Minutes of Annual Meeting

Water District No. 110 Annual Meeting Minutes

February 14, 2007

Kirk Jacobs called the meeting to order @ 1:02 p.m. Lyle Swank, Gene Hansen, Tim Luke and Lisa Snarr of IDWR, and Wendy Murphy of Water District 1 were also in attendance. There were approximately 18 other meeting attendees, including advisory members Don Parker, Daren Bitter, Carl Ball, and Kirk Jacobs.

Carl Ball moved to have Kirk Jacobs act as meeting chairman and Wendy Murphy as meeting secretary. Daren Bitter seconded this motion and it passed without dissent.

Minutes were then read by Wendy Murphy with some noted corrected. Carl Ball asked that the 2006 resolutions be included in those minutes. Don Parker moved and Daren Bitter seconded and the minutes were approved as read.

Dale Rockwood read the financial report. Dale reported that WD110 had cash on hand of \$15,866, as of January 31, 2007, with the accounts receivable balance \$574. Funds held by IDWR are \$624 leaving total assets to WD110 of \$17,064. At the end of January WD110 had no current liabilities. The net income for 2006 is \$3,264, plus the retained earnings from the closeout of the North Water Measurement District of \$13,800 providing a total equity of \$17,064. Income totaled \$28,282, and total district expenses were \$25,018. Dale gave a breakdown of the 2007 proposed budget of \$57,311, as shown in resolution #7. Carl Ball asked about the rates and Don Parker asked about the \$17,867 spent. Don moved to accept the financial report, Daren Bitter seconded and it passed without dissent.

Lisa Snarr indicated the North Measurement District account has approximately \$1,700 after election costs. Craig Bear moved to transfer \$10,000 of the funds on hand to the Jefferson/Clark Ground Water District. Don Parker seconded this motion. Lisa indicated the assessment income was reduced from collecting the total projected expenditures in order to utilize some of the reserved funds. Tim Luke also indicated there could be some water users who are not in the ground water district. There was then some discussion about the right process to take and the dollar amount. The resolution was amended to transfer \$7,500. Resolution 20 was added. The motion passed as amended.

Newly presented resolutions 18 and 19 were then read. Daren Bitter moved to accept the resolutions, Scott Neville seconded and the motion carried. Tim Luke talked about resolution #17 indicating Don Park and Lynn Wood have been the members appointed to represent Water District 110.

Discussion then took place regarding resolution # 11 and the benefits of having members who are and are not the same as the ground water district. There was also discussion regarding the boundary differences from the water district and the ground water district. It was moved to have six members on the advisory committee, and it passed without

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dissent. Don Parker moved to break into caucuses to decide members from each district. The following advisory members were elected:

Kirk Jacobson then moved the discussion to resolution #8, which was modified from the 2006 resolutions to base the billing on actual use rather than the water rights. There was discussion about the potential that people would loose water rights, discrepancies on measured amounts. The resolution was changed back to base the billing off of the recorded water rights rather than water use.

Lyle Swank then gave the Watermaster report indicated we were now working with the third governor since their last meeting. The new governor seems to view himself as a champion on agriculture issues, and so far the director has better access then with Governor Kempthorn. Once the Idaho Supreme Court makes their decision Governor Otter would like to organize a water summit to have water users help with the solution. Dave Tuthill is currently the interim director while the governor conducts a nationwide search for director of IDWR. One of the hottest issues for a water user is and the distribution of funding for Idaho Code 42-620.

Tim Luke then indicated Idaho Code 42-620 was passed two years ago and was referred to as the straw man proposal. It's purpose to require all those connected to the ESPA help pay for the costs of monitoring and improving the model. Cap is 1.2 million per year. Questions have been raised because of non-consumptive water users and those large loss to ground water because of their carrying systems. The FY2008 costs are estimated to be \$557,000. The department has been busy creating water districts and expanding boundaries of current districts. Ground water districts that do their own measuring can now report via the Internet. CDR is the contractor hired for 42-620 and they will be presenting to the legislature and governor.

Tim also indicated 4433 audits were done by IDWR this last year only 3181 have valid data, 1252 had problems (28%). WD110 works well with the PCC exams because the systems are simple. Because of this IDWR could potentially relax the measurement frequency by one year up here but not in other districts. There were also questions raised as to storage water rights being a component of a canal's water rights and why were they excluded from the call.

Gene Hansen then indicated the drought monitor for this year showed the potential for drought. He indicated 238 wells were measured, as well as 21 audits had been conducted. He has also added 14 wells due to water right transfers. He also presented a slide on the spring discharges. Discharges increased from 1900 cfs to 4100 cfs during the 1950's.

Daren Bitter moved to adjourn the meeting, Andy Dobson seconded and it passed without dissent. The meeting adjourned at 3:27 pm

Approved Resolutions

Water District 110
2007 Proposed Resolutions

1. That the watermaster perform the duties as required by Chapter 6, Title 42, Idaho Code and in accordance with:
 - 1) The duties described in the Final Order Creating Water District 110, signed by the Director of the Idaho Department of Water Resources (IDWR), April 17, 2006, including:
 - a) Measure, record and report diversions of ground water right included in Water District NO. 110;
 - b) Administer and enforce water rights in Water District No. 110 in priority;
 - c) Curtail unauthorized or excessive diversions in Water District No. 110 (i.e., any diversion without a water right or in excess of the elements or conditions of a water right);
 - d) Curtail out-of-priority diversions under ground water rights in Water District No. 110 determined by the Director to be causing injury to senior priority water rights if not covered by a stipulated agreement or a mitigation plan approved by the Director;
 - e) Enforce the provisions of any stipulated agreements or mitigation plans approved by the Director and applicable in Water District No. 110.
 - 2) Direction and guidance provided by the Director of IDWR pursuant to Idaho Water Law.
 - 3) The annual water district resolutions as adopted herein.
2. Lyle Swank be elected the watermaster for Water District 110. That the Director of IDWR appoints Lyle Swank, an employee of IDWR, to provide watermaster services for the ensuing year.
3. As provided in Idaho Code § 42-608(4), the watermaster shall serve until the next annual meeting of the water district after election at this meeting and upon appointment by the Director.
4. The water users of Water District No. 110 hereby empower the elected advisory committee to enter into a Memorandum of Understanding between Water District No. 110, Water District No. 01, and the Director of IDWR that will provide for the following:
 - a) IDWR will provide compensation of the watermaster for all administrative watermaster duties (all duties other than measurement and reporting) for the term of service as specified in item 3 of these resolutions.
 - b) The 2007 budget for Water District No. 110 is limited to expenses related to measurement and reporting, and will be set at this annual meeting in accordance with item 7 of these resolutions.

- c) Water District No. 110 will provide compensation to Water District No. 01 for clerical and financial account support services, where such services are related to activities and expenses for measurement and reporting of diversions only.
 - d) The watermaster shall maintain an office for the ensuing year within the IDWR Eastern Regional Office, located in Idaho Falls, Idaho.
 - e) IDWR will provide office space, vehicles and the use of all necessary office and field equipment in exchange for compensation as set in the budget for the ensuing year. This arrangement shall not give Water District No. 110 any ownership interest in any IDWR office space and equipment.
- 5. Water District No. 110 includes one or more canal companies, government entities, or other water delivery entities. The following canal companies and government entities had cooperative agreements or other arrangements with the North Water Measurement District to annually measure and report diversions on their own and to the measurement district in order to promote efficiency in the administration of water rights and water management.
 - 1) Montevue Canal Company
 - 2) Producers Canal Company
 - 3) Jefferson Irrigation Company
 - 4) United States Fish & Wildlife Service Camas National Wildlife Refuge
- 6. The entities designated above may have employees who measure and report diversions to the water master of Water District No. 110. The water master of Water District No. 110 may therefore appoint employees or agents of these entities as assistant watermasters for purposes of measuring and reporting water use to the watermaster of Water District No. 110. The water district watermaster and the Director of IDWR will provide direction and guidance to assistant watermasters for measuring and reporting of diversions in these entities, including but not limited to the following:
 - a) Each entity responsible for data collection shall provide an annual report of diversion data to the water district watermaster in accordance with Idaho Code § 42-606, § 42-708, § 42-709, and the direction provided by the Director of IDWR.
 - b) Assistant watermasters shall cooperate and coordinate with the water district watermaster and IDWR in sharing water use information.
 - c) The regulation of diversions, including curtailment of diversions and other water right enforcement actions, shall be the primary responsibility of the water district watermaster and IDWR.
 - d) The designated districts will first be given the opportunity to resolve unauthorized diversions, or other enforcement matters before action is taken by the watermaster or IDWR.

- e) To the extent that assistant watermasters may otherwise be involved in the regulation or enforcement of diversions, such involvement will be under the instruction of the watermaster and the Director of IDWR.
7. The budget of Water District No. 110 for the fiscal year 2007 beginning February 1, 2007, and ending on January 31, 2008, be as follows:

8. Assessment basis for measurement & reporting expenses: Diversions in Water District 110 that are not already measured by one of the canal companies or government entities identified in item 5 of these resolutions, and also have a diversion rate allowed by their water right in excess of 0.24 cfs and/or irrigation of more than five acres shall be measured directly by the water district in the ensuing year and assessed for measuring and reporting at the following rate;
- a) \$25 per diversion, and;
 - b) A pro-rata share of the total expense for measuring and reporting, minus the total amount charged for all the diversions in the district required to measure, determined by the fraction of the recorded diversion rate for each water right is to the total recorded diversion rate of all water rights being measured in the district.
9. All water users in Water District 110 will be billed their prorated share of the ESPA program and monitoring costs based on their water right as stated in Idaho Code § 42-612.
10. Dale Rockwood be elected Water District No. 110 Treasurer. The duties of the treasurer will be to approve the expenses and disburse water district funds, and to prepare or oversee preparation of a written statement of the financial affairs of the district at the end of each fiscal year, in accordance with Idaho Code, Section 42-619.
11. An advisory committee shall be elected at each regular annual session to represent the interests of the water users and to provide input to the watermaster and the

Director of IDWR. The advisory committee will consist of two water users from Hamer, two water users from Montevideo, and two from Mud Lake/Terreton Area.

12. WHEREAS Idaho Code 42-605 provides for voting by water users and election of an advisory committee, the water users of Water District No. 110 hereby resolve that the credentials for voting in any district meeting and for serving on the district advisory committee will be as follows:
 - a) Must be a water user of the district as evidenced by a valid water right or
 - b) Must have paid all assessments owed to the water district.
13. The annual Water District No. 110 meeting shall hereafter be held on the second Wednesday of February, of each year unless the Director of IDWR or the Water District No. 110 advisory committee should find it necessary to change the meeting date or unless changed by resolution of the district at any annual meeting.
14. Copies of the minutes of the annual meeting, the budget as approved, all resolutions approved, and the report prepared in accordance with Idaho Code § 42-615, shall be filed with the director of the Department of Water Resources in accordance with Idaho Code § 42-617.
15. The watermaster of Water District No. 110 shall be responsible for submitting to IDWR annual reports showing water use and such other information that may be deemed necessary by the Director of IDWR in accordance with Idaho Code § 42-606, § 42-708, and § 42-709.
16. The watermaster and assistant watermasters are authorized under Idaho Code § 42-1701(5) to make reasonable entry on lands within the district to carry out the duties of the watermaster as instructed by IDWR. These duties include but are not limited to:
 - a) Monitoring diversion and measuring rate and volume of water diverted from ground water and other public water sources.
 - b) Measuring the depth to water in wells.
 - c) Monitoring the place, period, and nature of use of water to identify unauthorized diversion and use and to determine compliance with mitigation provisions required by agreement or order of IDWR.
17. HEREBY BE IT RESOLVED, that Water District 110 advisory committee shall be charged with the responsibility for the appointment of member(s) to serve as advisor(s) to the Eastern Snake Plain Aquifer Monitoring Committee as defined by Idaho Code § 42-620.

NEW RESOLUTIONS

18. All payments for assessments not received by May 1, 2007 shall accrue penalties in the amount of 10% of the charge and interest in the amount of 1% per month, as provided pursuant to Idaho Code § 42-617.
19. Be it also resolved, that the Watermaster is authorized pursuant to Idaho Code § 42-618, to withhold or suspend deliveries of water to any water users who have not paid their assessment charge by January 1 of the year following the billing date.
20. Be it resolved that \$7,500 be transferred to the Jefferson/Clark Ground Water District from Water District 110 with exclusion of non-irrigation water use through an assessment credit in 2007.

Water District 110 Advisory Meeting
1/30/2007

Kirk Jacobs called the meeting to order at 10:20 am. Those in attendance were Kirk Jacobs; Don Parker; Tim Luke, Lyle Swank, Lisa Snarr, Gene Hansen, and Wendy Murphy from IDWR.

Tim Luke indicated the annual meeting notices were mailed January 22, 2007 for the annual meeting. Don Parker moved to accept the minutes as written, Kirk Jacobs seconded and the motion carried.

Discussion then moved toward the advisory members. An advisory member needs to open up the annual meeting. Tim indicated Idaho Code does not have guidelines on the structure of the advisory committee, generally district create a resolution giving guidelines and boundaries. Don Parker moved to have five representatives, two representatives from Hamer and Terreton, and one from Montevieu. Kirk Jacobs seconded and the motion carried.

Lisa Snarr then gave the financial report. Water District 110 income was \$28,282.45, total expenses were \$22,207.82, and the January IDWR expenses are not included. They are expected to be \$3,000 to \$4,000. The budget for the district was \$40,438; the expenses are under budget because of summer temporary help and Terry's position being vacant for a while. Net income is \$6,074.63. Checking accounts have \$18,300.53 and Total liabilities and equity of the district is \$19,874.63. Don Parker moved to accept the financial report, Kirk seconded and the motion carried. It was indicated that the Watermaster services are covered by IDWR until 1/31/2008.

Lyle Swank indicated IDWR hired CDR Associates to negotiate the ESPA Monitoring Committee. IWRI (Eastern Snake Plain modeling project) has assembled a technical group to review the model. They will review base case scenarios, and springs stabilization. The goal of the monitoring committee would be to provide enough funding to improve the model to make it more accurate. Del Raybould is proposing legislation to address the inequities of the cost in the high water use areas.

Lyle also indicated the water outlook is currently at 72% of normal, and it would take about 150% of normal precipitation to bring us up to normal. The storage in the reservoir is in good shape. Don asked why there was water being released with the current conditions. Lyle indicated the Bureau of Reclamation looks at several factors in determining their flood control operations. The Committee of Nine did send a letter to the USBR regarding the releases and water releases have been reduced from 2,000 cfs to 1,500 cfs.

Gene Hansen indicated the drought index implied we would be in drought conditions for 2007. There were 238 site visits done in 2007 (about 20 less than last year), which is still 1/3 of the wells. Two temps were hired to assist with measurement. Out of these wells

211 were PCCs, 5 Flow meters, 3 Alternates, 8 Time clocks, and verified 11 wells were still not in use. Gene also indicated that 21 audits were performed on his work from Boise personnel. Generally the measurements are considered good if they fall within a $\pm 10\%$. Fourteen wells were added to the district because of transfers. About 45 pump cards were mailed.

Tim Luke indicated aerial data is used to look for violations of water right use. There are at least 11 in Water District 110. Letters will be sent giving the individuals the opportunity to identify the water right being utilized, and to determine a course of action to resolve the discrepancy. The maximum penalty for violations is \$300/acre. The advisory board indicated they would like a list of the potential violations.

Don moved to accept the proposed Budget, Kirk seconded and the budget will be presented as proposed. Don also moved to accept the resolutions as changed; Kirk seconded this motion and the motion carried. The meeting adjourned at 12:16 pm.

Kirk Jacobs called the meeting to order at 12:20 p.m. Other advisors in attendance were Dale Cope, Carl Ball, Daren Bitter, and Don Parker. IDWR employees Lyle Swank, Gene Hansen, Wendy Murphy, and Lisa Snarr, and Terry Klipfel of Water District 1 were also present.

Don Parker made a motion to accept the minutes from the May 10, 2006, meeting as written. Dale (Tye) Cope seconded the motion and the minutes were accepted as written.

There was brief discussion on the resolutions. Carl Ball made a motion to accept the resolution #1 as presented by Tim Luke, and Don Parker seconded the motion. The motion passed.

Wendy Murphy gave advisors an update on North Measurement District finances, reminding members of the motion from a February meeting to postpone the annual meeting and allow the district to continue operation on the 2005 budget until the rescheduled 2006 meeting.

There was concern expressed by advisors that the annual meeting had been put off for so long due to the Director signing the order for the creation of Water District 110 so late. Tim Luke said the delay had been out of his control. He did take some responsibility for some of Gene's hours charged during the months of April and May, and three weeks in March, because the Director didn't sign the order when expected. Tim said the Director will have to "eat" some of the costs, and said funds would be transferred back to the NWMD account for the purpose of equity. Tim said he anticipated the amount to be \$7,000 to \$8,000. There was some discussion of final budget numbers. Wendy said she'd mail them to advisors when she had them.

There was more discussion of the proposed WD110 resolutions. Don Parker reminded advisors that at the last advisory meeting they had discussed keeping the advisory committee the same as the 2005 NWMD advisory committee, at least until the 2007 meeting. Kirk Jacobs wanted to know if Fish & Wildlife would have a representative on the committee. Tim Luke said advisors could design the make-up of the new advisory committee however they want. Don Parker made a motion to change resolution #10 in order to keep the make-up of the WD 110 advisory committee the same as the 2005 NWMD advisory committee until the 2007 annual meeting. Carl Ball seconded the motion and it passed unanimously.

There was some discussion of resolution #8 and whether or not to keep the per diversion charge at \$50.00. Gene explained how billing works, and discussed the initial statute that called for a \$25.00 per diversion charge. Tim Luke said the statute had changed 3-5 years ago and explained the reason for the change.

Carl Ball made a motion to adjourn the meeting at 1:03 p.m. Daren Bitter seconded the motion and the meeting was adjourned.

Annual Meeting Minutes

February 14, 2007

Kirk Jacobs called the meeting to order @ 1:02 p.m. Lyle Swank, Gene Hansen, Tim Luke and Lisa Snarr of IDWR, and Wendy Murphy of Water District 1 were also in attendance. There were approximately 18 other meeting attendees, including advisory members Don Parker, Daren Bitter, Carl Ball, and Kirk Jacobs.

Carl Ball moved to have Kirk Jacobs act as meeting chairman and Wendy Murphy as meeting secretary. Daren Bitter seconded this motion and it passed without dissent.

Minutes were then read by Wendy Murphy with some noted corrected. Carl Ball asked that the 2006 resolutions be included in those minutes. Don Parker moved and Daren Bitter seconded and the minutes were approved as read.

Dale Rockwood read the financial report. Dale reported that WD110 had cash on hand of \$15,866, as of January 31, 2007, with the accounts receivable balance \$574. Funds held by IDWR are \$624 leaving total assets to WD110 of \$17,064. At the end of January WD110 had no current liabilities. The net income for 2006 is \$3,264, plus the retained earnings from the closeout of the North Water Measurement District of \$13,800 providing a total equity of \$17,064. Income totaled \$28,282, and total district expenses were \$25,018. Dale gave a breakdown of the 2007 proposed budget of \$57,311, as shown in resolution #7. Carl Ball asked about the rates and Don Parker asked about the \$17,867 spent. Don moved to accept the financial report, Daren Bitter seconded and it passed without dissent.

Lisa Snarr indicated the North Measurement District account has approximately \$1,700 after election costs. Craig Bear moved to transfer \$10,000 of the funds on hand to the Jefferson/Clark Ground Water District. Don Parker seconded this motion. Lisa indicated the assessment income was reduced from collecting the total projected expenditures in order to utilize some of the reserved funds. Tim Luke also indicated there could be some water users who are not in the ground water district. There was then some discussion about the right process to take and the dollar amount. The resolution was amended to transfer \$7,500. Resolution 20 was added. The motion passed as amended.

Newly presented resolutions 18 and 19 were then read. Daren Bitter moved to accept the resolutions, Scott Neville seconded and the motion carried. Tim Luke talked about resolution #17 indicating Don Park and Lynn Wood have been the members appointed to represent Water District 110.

Discussion then took place regarding resolution # 11 and the benefits of having members who are and are not the same as the ground water district. There was also discussion regarding the boundary differences from the water district and the ground water district. It was moved to have six members on the advisory committee, and it passed without

dissent. Don Parker moved to break into caucuses to decide members from each district. The following advisory members were elected:

Kirk Jacobson then moved the discussion to resolution #8, which was modified from the 2006 resolutions to base the billing on actual use rather than the water rights. There was discussion about the potential that people would loose water rights, discrepancies on measured amounts. The resolution was changed back to base the billing off of the recorded water rights rather than water use.

Lyle Swank then gave the Watermaster report indicated we were now working with the third governor since their last meeting. The new governor seems to view himself as a champion on agriculture issues, and so far the director has better access then with Governor Kempthorn. Once the Idaho Supreme Court makes their decision Governor Otter would like to organize a water summit to have water users help with the solution. Dave Tuthill is currently the interim director while the governor conducts a nationwide search for director of IDWR. One of the hottest issues for a water user is and the distribution of funding for Idaho Code 42-620.

Tim Luke then indicated Idaho Code 42-620 was passed two years ago and was referred to as the straw man proposal. It's purpose to require all those connected to the ESPA help pay for the costs of monitoring and improving the model. Cap is 1.2 million per year. Questions have been raised because of non-consumptive water users and those large loss to ground water because of their carrying systems. The FY2008 costs are estimated to be \$557,000. The department has been busy creating water districts and expanding boundaries of current districts. Ground water districts that do their own measuring can now report via the Internet. CDR is the contractor hired for 42-620 and they will be presenting to the legislature and governor.

Tim also indicated 4433 audits were done by IDWR this last year only 3181 have valid data, 1252 had problems (28%). WD110 works well with the PCC exams because the systems are simple. Because of this IDWR could potentially relax the measurement frequency by one year up here but not in other districts. There were also questions raised as to storage water rights being a component of a canal's water rights and why were they excluded from the call.

Gene Hansen then indicated the drought monitor for this year showed the potential for drought. He indicated 238 wells were measured, as well as 21 audits had been conducted. He has also added 14 wells due to water right transfers. He also presented a slide on the spring discharges. Discharges increased from 1900 cfs to 4100 cfs during the 1950's.

Daren Bitter moved to adjourn the meeting, Andy Dobson seconded and it passed without dissent. The meeting adjourned at 3:27 pm

Kirk Jacobs called the meeting to order at 12:20 p.m. Other advisors in attendance were Dale Cope, Carl Ball, Daren Bitter, and Don Parker. IDWR employees Lyle Swank, Gene Hansen, Wendy Murphy, and Lisa Snarr, and Terry Klipfel of Water District 1 were also present.

Don Parker made a motion to accept the minutes from the May 10, 2006, meeting as written. Dale (Tye) Cope seconded the motion and the minutes were accepted as written.

There was brief discussion on the resolutions. Carl Ball made a motion to accept the resolution #1 as presented by Tim Luke, and Don Parker seconded the motion. The motion passed.

Wendy Murphy gave advisors an update on North Measurement District finances, reminding members of the motion from a February meeting to postpone the annual meeting and allow the district to continue operation on the 2005 budget until the rescheduled 2006 meeting.

There was concern expressed by advisors that the annual meeting had been put off for so long due to the Director signing the order for the creation of Water District 110 so late. Tim Luke said the delay had been out of his control. He did take some responsibility for some of Gene's hours charged during the months of April and May, and three weeks in March, because the Director didn't sign the order when expected. Tim said the Director will have to "eat" some of the costs, and said funds would be transferred back to the NWMD account for the purpose of equity. Tim said he anticipated the amount to be \$7,000 to \$8,000. There was some discussion of final budget numbers. Wendy said she'd mail them to advisors when she had them.

There was more discussion of the proposed WD110 resolutions. Don Parker reminded advisors that at the last advisory meeting they had discussed keeping the advisory committee the same as the 2005 NWMD advisory committee, at least until the 2007 meeting. Kirk Jacobs wanted to know if Fish & Wildlife would have a representative on the committee. Tim Luke said advisors could design the make-up of the new advisory committee however they want. Don Parker made a motion to change resolution #10 in order to keep the make-up of the WD 110 advisory committee the same as the 2005 NWMD advisory committee until the 2007 annual meeting. Carl Ball seconded the motion and it passed unanimously.

There was some discussion of resolution #8 and whether or not to keep the per diversion charge at \$50.00. Gene explained how billing works, and discussed the initial statute that called for a \$25.00 per diversion charge. Tim Luke said the statute had changed 3-5 years ago and explained the reason for the change.

Carl Ball made a motion to adjourn the meeting at 1:03 p.m. Daren Bitter seconded the motion and the meeting was adjourned.

1st Annual Meeting Minutes
May 17, 2006

Tim Luke of IDWR called the meeting to order at 2:26 p.m. Lyle Swank, Gene Hansen, Wendy Murphy, and Lisa Snarr of IDWR, and Terry Klipfel of Water District 1 were also in attendance. There were approximately 18 other meeting attendees, including Don Parker, Daren Bitter, Carl Ball, Dale Cope, Kirk Jacobs, and Lynn Wood of the former North Water Measurement District Advisory Committee.

Tim Luke began by giving some background information for the formation of the water district, and briefly explained administration and enforcement responsibilities. He talked about water calls by the surface water coalition, and about mitigation and agreements in other areas, including water master participation. He emphasized that this year's water supply is good and that he doesn't anticipate any calls, or a lot of administrative time required on the part of the WD 110 Watermaster. Tim mentioned that the watermaster this year would do some analysis of satellite imagery with GIS water right overlays and watermaster follow-up of any issues that need resolving. He reminded attendees that measurement and reporting within a water district could be done by the ground water district.

Next, Bryce Contor told attendees that he had another set of resolutions and wanted the water users to consider options available. Don Parker proposed users look at all resolutions discussed at the advisory committee meeting, then Bryce's, then Brian Higgs proposal. Kirk Jacobs reminded water users that the water district could hire their own hydrographer and water master. Kirk Jacobs said that if the district goes with the IDWR bid, that Lyle Swank was the suggested Watermaster. Don Parker said that we should look at all options. However, if the IDWR bid is chosen, Watermaster services would be provided by IDWR until the next annual meeting (administratively for two years).

Wendy Murphy told those in attendance that advisors had reviewed resolutions at the advisory meeting and suggested looking at the 1st resolution, and then at the different bid proposals. Kirk Jacobs read the first resolution, and reminded members that they needed to vote on a Watermaster and hydrographer. Don Parker said he had a copy of the final order if anyone wanted to look at it. Tim Luke told members that all of the elements of the final order are in resolution #1.

Kirk Jacobs suggested that Bryce Contor and Brian Higgs have a little time to present their bids. Bryce explained why it might be beneficial to hire him, though more expensive to water users. Bryce said his bid for measurement and reporting was approximately \$67,000. He emphasized that the benefit of electing him Watermaster was the "separation of powers", stating that a Watermaster hired by IDWR was paid by IDWR and subject to the Director. He said if he were elected he would push for whatever was most beneficial to the water user, but also said he would be required to enforce the law as Watermaster. He said that he would work to eliminate the use of diversion rate when determining injury, and work toward only what will make a difference in injury; place of use. Bryce distributed copies of the resolutions he was proposing. One of the water users expressed concerns about the cost of mitigation. Bryce said that cost was not determined by the Watermaster, but he would enforce mitigation and anything else required under oath of office. There were some questions and discussion directed at Bryce in regard to the water model. Brian Higgs said he believes the model technology to be completely wrong. Bryce said ~~he~~ the model is useful if used appropriately.

Kirk Jacobs asked Lyle Swank to speak in regard to the benefits of IDWR carrying the contract. Lyle gave some background information about himself and his qualifications. Lyle said if he was elected

Watermaster, he would rely on the expertise of others within the office to help him perform the required duties. He said some of the benefits for hiring IDWR include the use of office space, department vehicles, software, etc. He also mentioned access to a variety of expertise within the office, as well as, the audit done each year for Water District 1. Dale Rockwood, reminded members of his services as treasurer as well. Lyle said he believed one of the main benefits, should mitigation from downstream occur, is access to purchase water from the rental pool.

One water user asked Lyle about flows at Blackfoot and how records are kept. Lyle explained that they obtain flow data every day from the USGS, and said that water lost in one river reach frequently shows up in another as a gain downstream. He also told the water user he was welcome to come in to the office and Lyle would go over data with him.

Discussion turned back to IDWR and Watermaster services. Kirk Jacobs asked if that was for one year, or two. Tim Luke said the proposal from IDWR was for two years, but the resolutions specified the watermaster term of service only until the next annual meeting. Tim Luke explained that the second bid from IDWR was less than the initial bid shown to advisors, because IDWR decided to reduce Gene Hansen's time and hire a temporary person for some of the summer field work.

Kirk Jacobs asked Brian Higgs if he wants to do measuring and reporting for Water District 110. He said his bid was only for measuring and reporting and that he was not interested in being water master. His bid was \$50,000 to measure 1/3 of the wells and do the calculations and reporting. He also said that the advisors asked if he could do the billing. He said if he did that it would be another \$4,000. His total bid was for \$54,000. Brian asked if there would be more than one ground water district within Water District 110. Kirk Jacobs said there would only be one.

One water user asked how it would work to have canal systems and the wildlife refuge do their own measuring. Bryce Contor said that was up to the water users. There was some discussion of the use of power records at this time. Brian Higgs said he believed it was important for water users to use as much of the water allowed by water right as possible. He cited one water user who combined his water rights and wasn't given his full allocation because he had not been using the full amount.

Tim Luke discussed the IDWR bid proposal, again explaining why the original bid had been higher. The original bid was based on Gene working full-time in the district over 9 ½ - 10 months, until the next annual meeting. Costs for his time include salary, benefits, and one-third overhead charge, which include the use of vehicles, office & computers. The new bid adjusts Gene's time for measuring and reporting in Water District 110 to one third of his total time and annual salary. The other two thirds of Gene's time is charged to other districts (Water District 120 and the East Measurement District). The new bid also includes a temporary employee to assist Gene in completing field measurements in the Water District 110 area this summer. Clerical and financial support costs are unchanged from the previous bid and is essentially the same as the prior year for the North Measurement District.

There was more discussion about canal companies and the wildlife refuge reporting. Tim said there is a need to oversee measurements to make sure the numbers are good. There was a water user who had been opposed to anyone other than the Watermaster doing the reporting, but he didn't know that the department or measurement district hydrographer provided calibrations and oversight.

A water user asked Bryce if he planned on hiring temps. Bryce told members that he would do the measuring, calculations, and reporting, but may hire a temp to help with clerical.

Don Parker told members that the Montevieu and Producer's Canals contract with Water District 31 do measurements. Jefferson did the same so it is legitimate.

There was some discussion about in line flow meter verses PCC. Tim said use of PCC was sort of a compromise between water users in the ESPA who wanted installed flow meters and very accurate measurement and those water users who wanted very little, or no measurement, or use of evapotranspiration (ET) methods. Tim mentioned the PCC method also keeps measurement costs down. Water users wanted to know whether or not there could be fewer measurements in the future. Tim said that IDWR needs to review data, but he has found recent evidence that some areas within the ESPA may not be keeping up with the required frequency of measurements.

Don Parker said that it appears the #1 issue at this meeting is funding. At this time there are no advisors for WD 110, and all options should be discussed. He emphasized the need for a starting point. Wendy reminded water users that resolutions had been considered by steering committee advisors at their meeting. She recommended members look at them and pass them, or suggest changes. She also said the water users need to lay down a purpose and start designing the type of organization they want to be. Brian Higgs said that it all comes back to money, and you should hire whom you want, but nothing is in place to access and collect accept for through the department. Brian said that the IDWR offer is hard to turn down.

Don Parker made a motion to adopt resolution #1 as presented to meeting members. Daren Bitter seconded the motion and resolution #1 passed by unanimous vote.

Don Parker reminded members that they had looked at the resolutions as an advisory committee. Carl Ball wanted to know if Bryce's resolution #1 made more sense. Bryce said that it works toward what makes sense to enforce. That is the main difference between the two, number 1 resolutions.

Don Parker made a motion to adopt resolution #2 as written. Dale Cope seconded the motion. Lynn Burtenshaw was opposed, but otherwise the motion passed.

Rob Larranaga motion to adopt resolution #3 as written. It was seconded by Lynn Wood and passed without dissent.

Don Parker began discussing resolution #10 and the make-up of the Water District 110 advisory committee. There was some discussion as to the benefit of keeping the advisory committee the same as the 2005 North Water Measurement District advisory committee. Rob Larranaga made a motion to accept resolution #10 as changed. It was seconded by Lynn Wood and passed unanimously.

There was discussion on resolution #8, and whether or not to keep the charge per diversion at \$50.00. Tim explained why the measurement district statute had changed from a \$25.00 fee to a \$50.00 per diversion charge, stating that it was to cover costs of measuring commercial wells. Lynn Wood made a motion to accept it as written and it was seconded by Pat Hendron, but the motion did not pass. There were more questions about the diversion charge and Wendy explained the billing process. Carl Ball asked about assessing on volume verses CFS allowed by water right. Tim Luke said either option is okay. Usually, Tim said, the dollar amount is based on water use. Carl Ball wanted to ~~now~~ if billing on a pro rata share of CFS allowed by water right is allowed by law. Tim said that the water district statutes do require assessments be based on water use, but some districts have adopted other methods as long as it is

passed by resolution at the annual meeting and there is generally no opposition to such as alternate method. Tim mentioned the assessment method given in resolution #8 is similar, or the same as how it has been done in the measurement district, and that this approach is probably the easiest way and least disruptive to the users. There was more discussion about keeping assessments low. Carl Ball made a motion to change the per diversion charge in the resolution to \$25.00. Don Parker seconded the motion and resolution #8 passed with the suggested change.

Robert McCulloch made a motion to accept all remaining resolutions as written. Chuck Steward seconded the motion and they passed unanimously.

Kirk Jacobs asked if there were any other business items. Carl Ball asked how the formation of the ground water district was coming. Don Parker said there would be a vote in the November general election. Don said the main purpose was for mitigation, but other users said that, as a ground water district, they could contract for someone to do measuring and reporting, and hire their own Watermaster.

There was some discussion about Wendy leaving IDWR for a new job. There was much appreciation expressed for all of the hard work Wendy has done.

Tim Luke gave members a "heads up" about Idaho Code 42-620 which calls for the formation of an advisory committee with representatives from all water districts hydrologically connected to the ESPA. The purpose of the committee is to work with the Director, folks doing the modeling, and people on the hydrologic committee. They would have input in regard to assessing up to 1.2 million dollars to improve accounting, take ground water levels, work on the model, and for measuring return flows, to name just a few. Tim Luke said it doesn't mean 1.2 million will be assessed every year. Tim Luke suggested members may want to adopt a resolution that elects a representative to this committee.

Don Parker wanted verification that no funds could be collected before 2007. Tim said that was correct.

Dale
Don Parker made a motion to have Lynn Wood act as representative for the ESPA advisory board. It was seconded by ~~Tye~~ Cope. Before any vote was taken there was a motion to amend the first motion and to elect Don Parker and Lynn Wood as representatives to this advisory committee. Lynn Burtenshaw seconded the motion and the amendment to the resolution passed. Members of WD 110 voted unanimously to pass this amended resolution.

Wendy talked briefly to water users about signature cards for the Water District 110 account. She suggested that having a name on file other than Dale Rockwood's, such as the Watermaster; or perhaps an advisory member might be a good idea. She said this person's name should appear in the minutes due to changes in security with the banks since 9/11.

Don Parker made a motion to have Dale Rockwood be the primary signer on the account at the bank, and Kirk Jacob's the second signature. *Dale* ~~Tye~~ Cope seconded the motion and the motion passed unanimously.

There was no more business. Lynn Burtenshaw made a motion to adjourn the meeting. Lynn Wood seconded the motion, and the meeting adjourned at 4:14 p.m.

2007 Proposed Resolutions

1. That the watermaster perform the duties as required by Chapter 6, Title 42, Idaho Code and in accordance with:
 - 1) The duties described in the Final Order Creating Water District 110, signed by the Director of the Idaho Department of Water Resources (IDWR), April 17, 2006, including:
 - a) Measure, record and report diversions of ground water right included in Water District NO. 110;
 - b) Administer and enforce water rights in Water District No. 110 in priority;
 - c) Curtail unauthorized or excessive diversions in Water District No. 110 (i.e., any diversion without a water right or in excess of the elements or conditions of a water right);
 - d) Curtail out-of-priority diversions under ground water rights in Water District No. 110 determined by the Director to be causing injury to senior priority water rights if not covered by a stipulated agreement or a mitigation plan approved by the Director;
 - e) Enforce the provisions of any stipulated agreements or mitigation plans approved by the Director and applicable in Water District No. 110.
 - 2) Direction and guidance provided by the Director of IDWR pursuant to Idaho Water Law.
 - 3) The annual water district resolutions as adopted herein.
2. Lyle Swank be elected the watermaster for Water District 110. That the Director of IDWR appoints Lyle Swank, an employee of IDWR, to provide watermaster services for the ensuing year.
3. As provided in Idaho Code § 42-608(4), the watermaster shall serve until the next annual meeting of the water district after election at this meeting and upon appointment by the Director.
4. The water users of Water District No. 110 hereby empower the elected advisory committee to enter into a Memorandum of Understanding between Water District No. 110, Water District No. 01, and the Director of IDWR that will provide for the following:
 - a) IDWR will provide compensation of the watermaster for all administrative watermaster duties (all duties other than measurement and reporting) for the term of service as specified in item 3 of these resolutions.
 - b) The 2007 budget for Water District No. 110 is limited to expenses related to measurement and reporting, and will be set at this annual meeting in accordance with item 7 of these resolutions.

- c) Water District No. 110 will provide compensation to Water District No. 01 for clerical and financial account support services, where such services are related to activities and expenses for measurement and reporting of diversions only.
 - d) The watermaster shall maintain an office for the ensuing year within the IDWR Eastern Regional Office, located in Idaho Falls, Idaho.
 - e) IDWR will provide office space, vehicles and the use of all necessary office and field equipment in exchange for compensation as set in the budget for the ensuing year. This arrangement shall not give Water District No. 110 any ownership interest in any IDWR office space and equipment.
5. Water District No. 110 includes one or more canal companies, government entities, or other water delivery entities. The following canal companies and government entities had cooperative agreements or other arrangements with the North Water Measurement District to annually measure and report diversions on their own and to the measurement district in order to promote efficiency in the administration of water rights and water management.
- 1) Montevue Canal Company
 - 2) Producers Canal Company
 - 3) Jefferson Irrigation Company
 - 4) United States Fish & Wildlife Service Camas National Wildlife Refuge
6. The entities designated above may have employees who measure and report diversions to the water master of Water District No. 110. The water master of Water District No. 110 may therefore appoint employees or agents of these entities as assistant watermasters for purposes of measuring and reporting water use to the watermaster of Water District No. 110. The water district watermaster and the Director of IDWR will provide direction and guidance to assistant watermasters for measuring and reporting of diversions in these entities, including but not limited to the following:
- a) Each entity responsible for data collection shall provide an annual report of diversion data to the water district watermaster in accordance with Idaho Code § 42-606, § 42-708, § 42-709, and the direction provided by the Director of IDWR.
 - b) Assistant watermasters shall cooperate and coordinate with the water district watermaster and IDWR in sharing water use information.
 - c) The regulation of diversions, including curtailment of diversions and other water right enforcement actions, shall be the primary responsibility of the water district watermaster and IDWR.
 - d) The designated districts will first be given the opportunity to resolve unauthorized diversions, or other enforcement matters before action is taken by the watermaster or IDWR.

- e) To the extent that assistant watermasters may otherwise be involved in the regulation or enforcement of diversions, such involvement will be under the instruction of the watermaster and the Director of IDWR.

7. The budget of Water District No. 110 for the fiscal year 2007 beginning February 1, 2007, and ending on January 31, 2008, be as follows:

Assessment basis for measurement & reporting expenses: Diversions in Water District 110 that are not already measured by one of the canal companies or government entities identified in item 5 of these resolutions, and also have a diversion rate allowed by their water right in excess of 0.24 cfs and/or irrigation of more than five acres shall be measured directly by the water district in the ensuing year and assessed for measuring and reporting at the following rate;

- a) \$25 per diversion, and;
b) A pro-rata share of the total expense for measuring and reporting, minus the total amount charged for all the diversions in the district required to measure, determined by the fraction of the recorded diversion rate for each water use is to the total recorded diversion rate of all water rights being measured in the district.

9. All water users in Water District 110 will be billed their prorated share of the ESPA program and monitoring costs based on their water use as stated in Idaho Code § 42-612. *big share right*
10. Dale Rockwood be elected Water District No. 110 Treasurer. The duties of the treasurer will be to approve the expenses and disburse water district funds, and to prepare or oversee preparation of a written statement of the financial affairs of the district at the end of each fiscal year, in accordance with Idaho Code, Section 42-619.
11. An advisory committee shall be elected at each regular annual session to represent the interests of the water users and to provide input to the watermaster and the

Director of IDWR. The advisory committee will consist of two water users from Hamer, two water users from Montevideo, and ~~one~~ ^{two} from Mud Lake/Terreton Area.

12. WHEREAS Idaho Code 42-605 provides for voting by water users and election of an advisory committee, the water users of Water District No. 110 hereby resolve that the credentials for voting in any district meeting and for serving on the district advisory committee will be as follows:
 - a) Must be a water user of the district as evidenced by a valid water right or
 - b) Must have paid all assessments owed to the water district.
13. The annual Water District No. 110 meeting shall hereafter be held on the second Wednesday of February, of each year unless the Director of IDWR or the Water District No. 110 advisory committee should find it necessary to change the meeting date or unless changed by resolution of the district at any annual meeting.
14. Copies of the minutes of the annual meeting, the budget as approved, all resolutions approved, and the report prepared in accordance with Idaho Code § 42-615, shall be filed with the director of the Department of Water Resources in accordance with Idaho Code § 42-617.
15. The watermaster of Water District No. 110 shall be responsible for submitting to IDWR annual reports showing water use and such other information that may be deemed necessary by the Director of IDWR in accordance with Idaho Code § 42-606, § 42-708, and § 42-709.
16. The watermaster and assistant watermasters are authorized under Idaho Code § 42-1701(5) to make reasonable entry on lands within the district to carry out the duties of the watermaster as instructed by IDWR. These duties include but are not limited to:
 - a) Monitoring diversion and measuring rate and volume of water diverted from ground water and other public water sources.
 - b) Measuring the depth to water in wells.
 - c) Monitoring the place, period, and nature of use of water to identify unauthorized diversion and use and to determine compliance with mitigation provisions required by agreement or order of IDWR.
17. HEREBY BE IT RESOLVED, that Water District 110 advisory committee shall be charged with the responsibility for the appointment of member(s) to serve as advisor(s) to the Eastern Snake Plain Aquifer Monitoring Committee as defined by Idaho Code § 42-620.

NEW RESOLUTIONS

18. All payments for assessments not received by May 1, 2007 shall accrue penalties in the amount of 10% of the charge and interest in the amount of 1% per month, as provided pursuant to Idaho Code § 42-617.
19. Be it also resolved, that the Watermaster is authorized pursuant to Idaho Code § 42-618, to withhold or suspend deliveries of water to any water users who have not paid their assessment charge by January 1 of the year following the billing date.

TREASURER'S REPORT
February 14, 2007

The report today will cover the income and expenditures from June 1, 2006 through January 31, 2007. I will also go over the proposed budget for 2007.

The Water District 110's Balance Sheet as of January 31, 2007 indicates cash on hand for Water District 110 as \$15,866. The Accounts Receivable balance as \$574, and Funds held by IDWR as \$624, leaving total assets to Water District 110 of \$17,064.

At the end of January there were no current liabilities. There was \$13,800 remaining from the North Measurement bank account that was transferred to the Water District 110 account. When added to the Net income for 2006 of \$3,264 this provides a total equity for Water District 110 of \$17,064.

Moving to the next page, the income between June 1, 2006 and January 31, 2007 totaled \$28,282 with a majority of the income provided from assessments of \$28,167. Interest income was \$63 and finance charges from late assessments were \$52.

Total expenses for the year total \$25,018. A majority of this was the IDWR Contract for Watermaster and Measurement personnel of \$20,677. Water District 1 provided secretarial and administrative services totaling \$3,812. Other expenses totaled \$529 and include office supplies, telephone and equipment.

Water District 110's net income was \$3,264.

2007 Proposed Budget

The Water District 110 assessment income for 2007 is proposed to be \$57,311.

The IDWR Contract for watermaster services is proposed at \$35,269. Water District 1 would provide support services to Water District 110 for \$12,400. ESPA Monitoring costs have been estimated at \$19,284. The total proposed expenses for 2007 is \$66,953.
