A. Rephrase -- give me that question,

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1 again.
 2 Q. You are opposed to the M3 project; are
 3 you not?
 4 A. The size of it, yes.
 5 Q. Okay. And so it's the project, not the
 6 annexation into Eagle that you are concerned
 7 about?
 8 A. No, I'm opposed to that as well.
 9 Because once it's annexed into the city of Eagle,
 10 the City of Eagle will have to provide all the
 11 responsibilities for the resources.
 12 Q. Okay. How do you know that?
 13 A. Because the City of Eagle is a
 14 municipality. And any land within its city
 15 limits, it's responsible for providing certain
 16 services.
 17 Q. I don't recall. Are you within the
 18 city limits?
 19 A. No.
 20 Q. So why are you concerned about the City
 21 of Eagle providing services?
 22 A. Because it's going to take it from
 23 someplace else. I --
 24 Q. Go ahead.
 25 A. No. No. No.

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1 Q. I don't mean to interrupt.
 2 A. No. Go ahead.
 3 Q. I want to give you a hypothetical, and
 4 I want you to explain it to me.
 5 A. Okay.
 6 Q. Your concern, as I hear it, is that the
 7 City of Eagle will have to provide services to
 8 M3?
 9 A. Yes.
 10 Q. But you are not a member of the City of
 11 Eagle?
 12 A. No.
 13 Q. You are a citizen; correct?
 14 A. I'm not in -- my land is not in the
 15 city limits.
 16 Q. So if the M3 project went forward, and
 17 the City of Eagle was not providing services, who
 18 would provide services?
 19 A. I don't believe it can go forward
 20 without services.
 21 Q. Okay. The question was, who would
 22 provide the services if --
 23 A. They would have to provide their own.
 24 Q. And that would be okay?
 25 A. Not necessarily.

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1 Q. Could you explain that?
 2 A. It would depend on where they are going
 3 to get their services from. If they are drawing
 4 out of the same aquifer that the City of Eagle,
 5 and myself, and all the other people do, I would
 6 have grave concerns.
 7 Q. So any development that draws from the
 8 same aquifer as you do, you would oppose?
 9 A. At that size, yes.
 10 Q. Okay. At what level do you not oppose
 11 the development?
 12 A. When a hydrologist or a geologist can
 13 guarantee me that there is water there for all of
 14 us, and since hydrology and geology are not exact
 15 sciences, I haven't found one yet that can do
 16 that. So I would have reservations. I don't
 17 know how far.
 18 Q. How far -- I'm talking about size --
 19 A. Right. Right. Right.
 20 Q. We're talking about anything -- let me
 21 finish.
 22 A. Okay.
 23 Q. We're talking from one acre to 6,000
 24 acres, is there any threshold in there, in which
 25 you don't oppose development?

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1 A. That would have to be on an individual
 2 case basis.
 3 Q. Okay. So size doesn't matter?
 4 A. It depends on the project; each
 5 individual project.
 6 Q. Okay. Is it fair to say, that you are
 7 concerned about the size of the M3 project?
 8 A. Yes.
 9 Q. And that would be regardless of who
 10 provides services to it?
 11 A. Yes.
 12 Q. You also made it, I think, in response
 13 to the question, do you have concerns about the
 14 land use decisions of the City of Eagle? And I
 15 indicated in my notes, that you said, yes.
 16 A. Yes.
 17 Q. Okay. What are those concerns?
 18 A. The type of developments that they have
 19 approved in the last couple years. Primarily,
 20 being that they've approved large lot acreage
 21 approvals near to the city center, and they are
 22 doing high density -- very high density
 23 developments out in the western part of their
 24 city limits.
 25 Q. Can you give me some examples?

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1 A. Yes, the Corinthian Home -- and I don't
 2 know what it is called now. It is that 200, 300
 3 acre plot there, on the corner of 16th and Beacon
 4 Light. They approved high density there, versus
 5 Cove Colony, versus Buckhorn, of course, I don't
 6 think Buckhorn is in the city, versus Cove
 7 Colony, versus -- what's that other one east of
 8 it. Some others that are large lot, larger lot
 9 developments, and they are putting high density
 10 out at the west end.
 11 Q. So you oppose high density
 12 developments?
 13 A. Outside certain -- yeah. Yeah. When
 14 you got that city core, you've got low density.
 15 And here, right out there in the ag part of it,
 16 you have high density, yeah.
 17 Q. And when you mention Cove Colony, do
 18 you consider that high density?
 19 A. No, that's lower density. Those lots
 20 are half acre, I think, at least.
 21 Q. So do you think the City should be
 22 having low density developments?
 23 A. I think as you leave -- I'm not a
 24 planner, my opinion.
 25 Q. I understand this is your opinion.

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1 A. As you leave the city, the higher
 2 density should be around the city core. And the
 3 farther out you go, the lower the density should
 4 be. And in my opinion, Eagle is hodge-podging,
 5 and just whatever fits, or whoever comes in with
 6 some type of project, they have no continuity.
 7 Q. What do you mean by "continuity"?
 8 A. They don't go from high density, to
 9 medium density, to lower density, to large
 10 densities.
 11 Q. Okay. You made the comment that M3 is
 12 asking for a huge amount of water. Do you recall
 13 that?
 14 A. As I recall, when they first made their
 15 applications for water rights, I thought it was
 16 something around 45 cubic feet per second;
 17 roughly, around that number.
 18 Q. And do you know what the present
 19 requested water right is?
 20 A. I'm guessing, it's probably 20.
 21 Q. And why are you guessing that?
 22 A. Going by what you had asked for before,
 23 for the City of Eagle, versus the size of this
 24 project. I'm thinking it's got to be at least
 25 double what you asked for before.

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1 Q. Okay. So other than the size of M3, is
 2 there anything else about the annexation of M3
 3 into the City of Eagle that you object to?
 4 A. Based on hearings at the City of Eagle,
 5 and people who have testified, who are
 6 developers, and they've made the comment that if
 7 Eagle never annexed another drop of land, they've
 8 got at least 20 to 30 years build out on what
 9 they have already annexed and approved in the way
 10 of projects. I'm going by other people who know
 11 more about development than me.
 12 Q. My question was, what you would object
 13 to.
 14 A. Okay. Rephrase the question.
 15 MR. SMITH: Would the reporter read
 16 back the question to Ms. Taylor?
 17 (The reporter read back the following
 18 requested testimony: "Q. Okay. So other than
 19 the size of M3, is there anything else about the
 20 annexation of M3 into the City of Eagle that you
 21 object to?")
 22 THE WITNESS: Yes, I think the City of
 23 Eagle has plenty to work with at their present
 24 size, more than they can accommodate.
 25 Q. (BY MR. SMITH) So if an individual

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1 with a piece of property that wanted to develop,
 2 came to the City of Eagle, and said, I would like
 3 to annex into the city of Eagle. Do you think
 4 that that should be prohibited?
 5 A. My first question would be, what is the
 6 size of the project?
 7 Q. Let me ask it this -- why does that
 8 matter? Let me make sure you understand what I'm
 9 asking.
 10 An individual with private property
 11 approaches the City of Eagle, and says, I would
 12 like to annex. Do you think that should be
 13 prohibited?
 14 A. If I sat on the city council, I would
 15 take a long hard look of what my resources are
 16 available, whether I could accommodate what they
 17 are going to need with their project. And if I
 18 don't have adequate water, or if I don't have
 19 adequate fire, or I don't have adequate sewer,
 20 then as a city, I would have to say, we are not
 21 able to annex your property right now, because we
 22 don't have the resources to supply the needs you
 23 are going to present us with.
 24 Q. And if there is a plan for providing
 25 those resources, then the annexation would be

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1 appropriate, in your opinion?
 2 A. It goes back to the question of who is
 3 it going to damage? Who are they taking it from
 4 to provide for that project?
 5 Q. Ms. Taylor, I'm having a really
 6 difficult time understanding some of the approach
 7 that you are taking. If we have a parcel of land
 8 that will be developed, private ground that will
 9 be developed. And you are concerned about the
 10 resources that that development will take;
 11 correct?
 12 A. Yes.
 13 Q. Why does it matter? If there is a plan
 14 for providing the resources, the services for
 15 that parcel, whether it comes from the City of
 16 Eagle, or anyone else, why does the annexation
 17 matter?
 18 MR. ALAN SMITH: We would object to the
 19 question. It's already been asked and answered.
 20 You can go ahead and answer, if you
 21 can.
 22 THE WITNESS: I'm not a city planner.
 23 I'm not a city councilmen. I'm an expert in
 24 nothing, except maybe commonsense. And when I
 25 see a city, whose city's limits are as big as

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1 Eagle's, and now they want to take on a project
 2 that's going to more than double that. Why
 3 wouldn't I have concerns about resources? Why
 4 would I wonder and question, whether the City can
 5 really provide, when they have to fire policemen,
 6 they have to shut the library, why wouldn't I
 7 question whether they have the resources to
 8 provide for any kind of that development?
 9 Q. Let me go back to my question, please.
 10 I said, if there is a plan for
 11 providing the services, and whether the plan is
 12 for the City to provide them, or someone else to
 13 provide them, what does the issue of
 14 annexation -- what is the problem with
 15 annexation?
 16 A. Because what I have seen over the past
 17 years, with our issue with the first water right,
 18 and now this one is, I don't see where there are
 19 the resources available. I personally question
 20 the plan, because everybody tells me, this is a
 21 project. This is a projection. This is a model.
 22 This is a guess. And so I -- there is no
 23 assurance to me that there can be those resources
 24 available for it.
 25 Q. So it's a question of the availability

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1 of resources, not the question of annexation, per
 2 se?
 3 A. Resources is my first concern.
 4 Q. Regardless of who provides them?
 5 A. Exactly. Exactly.
 6 Q. Okay. That's what --
 7 A. Yes, I will agree with that.
 8 Q. I'm sorry. I don't mean to speak over
 9 you.
 10 So anyway, I was trying to understand
 11 that. I think I have that down so --
 12 A. The resources are my concern.
 13 Q. Okay.
 14 A. May I ask a question?
 15 Q. Let me suggest this -- well, you can go
 16 ahead and ask the question. The deposition is
 17 not designed for you asking questions. But go
 18 ahead, for the record, and ask your question.
 19 A. As a representative of the City of
 20 Eagle -- well, let me wait a minute here. As a
 21 representative of the City of Eagle, aren't you
 22 required by law, as a City, to provide services
 23 to anything you annex?
 24 Q. We have your question, and I will
 25 answer it off the record.

1 Q. That pump test, and that whole episode
 2 involved the City of Eagle's water right
 3 application; did it not?
 4 A. Yes.
 5 MR. FEREDAY: No questions at this
 6 point.
 7 MR. ALAN SMITH: I just have a couple
 8 more, Ms. Taylor.
 9 FURTHER EXAMINATION
 10 QUESTIONS BY MR. ALAN SMITH:
 11 Q. Is your concern of the size of the M3
 12 project, also, related to the quantity of water
 13 they are going to want?
 14 A. Absolutely.
 15 Q. And is there any uncertainty in your
 16 mind that your well will be adversely impacted by
 17 these other pumping areas?
 18 MR. FEREDAY: We would just object,
 19 just interpose an objection, that she's
 20 unqualified to answer the question.
 21 But you can go ahead.
 22 THE WITNESS: Yes.
 23 MR. ALAN SMITH: That's all I have.
 24 MR. SMITH: I have no further
 25 questions.

1 There was one question that you, also,
 2 answered. You talked about people pumping, and
 3 they were not regulated by the PUC. That no one
 4 was monitoring the pumping. Do you recall that?
 5 A. That's not what my statement was.
 6 Q. Okay. Do you recall what you were
 7 talking about?
 8 A. Yes.
 9 Q. What were you talking about?
 10 A. Municipalities are not regulated by PUC
 11 on the water issue.
 12 Q. Okay. And do you think that the PUC
 13 monitors pumping?
 14 A. I don't know that.
 15 MR. SMITH: I don't have any further
 16 questions. Thank you very much.
 17 MR. FEREDAY: I just have one follow-up
 18 question.
 19 FURTHER EXAMINATION
 20 QUESTIONS BY MR. FEREDAY:
 21 Q. Ms. Taylor, you mentioned in response
 22 to questions from Judge Smith, this pump test
 23 episode, where you experienced drawdown in your
 24 well; do you recall that?
 25 A. Yes.

1 MR. FEREDAY: Thank you very much.
 2 MR. ALAN SMITH: Thank you, Mary.
 3 (Deposition concluded at 10:46 a.m.)

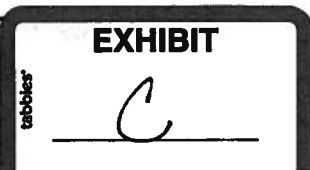

 6 Q. So your well had physical problems that
 7 wouldn't allow him to get his tool down into the
 8 well; is that right?
 9 A. Right, he couldn't get all the way
 10 down, because it was sand packed in the bottom.
 11 Q. Mr. Meissner, you have brought a group
 12 of documents here that I would like to have
 13 marked as Exhibit J.
 14 MR. LAWRENCE: J.
 15 (Exhibit J marked.)
 16 Q. (BY MR. FEREDAY) Could you tell us
 17 what those documents show?
 18 A. Oh, those documents showed the expenses
 19 that I went through to get new water rights and a
 20 new well.
 21 Q. For your replacement well; correct?
 22 A. (Witness nodding head.)
 23 Q. You have to actually say, yes.
 24 A. Oh, yes.
 25 Q. What about this videotape that you have

1 Q. Mr. Meissner, are you familiar with the
 2 district court's order, remanding this matter to
 3 the Department of Water Resources for a hearing
 4 on limited issues?
 5 A. Not really.
 6 Q. Have you heard of such an order?
 7 A. I have heard of something, but it's
 8 hearsay. I haven't seen an order.
 9 Q. I would like to show you what's been
 10 marked as Exhibit D, which is a pre-hearing
 11 order, Mr. Meissner, which includes in its last
 12 sentence on page 2, the following statement in
 13 part.
 14 At the hearing, "the parties shall not
 15 conduct discovery or offer evidence at the
 16 hearing concerning other matters such as
 17 technical water supply issues, hydrogeology, and
 18 potential injury from pumping."
 19 Have you ever seen this report before?
 20 A. No, I haven't.
 21 Q. Did Mr. Alan Smith discuss this with
 22 you --
 23 A. No.
 24 Q. -- before your appearance here?
 25 A. No. No.

1 Q. Did you understand that the hearing in
2 this matter is limited, and does not include
3 issues of hydrology and injury to wells? Did you
4 understand that?
5 A. No.
6 Q. I would like to show you what's been
7 marked as Exhibit E, please. And I'm referring
8 now to page 2 of Exhibit E. Do you see that?
9 A. Yes, I do.
10 Q. It's three numbered items. I'll
11 represent to you that this is interim director
12 Spackman's order, again, limiting the scope of
13 this hearing to these three items.
14 Do you see item one, evidence
15 establishing that the M3 Eagle project has been
16 annexed by the City of Eagle?
17 A. Yes.
18 Q. Do you have any information, any facts
19 that you know, that relate to that, that you
20 would testify to at this hearing?
21 A. No, I don't.
22 Q. How about No. 2, "Evidence related to
23 the City of Eagle's planning horizon and the
24 reasonable anticipated future municipal needs for
25 the City of Eagle service area, including M3

1 Eagle application?
2 A. The scope of my testimony would be,
3 what I was damaged by the last water rights that
4 was issued.
5 Q. And that would include discussion of
6 the expenses that you have incurred, as outlined
7 in Exhibit J, for constructing a replacement
8 well; would that be correct?
9 A. Uh-huh, yes.
10 Q. What else would you testify to?
11 Anything else?
12 A. Other than that, it's all hearsay. I
13 couldn't testify to anything, other than that.
14 Q. Okay. Do you understand that the City
15 of Eagle has annexed the M3 project area into the
16 City?
17 A. I have heard that they had. It's all
18 hearsay. I am not aware of a fact that they
19 have.
20 Q. Okay.
21 A. I mean, there is all kinds of
22 discussions around the neighborhood about, well,
23 they did this, and they did that, and did that.
24 I don't know for a fact that they have.
25 Q. Okay.

4 Have you got any facts, or do you know
5 of any information that you would testify to at
6 the hearing that relates to item 2?
7 A. No.
8 Q. What about item 3, sir, "Information on
9 the quantity of water appropriated for permit
10 No. 63-32573 appurtenant to the M3 project in
11 relationship to water needs of the City's service
12 area."
13 Do you know anything about that, or
14 have any information that you would testify to at
15 the hearing, relative to that point?
16 A. No, I don't.
17 Q. Did you discuss these three items with
18 any other person?
19 A. No, that's the first time I've seen it.
20 Q. You are not an expert on municipal
21 water use; are you?
22 A. No. The only thing I know is, I've
23 been damaged from previous water use.
24 Q. What matters do you expect to testify
25 about at the hearing next week on the M3, City of

1 A. I assume that they did. But then you
2 know how assume is.
3 Q. Do you intend to testify at the hearing
4 next week with regard to the annexation of M3
5 Eagle?
6 A. I hadn't intended on it, no. The scope
7 of my testimony would be on the damage that was
8 done to my well.
9 Q. Okay.
10 A. That's the only thing I know for a
11 fact.
12 Q. Do you understand that this M3
13 application has been assigned to the City of
14 Eagle?
15 A. I have no idea.
16 Q. Have you seen or evaluated any
17 information with regard to reasonably anticipated
18 future needs, that the City of Eagle might have
19 with regard to water?
20 A. With regard to water, yes, I have. And
21 that has to do with the case that -- the previous
22 case with Legacy.
23 Q. What was the nature of that
24 information?
25 A. That they were asking for a lot more

1 water than they needed. I mean, that was my
 2 opinion on it.
 3 Q. With regard to the concept, though, of
 4 reasonably anticipated future needs, have you
 5 ever seen any analysis, specifically, addressing
 6 that question?
 7 A. I am not -- I'm not a soothsayer. We
 8 cannot, any of us, predict the future. I mean,
 9 look what's happened in the last four years.
 10 Q. Do you understand, though, that City's
 11 and other water purveyors do plan for the future?
 12 A. Yeah, I understand they do try to
 13 anticipate. You know, and there we go,
 14 anticipate and assume. We can't put that in the
 15 bag. If it happens, it happens.
 16 Q. So I take it that your answer is that,
 17 no, you have not evaluated any future needs water
 18 right for the City of Eagle?
 19 A. I'm not a -- I'm not a soothsayer. I
 20 can't see into the future.
 21 Q. So that's a, no, you haven't done that
 22 evaluation?
 23 A. No. I don't think anybody can. I
 24 mean, everybody can procrastinate and propagate,
 25 and everything else that they do. And oh,

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1 listen. We're going to do this, and we're going
 2 to do that. Well, if it happens, it happens.
 3 Q. What do you know about planning
 4 horizons with regard to municipal water rights?
 5 A. Nothing. It's not my field of study.
 6 MR. FEREDAY: No further questions.
 7 THE WITNESS: Okay.
 8 EXAMINATION
 9 QUESTIONS BY MR. ALAN SMITH:
 10 Q. You were protesting in the Legacy case;
 11 were you not, Mr. Meissner?
 12 A. Yes, I was.
 13 Q. Was that Water Permits 13-2089 and
 14 13-2090, if you recall?
 15 A. I don't recall the exact numbers, but
 16 that sounds about right. Yeah.
 17 Q. And what damages have you suffered as a
 18 result of Legacy's pumping?
 19 A. My well went dry.
 20 Q. Can you explain to us, or give us some
 21 idea of what pumping was going on at Legacy, and
 22 when that started, and when you started having
 23 problems with your well?
 24 A. They were -- they were doing testing,
 25 and they were going to --

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1 MR. FEREDAY: We're going to object to
 2 this line of questioning. As you know, this is
 3 outside the scope of the hearing. And I don't
 4 think it's reasonably calculated to lead to
 5 relevant evidence.
 6 And you can go ahead and answer.
 7 MR. ALAN SMITH: The objection is noted
 8 for the record.
 9 You can go ahead and answer.
 10 THE WITNESS: Okay. Yeah, they were
 11 pumping the wells, flushing out the systems, and
 12 pumping the wells. And every time they would
 13 pump the wells, my water level would go down.
 14 And what happened was, the bottom of my well got
 15 hydrologically impacted.
 16 There was some sand on the bottom of
 17 it, which had never been a problem. It had been
 18 pumping out of that well for 20 years. And when
 19 the water level started fluctuating as much as it
 20 did, which was a whole lot more than they
 21 predicted, and it packed the sand in the bottom
 22 of the well like concrete, and couldn't pull
 23 water through it, and the well went dry.
 24 Do you want me to go on and explain?
 25 Q. (BY MR. ALAN SMITH) Yes, if you would.

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1 A. They did find about a three-eighths
 2 inch hole in the screen at the bottom of the
 3 well. We finally got everything jerked out of
 4 there, and that was allowing some sand to come
 5 in. And when the water table would fluctuate as
 6 much as it was, there was a 130 foot column of
 7 water that impacted the sand in the bottom of the
 8 well.
 9 If you pull it one way through the
 10 sand, it's a great filter. It doesn't cause a
 11 problem. But when you pack down on it, it
 12 becomes like concrete. That is what had happened
 13 to my well.
 14 Q. And what did you have to expend in the
 15 way of money to repair that well?
 16 A. \$43,542, and that does not include the
 17 payment to Ed Squires. I couldn't find that
 18 check.
 19 MR. ALAN SMITH: Okay. I think that's
 20 all I have.
 21 Q. (BY MR. ALAN SMITH) What was your
 22 payment to Ed Squires for?
 23 A. That was for inspecting the well, to
 24 see what he could find out. There is a
 25 videotape.

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1 Q. The videotape shows that?
2 A. To make sure there was no real problem
3 with the well. He couldn't find a problem with
4 the well.
5 MR. JASON SMITH: Do you remember,
6 ballpark-wise, what it cost you for Ed Squires?
7 THE WITNESS: It was around 2,000 or
8 2,500 bucks.
9 MR. JASON SMITH: Okay.
10 MR. ALAN SMITH: That's all we have,
11 Mr. Smith.
12 MR. FEREDAY: Bruce, if I could go out
13 of order, I have one brief question here, maybe
14 two.
15 FURTHER EXAMINATION
16 QUESTIONS BY MR. FEREDAY:
17 Q. Mr. Meissner, I would like you to refer
18 to the exhibit that you produced here, Exhibit J,
19 the very last page of it. Here we have an email
20 from Ed Squires to you.
21 A. Yes.
22 Q. That's dated this morning?
23 A. Uh-huh.
24 Q. You recognize that?
25 A. Yeah, I just -- yeah, I just took it

1 off the email.
2 Q. And that email says, "Dear Chuck, We
3 were never able to find anything out about your
4 well. The water column was dirty and could not
5 be cleared by adding water because the well would
6 not take any water. Therefore we were not able
7 to video anything useful and did not invoice you,
8 because we did not provide a product. You hired
9 a driller for advice that was contrary to the way
10 we would have recommended you to proceed. So we
11 never really connected on any work, and we have
12 no findings. That is why you have no records."
13 Is that accurate, sir?
14 A. No, because that's not the advice that
15 he gave me. And he did videotape it.
16 Q. And he did invoice you --
17 A. Yes, he did.
18 Q. -- is your testimony?
19 A. And I paid him.
20 Q. And is there a record of that payment
21 in here?
22 A. No, I couldn't find it.
23 Q. You couldn't find it?
24 A. No. Who knows? I've got eight or nine
25 checkbooks, and I couldn't find it. It's

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1 somewhere.
2 Q. I'm really asking you this question,
3 just to inquire as to how you recall events with
4 regard to your experience. But, so, your
5 testimony is, that you did pay him about \$2,000?
6 A. Yeah, approximately, that, yeah, to the
7 best of my memory.
8 MR. FEREDAY: No further questions.
9 FURTHER EXAMINATION
10 QUESTIONS BY MR. ALAN SMITH:
11 Q. But you know of your own knowledge,
12 Mr. Meissner, that you did, in fact, pay Ed
13 Squires for that work?
14 A. Yes, I did. Yeah, I was invoiced for
15 it.
16 Q. And does the advice that he gave you
17 appear on that videotape?
18 A. No, that's just a videotape of the down
19 hole. There was some paper work and stuff that
20 came with it, that, basically, they couldn't find
21 any real damage to the casing. You know, there
22 was some rust and stuff on the inside of it, and
23 he explained that. I couldn't find it.
24 I mean, that pile of stuff over in the
25 corner is -- and, you know, how it is when you

5 QUESTIONS BY MR. SMITH:
6 Q. Mr. Meissner, I'm Bruce Smith. I
7 represent the City of Eagle. Good seeing you
8 again.
9 A. Yeah. Did you bring a check?
10 Q. For?
11 A. For this. Don't they just give you a
12 check to write out to me, so I don't have to hire
13 another lawyer to go after it?
14 Q. No, I don't believe a brought a check
15 for you.
16 A. I was hoping to save me another 10,000.
17 Q. Before I ask you some questions. My
18 copies of Exhibit J, I can't read. Could I see
19 what the original is like, to see if I have any
20 questions?
21 A. Yes.
22 Q. Mr. Meissner, with regard to Exhibit J,
23 the documents you brought, there is a page 1,
24 this entry that's marked in pink. It says, "work
25 on the old well." And that, I believe, is that

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1 to Koontz Well Drilling?
 2 A. Yes.
 3 Q. For the \$3,275?
 4 A. Yes.
 5 Q. What's that for?
 6 A. He's the first one I called in after Ed
 7 Squires finished up, to try to fix the well.
 8 Q. What did he do?
 9 A. He went down, tried to flush out the
 10 bottom of the well. He had some success. Then
 11 he tried to pull the screens, and couldn't do it.
 12 So he referred me over to the other well
 13 drillers, because they had a cable tool that they
 14 could pull the screens with.
 15 Q. So on the first two pages, which is a
 16 series of entries. That is the only one in here,
 17 the first two pages, that relates to the well;
 18 correct?
 19 A. No, there is more than that.
 20 Q. Well, I --
 21 A. The \$33,000 I paid him, and he's the
 22 one who had the cable to it, and he was out there
 23 for about a year trying to repair that old well.
 24 And finally, they just couldn't repair it.
 25 Q. Okay. I now see that it's the one

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1 A. That well log was a deepening of my
 2 well. And it was filed in the wrong coordinates,
 3 and the wrong name.
 4 Q. Who is Bob Stoner or Stoney?
 5 A. I have no idea who that is. I know Bob
 6 Storey.
 7 Q. Storey, who is that?
 8 A. He was the owner of the -- he is the
 9 one that built the chicken huts up there. It's
 10 Storey Egg Company that built an egg farm,
 11 basically. And then when they needed the water
 12 for the egg farm, then they had that original
 13 well deepened, and that's what that report is.
 14 Because that well was only 180-foot deep to begin
 15 with. And it was deepened down to 315 feet, and
 16 that was in 1980.
 17 Q. Mr. Meissner, just for the record, I'm
 18 looking at this. And it says, the casing went
 19 from 67 to 304 feet; is that correct?
 20 A. Uh-huh.
 21 Q. Okay.
 22 A. And then screens beyond that, so...
 23 Q. So it's your testimony that this is,
 24 basically, your well; correct?
 25 A. That is my well, yes.

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1 that's not marked for the record. It's on page
 2 2, the third entry from the bottom, it looks like
 3 it's Check No. 112 for \$33,387. Does that sound
 4 correct?
 5 A. Yes.
 6 Q. And page 3, it looks like a copy of the
 7 check entry for where you paid him; is that
 8 correct?
 9 A. Yes.
 10 Q. Okay. Page 4 looks like another check
 11 to a pump company for 6,880. Does that sound
 12 correct?
 13 A. That's the Burgess pump.
 14 Q. Okay. That's --
 15 A. That's for the pump, and the
 16 pipe -- and the pump that went into the new well.
 17 Q. So that's for your new pump and casing.
 18 Okay. And then the next page is a well driller's
 19 report from, it says, Bob Stoner, Stoney?
 20 A. Yeah, that's what it looks like. And
 21 that was one of the problems, because it's the
 22 right well, but it was entered improperly. Now,
 23 the only -- when this other hearing went on, he
 24 didn't have that well log.
 25 Q. What is this well log?

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1 Q. Okay.
 2 A. And that took some serious hunting.
 3 Q. I'm sorry?
 4 A. I didn't know that the well was that
 5 deep, until Ed Squires ran through there. This
 6 well is deeper than what it's supposed to be.
 7 And I said, well, it's the right well. Then
 8 started looking, and I found that well driller's
 9 report, which had been improperly filed.
 10 Q. So Mr. Squires found this?
 11 A. Yeah, Ed Squires was the one that found
 12 out that the well was deeper than it was supposed
 13 to be.
 14 Q. Who found the driller's report?
 15 A. What's that?
 16 Q. Who found the driller's report?
 17 A. I found the driller's report. And it's
 18 a lot of fun going through thousands of driller's
 19 reports to find the right one. As you can see on
 20 there, it was filed on the wrong coordinates, and
 21 the wrong name. That makes it interesting to try
 22 to find. But when I contacted Phipps, he said,
 23 oh, yeah, I remember doing that. So then it
 24 was -- verified that we were in the right hole,
 25 with the right well driller's report. And then

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1 there is a copy of a new well driller's report.
 2 The only way I found it was when he marked the
 3 map, he had it marked in the right place, but had
 4 the wrong coordinates on it.
 5 Q. Mr. Meissner, I want to show you, this
 6 is the page that you are talking about for the
 7 well driller's report for Bob Storey. Okay?
 8 A. Uh-huh.
 9 Q. It says, the depth of the well was 315
 10 feet. Do you see that?
 11 A. Right.
 12 Q. The right-hand column, under the
 13 lithologic log?
 14 A. Uh-huh.
 15 Q. Okay. So the next to the last page is
 16 another well driller's report.
 17 A. Yes, that's on my new well.
 18 Q. Okay. That's the work that you had
 19 done by?
 20 A. Dave Phipps.
 21 Q. And that shows that the well was
 22 extended to how far?
 23 A. 348 feet.
 24 Q. Okay. So the well was only deepened 33
 25 feet; correct?

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1 A. Yeah.
 2 Q. Okay.
 3 A. It wasn't deepened. It was a new well.
 4 Q. So this is a brand new well?
 5 A. Yeah, that's a brand new well.
 6 Q. Okay.
 7 A. They couldn't do anything with that
 8 one. They tried to do something with it, and
 9 they ended up tearing the casing up, tearing the
 10 screens up. They left half of it in the ground.
 11 They had to fill in the hole, and drill a new
 12 well.
 13 They spent a year out there trying to
 14 fix that thing, and couldn't do it. They ended
 15 up tearing the casing up two or three times.
 16 They had a 250,000 pound hydraulic jack in that
 17 thing, and ended up tearing the casing apart
 18 several times. They tried. It even tore his rig
 19 up two or three times. Broke the cables and
 20 dropped the tools, and oh, it was a mess. He
 21 gave it the old college try, let's put it that
 22 way.
 23 Q. So how much did you pay to get this new
 24 well drilled?
 25 A. Oh, all and all, \$43,000 to the well

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1 and the pump, and work that we did out there
 2 trying to fix the old well, and drill the new
 3 one.
 4 Q. And on top of that, the 2,300 that you
 5 paid Mr. Squires?
 6 A. Approximately, yeah.
 7 Q. Okay. And then you said, you paid a
 8 lawyer. Is that part of this?
 9 A. I haven't paid a lawyer, not on this
 10 particular -- I mean, the lawyer bills were on
 11 the previous protest, for when the City of Eagle
 12 wanted that water right on Legacy.
 13 Q. Your testimony was, I'm out \$50,000 to
 14 build a well, and lawyer fees on the Legacy
 15 matter. So I'm trying to figure out, was your
 16 lawyer fees \$5,000 for the Legacy matter; is that
 17 what it was?
 18 A. It was more than that.
 19 Q. But for the well, we're talking about
 20 43,000?
 21 A. Yeah, that's actual expenses. That
 22 doesn't include Ed Squires.
 23 Q. Okay. Do you know what your static
 24 water level is now?
 25 A. It's -- the last time I checked, it was

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1 about three months ago, and it was 58 foot.
 2 Q. You are talking about 58 feet from
 3 ground surface; correct?
 4 A. Yes.
 5 Q. Okay. Does it vacillate now?
 6 A. It doesn't seem to.
 7 Q. You testified previously, the comment
 8 was, water levels are fine. They are up and
 9 down. I'm trying to figure out what up and down
 10 means?
 11 A. If I know that somebody is going to be
 12 pumping a lot of water close to me, then you can
 13 see it go up and down.
 14 Q. Are there some big wells close to you?
 15 A. The only ones real close to me is
 16 Legacy.
 17 Q. Okay. So when you are saying somebody
 18 is going to be pumping a lot, that's what you are
 19 talking about?
 20 A. Yes.
 21 Q. And you haven't experienced any
 22 significant increases or decreases in your water
 23 level; is that correct?
 24 A. I did in the old well, yes.
 25 Q. I'm talking about your new well.

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1 A. The new well, no.
 2 Q. Okay.
 3 A. It went down next an actual 35 feet,
 4 and got below that other clay layer. And the
 5 water level seems to be fine there now. I just
 6 hope that I don't have to drill it deeper again.
 7 At least I got a new one to deal with.
 8 Q. But you have a new well? They drilled
 9 it, roughly, the same depth as the old well;
 10 correct?
 11 A. It's a little deeper. We went on
 12 through that clay layer of 315 feet down to the
 13 next clay layer, and then pulling out of that
 14 sand.
 15 Q. Okay.
 16 A. Pulling out of the sand that's below
 17 the 315 feet.
 18 Q. In Mr. Squires email to you today, he
 19 said, you hired a driller for advice that was
 20 contrary to the way we would have recommended you
 21 to proceed, so we didn't connect any work, and we
 22 have no findings. What is Mr. Squires referring
 23 to there?
 24 A. I have no idea what he's talking about,
 25 because he recommended me to get somebody in

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1 there to flush that well. And that's why I
 2 brought Koontz in to flush that, and try to get
 3 it cleared up. That's the 3,000, or whatever, I
 4 paid him.
 5 Q. Uh-huh.
 6 A. And then when he finally give up, and
 7 couldn't do anything, or find anything, he tried
 8 to pull the screens out, and couldn't do it with
 9 the hydraulic -- or with the rotor drill, and he
 10 just couldn't do it.
 11 Q. Okay.
 12 A. So then he suggested I get Phipps in
 13 there, because he had a cable rig that would be
 14 most likely the only one that would be able to
 15 jerk the screens out, and get that well cleared
 16 up.
 17 Q. Okay.
 18 A. I mean, Ed Squires suggested I get
 19 somebody in there to flush the bottom of that
 20 well out, so it could be looked at. And that's
 21 when all the problems -- that's when we
 22 discovered all the problems that were in there.
 23 Q. Okay.
 24 A. That the sand was impacting the bottom
 25 of it. We couldn't pull water through it. It

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1 wouldn't go either direction.
 2 Q. So in your new well, what is your water
 3 level fluctuation?
 4 A. It fluctuates a foot or so right now.
 5 But I only check it about once every three
 6 months. And I don't have any previous knowledge
 7 of somebody doing any testing close to it. I've
 8 got a gauge on it. And I'll go out and pump the
 9 little tube full of air, and it will come up, and
 10 give me the depth of the water.
 11 And the City of Eagle was supposed to
 12 be monitoring my well. And I have not seen
 13 anybody from the City of Eagle out there. I do
 14 my own monitoring. About every three months I go
 15 out and check it. I probably should put it on a
 16 computer, and just let it be continuous.
 17 Q. What makes you say, the City of Eagle
 18 was supposed to be monitoring it?
 19 A. They were ordered to monitor it, so...
 20 Q. Do you know where that came from?
 21 A. Yeah.
 22 Q. Where?
 23 A. It came from the Legacy hearing.
 24 Q. So you think the City was ordered to
 25 come monitor your well?

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1 A. Yes.
 2 Q. Have you ever approached the City about
 3 this?
 4 A. No.
 5 Q. You were asked questions
 6 about -- basically, you were opposed to planning
 7 for future needs in water rights. I had it down
 8 here that you said, no; is that correct?
 9 A. Well, I don't know anything about
 10 future needs. I don't think there is any future
 11 needs. But then whose future are we talking
 12 about? Mine. I only got probably ten years of
 13 life left. You guys, you got 30 or 40 years
 14 left, I mean.
 15 Q. I hope so.
 16 A. Yeah, you hope so. You never know.
 17 When you get into the kind of health I am, and
 18 I'm 66 years old, you know, I'm on Social
 19 Security, retired. I can barely walk from here
 20 to the Capitol building.
 21 Q. I was going to compliment you, you look
 22 like you are in pretty good health.
 23 A. It looks that way on the outside.
 24 Q. I think we're talking about the City's
 25 efforts to plan, is what we're talking about?

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1 A. Yeah. Well, I have no idea what their
 2 plans are.
 3 Q. But you think it's a good thing to
 4 plan?
 5 A. The which now?
 6 Q. You think it is a positive thing to
 7 plan?
 8 A. Oh, yes, it is a positive thing to
 9 plan.
 10 Q. Okay. So when you found this
 11 three-eighths inch hole in your screen that
 12 allowed sand to come in, who found that?
 13 A. Dennis Phipps. When we finally got
 14 part of the screen jerked out, we couldn't get
 15 the whole screen, but he got six or eight feet of
 16 it.
 17 Q. So you actually had a hole in the
 18 screen that allowed the sand to come in?
 19 A. Yeah, that's not a problem. As long as
 20 you are only taking water one way through the
 21 sand. I mean, how do you clean a fish tank?
 22 Sand filters, and you pump water through the
 23 sand.
 24 Q. And do you remember at what level in
 25 the screen, what foot level that that

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1 three-eighths inch hole was?
 2 A. It was right at the well.
 3 Q. What depth?
 4 A. It's, approximately, 316 feet maybe. I
 5 don't know exactly how deep it was. I mean, you
 6 know, the screen section is put together. It's
 7 got a tail piece and a head piece. And then it's
 8 shoved down the well, and then sealed in. And it
 9 was right at the well where the head piece was
 10 welded to the screen. It had probably been there
 11 forever. And I had used the well for 20 years,
 12 and never had a problem with it.
 13 Q. But your water level didn't drop to 316
 14 feet; did it?
 15 A. Yes, it would. It dropped
 16 down -- well, not 316 feet, because my pump was
 17 at 220 feet. And that's as far as it could pump
 18 the water. There just wasn't any water coming
 19 in.
 20 You could run it once a day for three
 21 minutes. That's how much water was coming in my
 22 well. So you could pump about 90 gallons of
 23 water. That was the extent of the well. That's
 24 not enough to supply with water, not even
 25 household water.

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1 Q. And I'm going off recollection. But as
 2 I recall from the previous hearing when we talked
 3 about this, you had not had to do anything to
 4 that well in the years that you were using it;
 5 correct?
 6 A. I had -- no, I hadn't done a thing to
 7 it.
 8 Q. So you hadn't done any repairs, any
 9 maintenance, anything?
 10 A. No.
 11 Q. Okay.
 12 A. Well, I had replaced a pump once when
 13 it burned out, but that was no big deal. I mean,
 14 that's ordinary. That's what happens with a well
 15 pump. After 20 years, they wear out. I replaced
 16 the pump once, but it was replaced at the same
 17 depth.
 18 Q. Explain to me your --
 19 A. It was working.
 20 Q. You are saying the hole in the screen
 21 was not a problem; correct?
 22 A. Yeah, I don't see that there is any
 23 problem with it. Anybody that's familiar with
 24 how water flows through sand, and screens, and
 25 what have you, would probably verify the same

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1 thing.
 2 Q. So in your view, the hole in the screen
 3 wasn't any kind of problem with the functioning
 4 of the well?
 5 A. It hadn't been for 20 years, that I'm
 6 aware of, and that I've been pumping out of that
 7 well.
 8 Q. Do you think your water levels
 9 fluctuated over those years; those 20 years?
 10 A. They didn't appear to. I mean, it
 11 wasn't -- I wasn't monitoring it. But I always
 12 had water, so...
 13 Q. Do you think, maybe, sometimes just the
 14 20- or 30-year-old well needs to be fixed, needs
 15 to be repaired?
 16 A. Only if there is a problem with them.
 17 Q. Okay.
 18 A. I mean, you know, you've got to replace
 19 a pump once in a while. You have to replace a
 20 pipe once in a while. Because commonly right
 21 above the pump, at about three inches above the
 22 pump, you get electrolysis in the pipe, and it
 23 will blow a hole out. That was the main reason
 24 why I had to replace the pump, because it had
 25 blown a hole through the water pipe, which is

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1 common. That happens all the time.
 2 So when the -- okay. We found that.
 3 We're going to have to replace a couple lengths
 4 of pipe. And this pump, it's a three horse, but
 5 it's not pumping like it should. And I do --
 6 Q. So here's \$43,000, that you are saying
 7 that the City damaged -- that was the damage you
 8 incurred. You actually upgraded your system;
 9 correct?
 10 A. Not really. I mean, I've got a
 11 workable system --
 12 Q. But it --
 13 A. -- again.
 14 Q. Let me ask it this way: You found
 15 problems with your old pump, so you put a new
 16 pump in?
 17 A. Yeah, that was 12, 15 years ago.
 18 Q. I thought you put in a new pump as part
 19 of this \$43,000?
 20 A. Yeah, I did. Because the old pump
 21 wouldn't fit in a new casing. I had to go to a
 22 smaller casing.
 23 MR. SMITH: I don't think I have any
 24 further questions. Thank you very much.
 25 THE WITNESS: Okay.

1 Mr. Meissner testified today, he has no
 2 information relevant to the three areas of
 3 inquiry pursuant to the director's orders.
 4 You would agree with us, that he's
 5 being called to testify to things that are
 6 inconsistent and contradictory to the order;
 7 correct?
 8 MR. ALAN SMITH: Am I being
 9 cross-examined now?
 10 MR. SMITH: No. I'm just wondering why
 11 you would call a witness who has testified he has
 12 nothing to offer with regard to the order in the
 13 areas of testimony that will be allowed.
 14 MR. ALAN SMITH: He will be called as a
 15 witness. And we'll let Mr. Spackman rule on
 16 whether he's going to allow him to testify or
 17 not. I've already answered that.
 18 MR. SMITH: Well, we agree that the
 19 testimony is not --
 20 MR. ALAN SMITH: I don't agree, no. I
 21 think, I'm like Mr. Moyle, I think that pre-trial
 22 order is broad enough to cover a lot of areas.
 23 MR. SMITH: Thank you. I don't think
 24 we need to have this on the record. But I do
 25 have a couple of more questions for Mr. Meissner.

1 MR. FEREDAY: I have just a comment.
 2 And that is just to note, that I have, for the
 3 record, made my objection on the whole issue of
 4 pumps, and wells, and water supply, and so forth.
 5 And that will be a continuing objection. And if
 6 you testify, you will probably hear that again if
 7 you choose to testify.
 8 MR. SMITH: I have one, while we're on
 9 the record. Judge Smith, in light of
 10 Mr. Meissner's testimony, is it still your intent
 11 to call him as a witness?
 12 MR. ALAN SMITH: I plan to.
 13 MR. SMITH: And what is your basis for
 14 calling him as a witness?
 15 MR. ALAN SMITH: We're presenting
 16 evidence as to actual damage and not potential
 17 damage, which is all that pre-trial order
 18 covered, potential damage. And these people have
 19 been actually damaged, Mr. Moyle and
 20 Mr. Meissner, both.
 21 And it will depend on what Mr. Spackman
 22 rules on it. If he doesn't let us call them,
 23 then they won't be called as witnesses. But we
 24 may make an offer of proof for the record.
 25 MR. SMITH: I understand that. But as

1 MR. SMITH: Okay.
 2 FURTHER EXAMINATION
 3 QUESTIONS BY MR. ALAN SMITH:
 4 Q. If your static level remained at 58
 5 feet since you re-did the well, has Legacy been
 6 pumping occasionally?
 7 A. They pump occasionally, but for brief
 8 periods of time, and I'm not sure.
 9 Q. Is that amount of pumping, a lot
 10 different than they were earlier?
 11 A. The most I have seen them pump is,
 12 like, six to eight hours at a time.
 13 Q. And what were they pumping before, when
 14 you were having that impact?
 15 A. There was a couple of times where they
 16 pumped for a week straight, and that severely
 17 impacted me.
 18 MR. FEREDAY: Again, I'll interpose my
 19 same objection.
 20 MR. ALAN SMITH: I have no other
 21 questions.
 22 MR. FEREDAY: No further questions.
 23 MR. SMITH: No further questions.
 24 (Deposition concluded at 11:59 a.m.)
