Re: Proposed test of Birch Creek Flows

Gentlemen:

I received Kent Foster's letter on February 21, 1996 which requested authorization by the Department of Water Resources to conduct two tests of stream flow loss in Birch Creek, one before the irrigation season and one during the irrigation season. As I understand the proposed tests, Birch Creek Ranches will attempt to determine how much additional water Birch Creek will lose if water from the Simmons Ranch rights now owned by Birch Creek Ranches is delivered to a proposed place of use below Birch Creek Ranches' hydropower facility.

In response to Kent Foster's letter, Jim DeMordaunt of D & D Enterprises wrote me a letter on February 25, 1996, objecting to the proposed tests. I assumed a copy of his letter was mailed to the parties. After recently reviewing the files, I discovered it had not. Enclosed is a copy of DeMordaunt's letter.

In 1995, Ron Carlson, the manager of the Department's Eastern Regional Office, sent a letter describing when and under what conditions the test could be performed. Enclosed is a copy of Ron Carlson's letter. I don't believe the letter needs any further elaboration except that the irrigation season begins in the Birch Creek vicinity on April 15. A test conducted prior to April

15 is outside the irrigation season and can be conducted without the consent of the waterusers. A test conducted during the irrigation season will require the consent of the waterusers.

Please be advised that Department authorization for the test pursuant to Ron Carlson's letter should not be construed as support for assessment of only incremental losses to Birch Creek Ranches if a transfer of the Simmons rights is approved. In fact, the Department has consistently supported a proportional loss assessment. Nonetheless, the test may be helpful to determine the total loss in Birch Creek for purposes of assigning the prorata share of the loss to each user.
