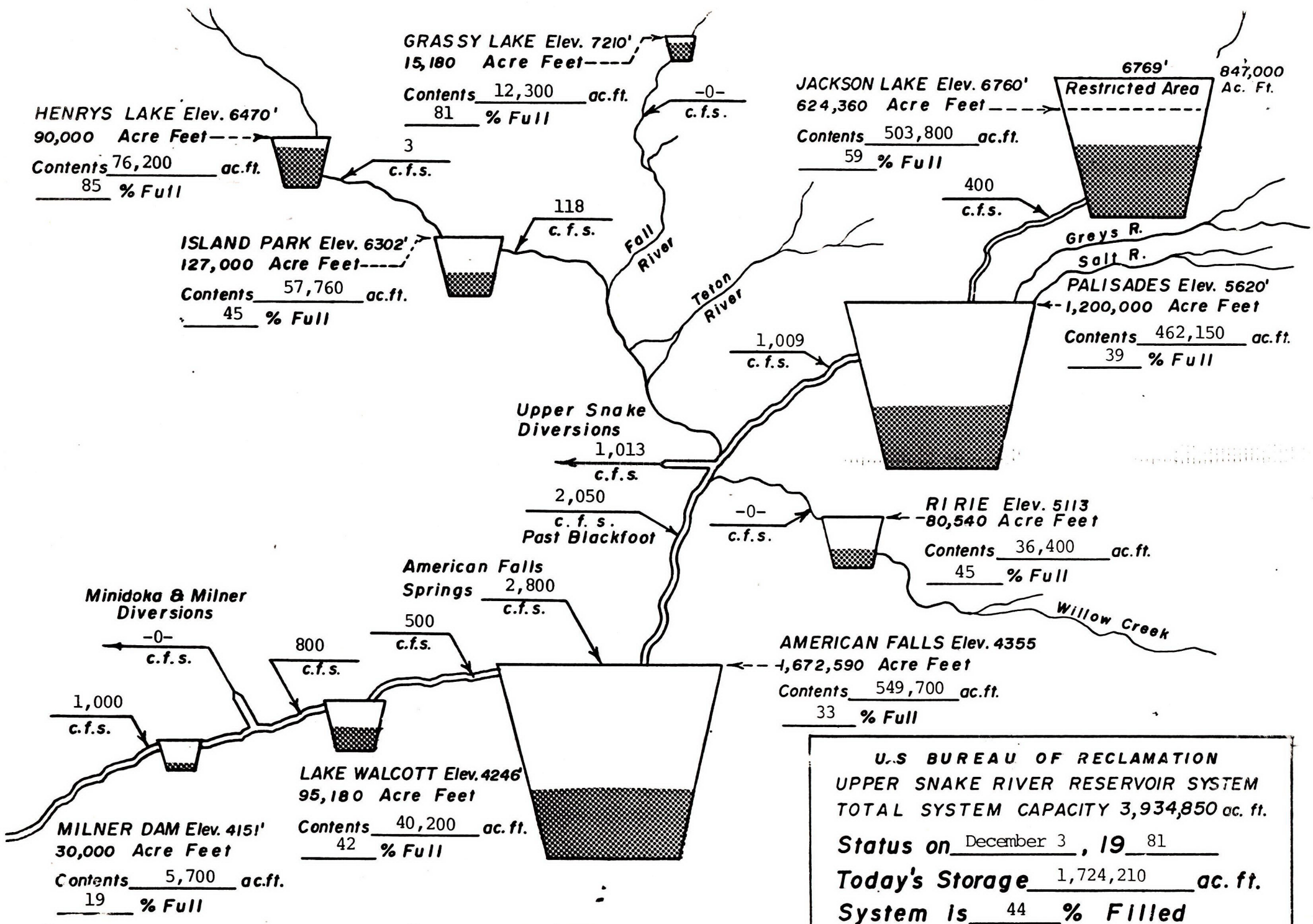

COMMITTEE OF NINE'S PROCEDURES

Summary of Changes

Rule 3 - The equation to determine the cost per acre-foot of water has been changed.

- The equation has been changed slightly in two (2) ways:

1. The cost of stored water used from reservoirs now uses the five (5) year average of storage use rather than the low flow year. (First part of the equation).
2. A cost has been added to account for canal operation and maintenance due to storage water delivery. (Second part of equation).

Rule 4.e. - Now provides for an administrative charge for operation of the rental program and for operational improvements in stored water delivery.

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Upper Snake Water Bank Rules and Regulations

Rule 1. A rental committee composed of three members of the Committee of Nine and the watermaster shall be appointed by the chairman for the following purposes:

1. To determine general policies regarding rental water not covered by the adopted rules and regulations.
2. To assist the watermaster in the allocation of rental water.
3. To consult with the watermaster on ways to most fully utilize available storage water.
4. To advise the Committee of Nine on rental activities.

Rule 2. The operation of the "Water Bank" shall be consistent with the statutes creating the Water Supply Bank and the Rules and Regulations of the Water Resource Board.

Rule 3. Water accepted into the water bank is on a contingency basis with payments to be made to the lessor only if the water is subsequently leased from the water bank.

Holders of space in Palisades Reservoir or in any other reservoir may notify the Upper Snake River Watermaster by July 1 of each year of water they designate as available for rental from the Water Rental Pool for that year's irrigation season. All such holders will share proportionately in the proceeds from the rental of all or any part of the water offered by July 1 for use in that year.

Holders of space in Palisades Reservoir or other reservoirs who notify the Upper Snake River Watermaster after July 1 of any year of water they desire to designate as available for rental from the Water Rental Pool for that year's irrigation season shall share proportionately in the proceeds from the rental of all or any part of the water rented which was designated for rental after July 1 of that year.

All of the water designated for rental before July 1 of any year will be rented before any of the water designated for rental on or after July 1 will be rented.

The lessor shall be entitled to receive payment for the percentage of his water rented from the water supply bank according to the following formula:

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FORMULA

Definitions:

- Sp = Space holder payback
Rc = Annual reservoir O & M + construction
A₅ = Five-year average total storage use
i = Inflation factor
C_c = Average canal O & M
N₅ = Five-year average total flow delivered
AF = Acre-feet leased

$$Sp = \left[\frac{(Rc)}{A_5} + (C_c + i) \frac{A_5}{N_5} \right] AF$$

Rule 4. Any water available through the water bank shall be provided on a priority according to the following priorities:

a. First priority in the rental of available water shall be given to those water users owning rights in the various storage reservoirs of the Water and Power Resources service in the Snake River Basin above Milner Dam.

b. Second priority in the rental of available water shall be given to other irrigation water users in the areas of beneficial use described in the licenses issued by the State of Idaho for use of the waters from the storage reservoirs described in (a) above.

c. Priority among water users of each priority listed in (a) and (b) above and who execute leases to rent water during an irrigation season shall be determined by the date on which that water user's executed lease is received at the office of the Upper Snake River Watermaster at Idaho Falls, Idaho; the earlier in the year the executed lease is received by the watermaster, the higher priority in that priority group the entity will receive.

d. Any water user having once initiated a lease agreement may request water in subsequent years by confirming, in writing, that all of the information on the original lease

is true and correct and identifying the amount of water he wishes to lease.

e. A \$0.25 per acre-foot charge shall be added to the price calculated using the formula in Rule 3 above. This shall be the price charged those renting water from the bank with the exception noted below. The lessors pay-back calculated using the formula in Rule 3 shall be reduced by \$0.25 per acre-foot. The monies thus generated shall cover the water district's costs in administrating the rental program and to make improvements within Water District No. 1 that will assist the watermaster in improving accuracy in allocating, accounting, and delivery of stored water. This improvement fund shall be managed and maintained by the watermaster of Water District No. 1 but disbursements from the fund shall be made for improvements authorized by the Committee of Nine. The Committee of Nine may designate up to \$0.15 per acre-foot to go to the Water Resource Board for the purposes as outlined in Rule 6.2 of the Water Supply Bank Rules and Regulations adopted by the Idaho Water Resource Board.

f. Any water not leased by August 15 may be provided to the highest bidder for such uses as may be determined beneficial by the Committee of Nine. Any lease of water which shall result in a price in excess of that calculated using the formula in Rule 3, plus administrative charges, shall be used for the general benefit of the water users in Water District No. 1.

UPPER SNAKE WATER BANK

BACKGROUND:

The rental pool of Water District 1 has, for many years, provided the mechanism by which those holding space in Upper Snake reservoirs could, if they determined it to be surplus to their current needs, lease the use of this water to water users who had inadequate supplies. The watermaster traditionally made the necessary arrangements to acquire water for the rental pool and sell water to those needing it.

Over the years, many individuals became dependent upon water from the rental pool. With the change in watermasters and the subsequent review of water district procedures, concern over the space holder risk resulting from this dependency became a major topic of discussion at meetings of the Committee of Nine. This concern primarily arose due to the provisions of ART XV Sec 4 of the Idaho State Constitution.

The Committee of Nine agreed to support legislation to reduce the risk to space holders who provided water to the rental pool, but as an interim measure required lessees sign a contract waiving any continuing rights based upon ART XV Sec 4 Idaho Constitution.

In 1979, the Forty-fifth Legislature added Sections 42-1761 - 42-1766 to the Idaho Code creating the water supply bank and providing for the creation of local rental committees to facilitate the rental of stored water. Section 42-1764 also provided that the lease of water rights through the water bank shall not constitute a dedication to the lands of any lessee.

Pursuant to Section 14-1766 the Idaho Water Resource Board appointed the Committee of Nine as the local rental committee for the Upper Snake. The Committee of Nine developed some rules and regulations for operating the Upper Snake Water Bank and adopted procedures for setting the rental costs for 1979. This procedure used 1978 as the basis for calculating the cost/acre foot of storage used. This came to \$ 0.62 average cost to the space holder and \$ 0.57 to Water District 1 for administrative costs. The formula used in

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establishing the price of storage water was based upon the assumption that the space holder's cost for storage water is inversely proportional to the amount of stored water used. Thus if a space holder with 1,000 acre-feet of storage pays annual O & M of \$620.00 and only uses 100 AF, his cost per acre-foot is \$6.20. In this example the cost of owning space is much higher than the cost of renting.

Since the storage water is, to some extent, an insurance policy against inadequate natural flow, the cost of this insurance is greatest when use is the least. Therefore, these minimum use years are the ones which the space holder attempts to recover by providing water to the water bank.

PROPOSAL:

The rental pool committee have reviewed the past practices and the rules and regulations of the rental pool and water bank and recommend the following rules and regulations for the coming year:

1. The interim rules and regulations adopted by the Idaho Water Resource Board should be continued. In addition, a provisions in the rules should be made to allow the watermaster of Water District 1 to act on behalf of the Committee of Nine in making water rentals from the water bank.

2. All transactions involving submitting water to or obtaining water from the water bank must be done in writing. However, the forms for making such transactions should be as simple as legally possible.

3. The spaceholder should be entitled to recover costs on the basis of the following formula:

$$(A) \text{ spaceholders reimbursement} = \frac{\text{total annual O \& M and const.}}{864,500}$$

The water sold from the water bank shall be provided on the following basis:

1. Agricultural users will pay the spaceholders reimbursement plus the water district delivery and administration charge.

2. Irrigation requests shall have first priority.

3. The rental price to anyone requesting water after August 1 shall be set by the Committee of Nine. This in no case shall exceed a payment to the space holder in excess of that calculated using formula A.

RESOLUTIONS

Water District No. 1
March 2, 1981

1. That the watermaster continue to apply the best available methods and technology to better assure: more accurate deliveries of natural flow and stored water, improved regulation procedures, the availability of water supply and diversion records to the water users, and that all water users are charged for water deliveries on an accurate and equitable basis.

Be it further resolved that the watermaster proceed toward automated data collection where it can effectively reduce personnel costs, travel costs, or result in cost-savings to the water users through better and more current data.

2. That the water users of Water District No. 1 continue the cooperative program with the Idaho Department of Water Resources as outlined in the Memorandum of Understanding previously signed by the Chairman of the Committee of Nine and the Director of the Department of Water Resources.
3. We recommend that Ronald D. Carlson be re-elected watermaster for the ensuing year, including a staff of a deputy, assistant, and a clerk, with an aggregate salary of \$64,000.00. This amount represents the entire salary of the clerk, assistant, and deputy, and 67% of the salary of the watermaster. Thirty-three percent of the watermaster's salary and benefits shall be paid from non-water district funding provided by the Idaho Department of Water Resources.
4. That the duties of a watermaster shall begin on this date and continue for a period of one full year.
5. Proposed Budget for Water District No. 1 for the year beginning April 1, 1981.

6. WHEREAS, it is the watermaster's responsibility to assure the proper delivery of both natural flow and storage supplies to all water users, and

WHEREAS the normal cost of delivering water to many diversions is less than their normal assessments when based upon their total seasonal use of water:

Now, THEREFORE, be it resolved that the watermaster of Water District No. 1 is hereby authorized to assess a \$15.00 minimum charge for every diversion within his jurisdiction.

7. Resolved that the watermaster shall prepare a report in accordance with Idaho Code, Section 42-614, which shall become the official billing to the individual water users, canal companies, and irrigation districts, and is hereby authorized to collect all of the expenses of delivering the waters of the district, including his salary and that of his assistants, and shall make all disbursements necessary to the conduct of the business of administering and delivering the waters of the district.

Resolved that no ditch, canal company, or other water users shall have the right to demand and receive water, and the watermaster shall not deliver to such person until receipt of the amount due and payable from such user.

Resolved that copies of the minutes of the annual meeting, the budget as approved, all resolutions approved, and the report prepared in accordance with Section 42-614, shall be filed with the county clerks of Bonneville, Madison, Teton and Fremont Counties.

8. WHEREAS, the Committee of Nine has been appointed by the Idaho Water Resource Board pursuant to Sec. 42-1765, Idaho Code, and

WHEREAS, the watermaster of Water District No. 1 has traditionally acted on behalf of the Committee of Nine in leasing stored water within Water District No. 1, and

WHEREAS, it is necessary to an orderly rental program that the watermaster continue to have the authority to act on behalf of the Committee of Nine,

THEREFORE, be it resolved that for the purpose of renting water the watermaster be considered a member of the Committee of Nine.

9. With the exception noted in Resolution No. 8, we recommend that the Committee of Nine be continued with nine regular members. The members representing the Burley and Minidoka Irrigation Projects are to alternated between the two districts as

they may arrange. In addition, advisory members representing the Water and Power Resource Service, Teton Basin, Gooding Canal, A & B Irrigation, and a member from the Burley or Minidoka District, whichever is not currently represented on the regular committee, be included. Any canal company or district desiring to have representatives attend meetings of the Committee of Nine should notify the watermaster, who will then advise them of dates and time of committee meetings so that they may have an opportunity to attend such meetings.

10. WHEREAS, it is in the best interest of the water users of Water District No. 1 to account for all diversions which might adversely affect any prior natural flow or storage diversions be it resolved that the watermaster shall collect records of water diversions during the entire year.
11. WHEREAS the rental of stored water is the responsibility of the Committee of Nine, and

WHEREAS, certain rules and regulations for the administration of rental water is essential to an orderly rental process, now

THEREFORE, be it resolved that the following rules and regulations for administering storage rentals be adopted.

Rule 1. A rental committee composed of three members of the Committee of Nine and the watermaster shall be appointed by the chairman for the following purposes:

1. To determine general policies regarding rental water not covered by the adopted rules and regulations.
2. To assist the watermaster in the allocation of rental water.
3. To consult with the watermaster on ways to most fully utilize available storage water.
4. To advise the Committee of Nine on rental activities.

Rule 2. The operation of the "Water Bank" shall be consistent with the statutes creating the Water Supply Bank and the Rules and Regulations of the Water Resource Board.

Rule 3. Water accepted into the water bank is on a contingency basis with payments to be made to the lessor only if the water is subsequently leased from the water bank.

Holders of space in Palisades Reservoir or in any other reservoir may notify the Upper Snake River Watermaster by July 1 of each year of water they designate as available for rental from the Water Rental Pool for that year's irrigation season. All such holders will share proportionately in the proceeds from the rental of all or any part of the water offered by July 1 for use in that year.

Holders of space in Palisades Reservoir or other reservoirs who notify the Upper Snake River Watermaster after July 1 of any year of water they desire to designate as available for rental from the Water Rental Pool for that year's irrigation season shall share proportionately in the proceeds from the rental of all or any part of the water rented which was designated for rental after July 1 of that year.

All of the water designated for rental before July 1 of any year will be rented before any of the water designated for rental on or after July 1 will be rented.

The lessor shall be entitled to receive payment for the percentage of his water rented from the water supply bank according to the following formula:

$$\text{Lessor's payment} = \frac{\text{Res. O \& M \& const.} \times \text{No. AF leased}}{850,000}$$

Rule 4. Any water available through the water bank shall be provided on a priority according to the following priorities:

a. First priority in the rental of available water shall be given to those water users owning rights in the various storage reservoirs of the Water and Power Resources service in the Snake River Basin above Milner Dam.

b. Second priority in the rental of available water shall be given to other irrigation water users in the areas of beneficial use described in the licenses issued by the State of Idaho for use of the waters from the storage reservoirs described in (a) above.

c. Priority among water users of each priority listed in (a) and (b) above and who execute leases to rent water during an irrigation season shall be determined by the date on which that water user's executed lease is received at the office of the Upper Snake River Watermaster at Idaho Falls, Idaho; the earlier in the year the executed lease is received by the watermaster, the higher priority in that priority group the entity will receive.

d. Any water user having once initiated a lease agreement may request water in subsequent years by confirming,

in writing, that all of the information on the original lease is true and correct and identifying the amount of water he wishes to lease.

e. Administrative charges adequate to defray the costs of the Committee of Nine and Water District No. 1 may be added to the lease price.

f. Any water not leased by August 15 may be provided to the highest bidder for such uses as may be determined beneficial by the Committee of Nine. Any lease of water which shall result in a price in excess of that calculated using the formula in Rule 3, plus administrative charges, shall be used for the general benefit of the water users in Water District No. 1.

12. WHEREAS, it is in the interest of all the water users to have the water rights within Water District No. 1 delivered according to the priority system, and

WHEREAS, the accounting system now used by Water District No. 1 requires that each diversion have assigned to it a specific list of decreed, licensed, and storage entitlement, and

WHEREAS, those diversions which have no record of water rights on file with the Department of Water Resources or the Water District Office will necessarily be taking storage water any time a diversion takes place.

Now, THEREFORE, be it resolved that no diversion shall be allowed to divert water unless the proper list of rights for that diversion are found in the watermaster's records or proper arrangements have been made to procure storage water from the rental pool prior to the start of the irrigation season.

13. WHEREAS, there have, in the past been many actions to quiet title which involve the waters of the Snake River that have entered in the adjudication of water rights without effective notice being given to either the Director of the Department of Water Resources or the Watermaster; and,

WHEREAS, the Snake River and tributaries are fully appropriated during the irrigation season, and

WHEREAS, water rights adjudicated by the court without complete information available will necessarily result in the injury of other established water rights.

Now, THEREFORE, be it resolved that the Idaho Legislature be encouraged to support such changes in the statutes as will make it a mandatory requirement that the watermaster

of the appropriate water district and the Director of the Department of Water Resources be notified and made party to any action which will result in the adjudication of water rights.

RESOLUTION NO. 14

WHEREAS, it has been almost five years since the collapse of the Teton Dam and the U.S. Government enacted a program to compensate the victims of this disaster, and

WHEREAS, during that period of time the U.S. Government has engaged in extensive engineering investigations and studies to pinpoint the cause of its failure, and

WHEREAS, it is embarrassing to the nation, engineers and those of scientific expertise to allow this project to stand unreconstructed and abandoned, and

WHEREAS, our national leaders should not allow this to continue, and

WHEREAS, the citizens and water users of the area impacted by the disaster caused by the failure of the Teton Dam desire that the dam be reconstructed, and

WHEREAS, the Teton Dam project is even more beneficial and needed in view of the continuing and growing demands for upstream storage to save Idaho water for use in Idaho, all to the economic benefit of the area, the state and the nation.

Now, THEREFORE, it is resolved by this assembly of representatives of the water users of the Upper Snake River area, Idaho, that the United States Government be urged to immediately commence reconstruction of the Teton Dam of the Lower Teton Basin Federal Reclamation Project.

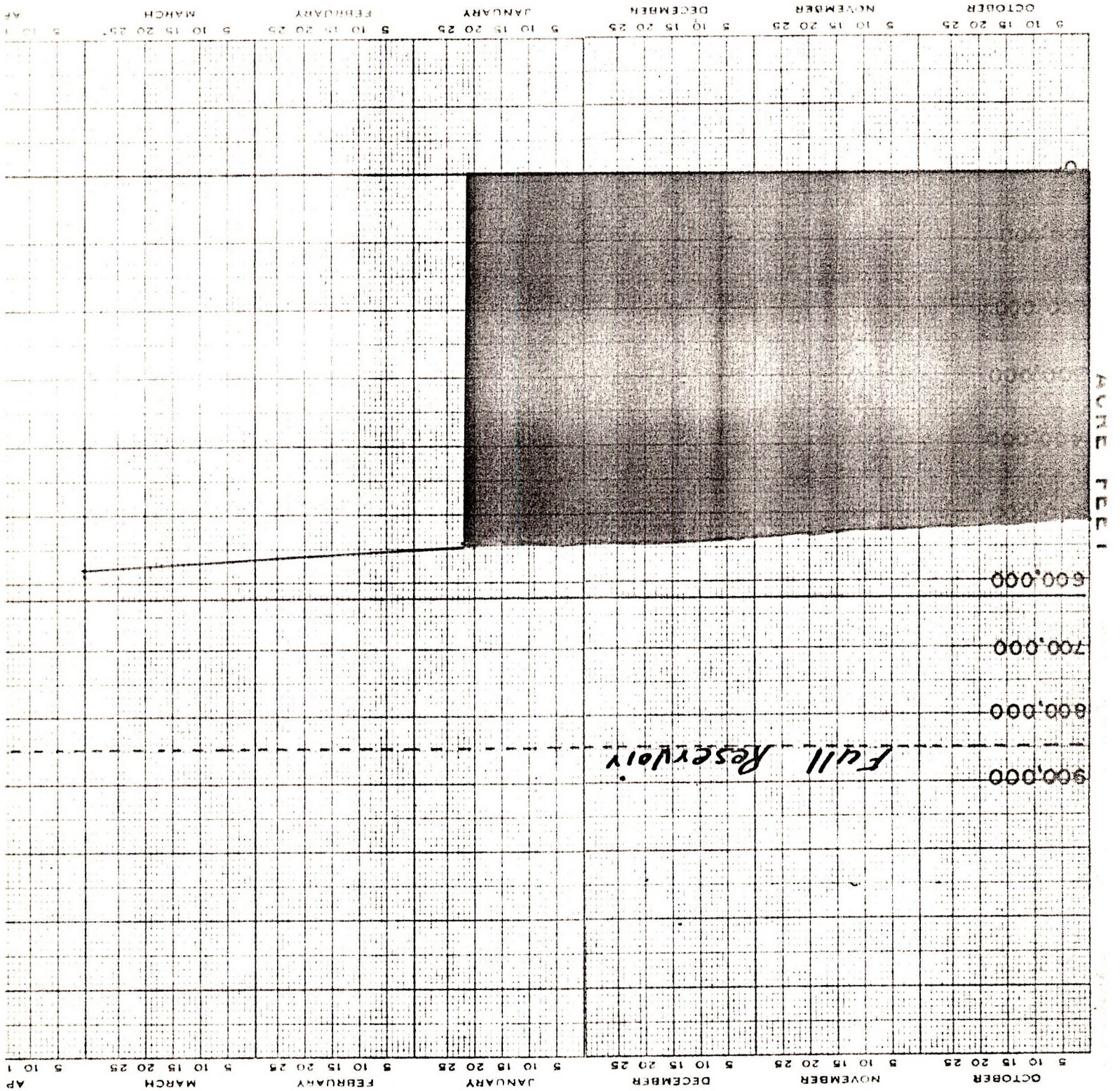

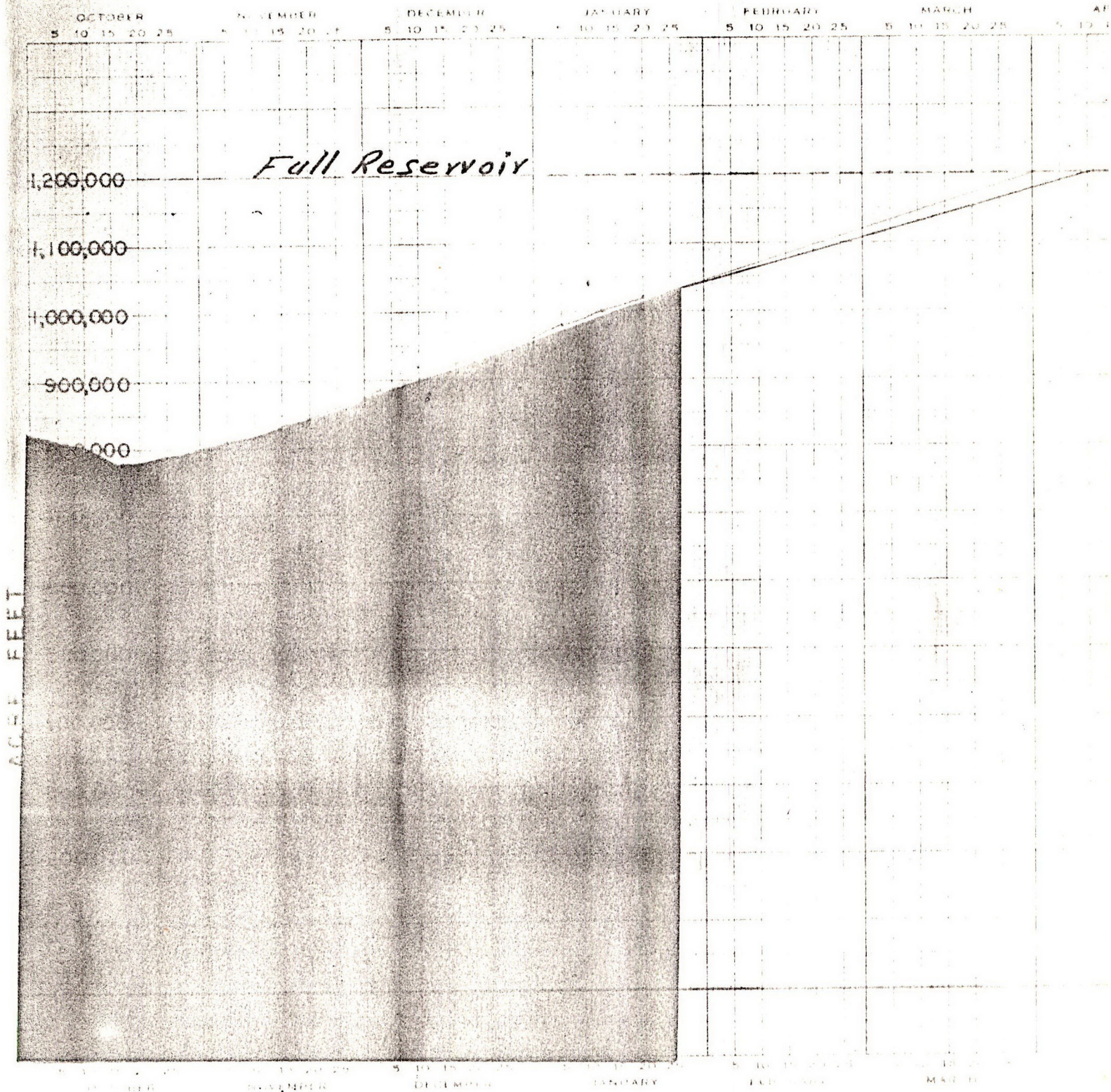

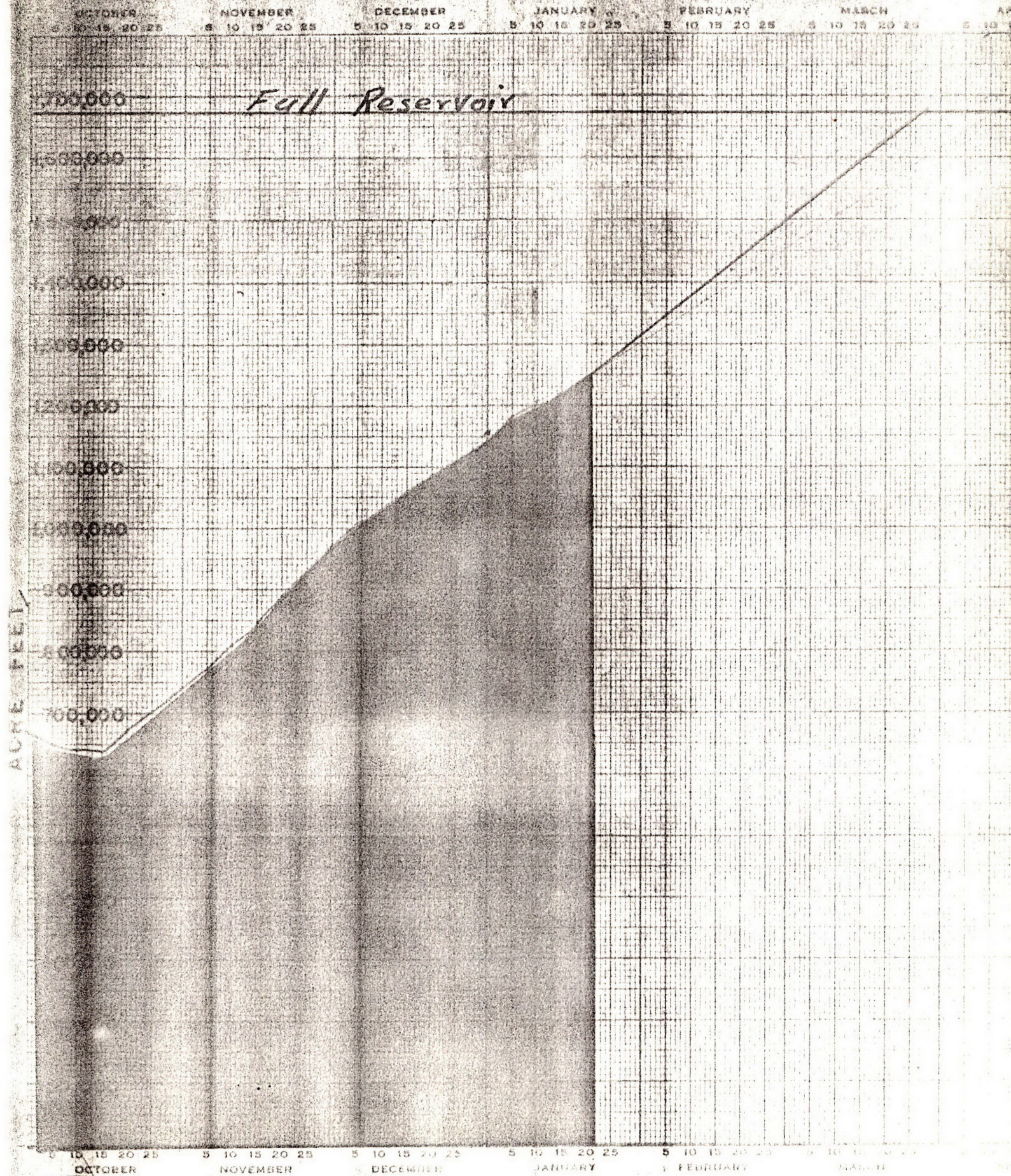
Jackson Lake Reservoir





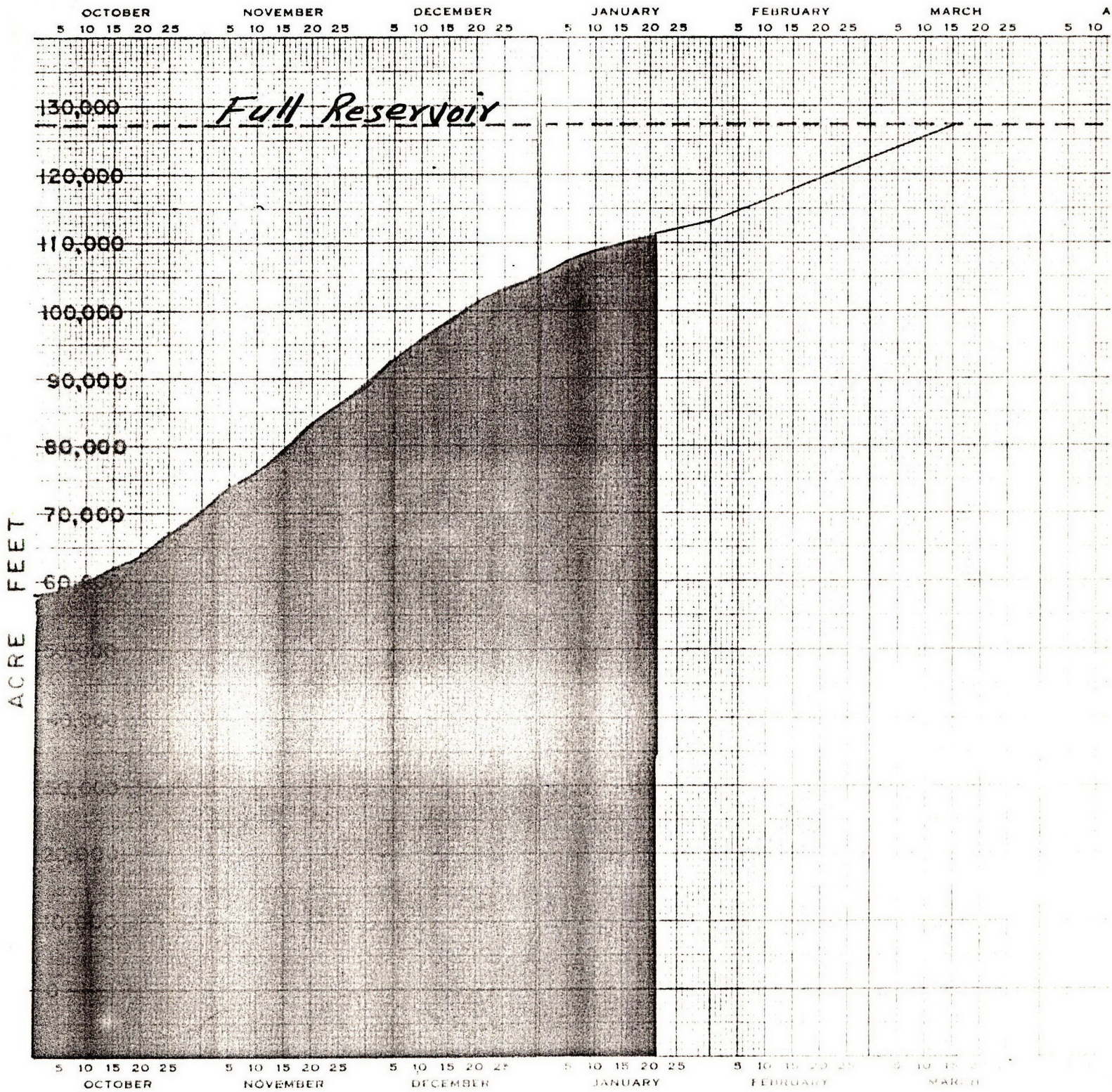
Palisades Reservoir

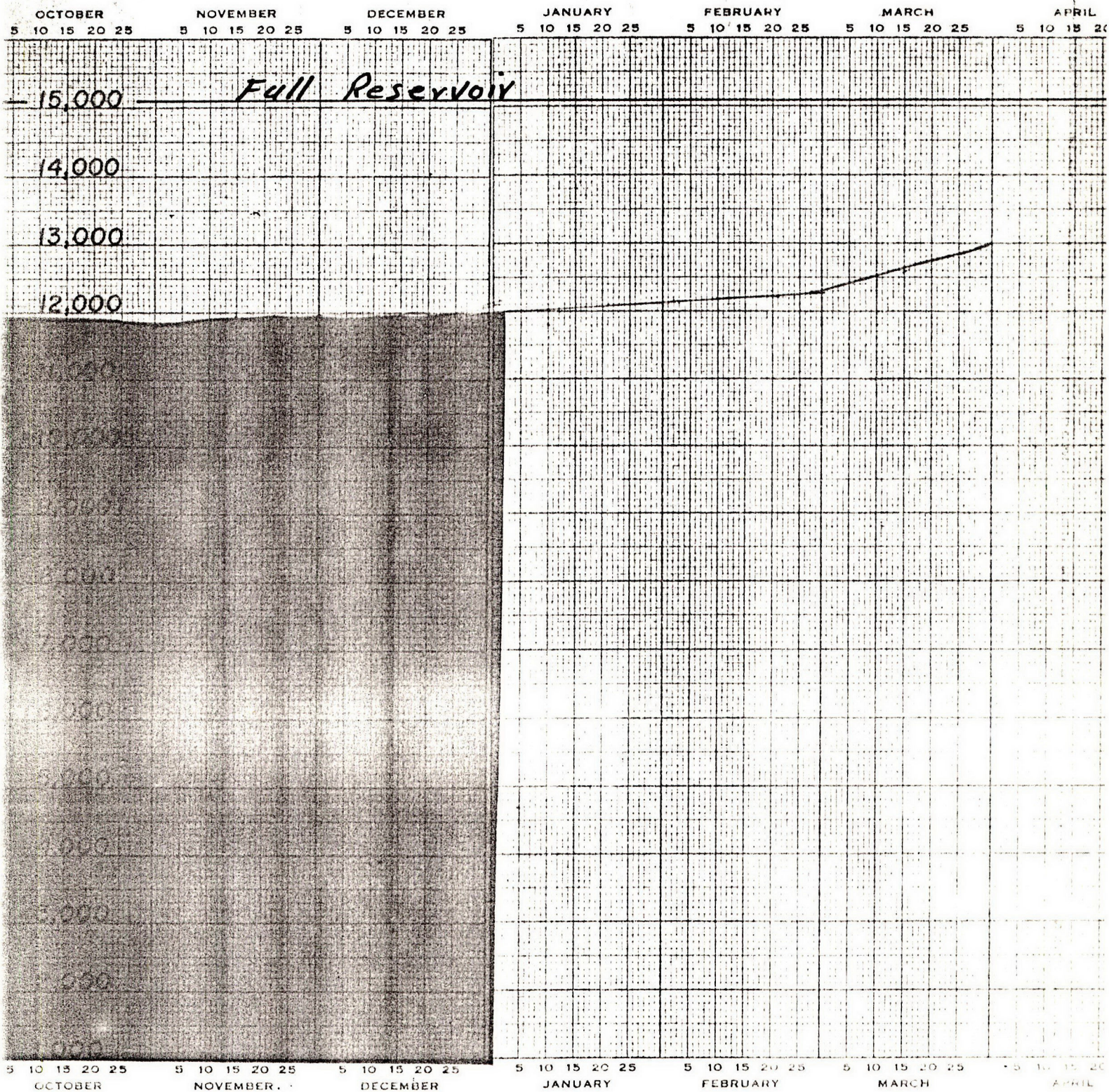

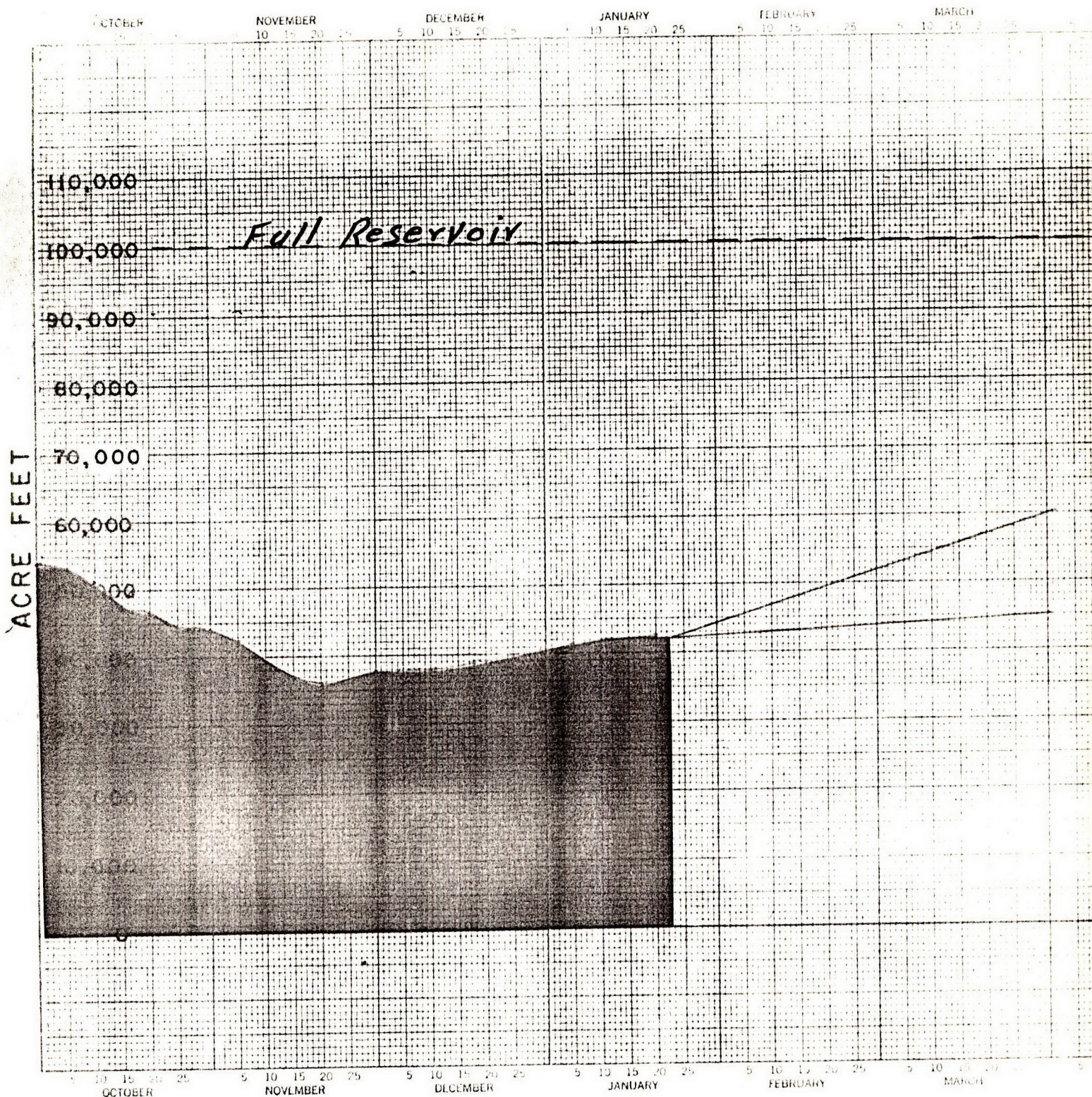

The Committee of Nine has adopted a tentative budget for Water District No. 1 for the coming year. Every effort was made to cut costs and keep distribution costs as low as possible but an increase of about 16% was unavoidable. Unfortunately, the final increase may be much larger.

During the past three years, the Idaho Department of Water Resources has been able to provide considerable assistance in the operation of Water District No. 1. If the legislature makes the cuts in the Department's budget that are presently being proposed, the continuation of some of the state services will necessarily be curtailed and the water users will have to bear the increased financial burden. We are presently estimating that unless we can convince the legislature to provide adequate funding to the Idaho Department of Water Resources, the cost of water delivery within Water District No. 1 will increase by about 52% over last year. I am advising all canal companies and irrigation districts to make provisions in their budgets for this increased water distribution cost.

The Committee of Nine believes that an even more important consideration is the potential impact substantial cuts in the Department of Water Resources budget will have on the state's ability to protect its water resources against out-of-state demands, and assure continued orderly development of the state's water resources within Idaho.

If you share our concern, your local legislature^{or} should know how you feel.

Meeting called to order at 7:10 p.m. by Chairman Lester Saunders.

Ron Carlson reviewed the budget for 1980.

Richard Hale reported on the audit he is conducting for Water District No. 1. Mr. Hale indicated the audit could not be officially completed until after the annual meeting. However, he did indicate that the water district records and internal control appeared to be excellent.

Ron discussed the proposed budget for the 1981 year. There was discussion on the budget, and a letter of protest on the increase in the budget was read by Wilburn Marlow, Secretary of Blackfoot Irrigation Company. They felt that in view of the national and state efforts to cut budgets the water district could do the same. Ron explained that the reason a large increase would be necessary would be because of proposed funding cuts for the Idaho Department of Water Resources and the projected loss in state support that would result. Ron said that if state support is maintained at about the same level, the proposed budget, which the budget committee adopted, would be the basis for the 1981 billings. This, for most companies, would be about the same as they paid in 1979.

The budget was adopted by the Committee as proposed.

Lyle Swank, Assistant Watermaster, read the resolutions. All resolutions were accepted with the exception of No. 14 which was amended, and No. 24 which was held for discussion.

The meeting adjourned at 9:00 p.m.

WATER DISTRICT NO. 1 ANNUAL MEETING

Westbank Restaurant, Idaho Falls, Idaho
March 2, 1981

The annual meeting convened at 9:00 a.m. with Chairman Lester Saunders presiding.

Bill Lloyd, Water and Power Resources Service, reported that the 160-acre regulations were being suspended until a study is made. Mr. Lloyd indicated work on Jackson Lake Dam should be started probably by 1983. The safety of Island Park Dam is being assessed in view of present proposals for hydro development there. He further indicated that the rods in the outlet of Palisades Dam have been successfully repaired. The cost of these repairs was so low that no special assessment will be made to spaceholders. The Teton Dam will receive study this summer. Mr. Lloyd said the Salmon Falls project has been stalled at this time and the WPRS is looking at different possible sources of water.

Steve Allred, Director Idaho Department of Water Resources, advised the group we have one of the best regulated systems in the country and should be proud of it. He cautioned the water users that pressure from non-agricultural and out-of-state interests makes it essential for water users to be involved and build the necessary coalitions to stave off those who covet Idaho's water supplies.

Sherl Chapman announced that the Water Users Association has an attractive group liability insurance program for canal companies. Sherl discussed pertinent legislation now before the legislature.

Ted Diehl presented the Education Committee Report.

The annual meeting was called to order at 10:00 by Lester Saunders. The roll call of canals was taken at the door. Ron Carlson took charge for temporary organization. Lester Saunders was appointed temporary chairman and Reed Murdock was appointed temporary secretary.

The minutes from the 1980 annual meeting were read and approved.

The committees were excused for caucus for selection of committees.

The 1981 Report of the Committee on Organization and Order of Business was given by Leo Hobdey as follows:

"We recommend that the temporary organization be made permanent and the following be adopted as the Order of Business of this meeting:

1. Roll call of canals be taken at door.
2. Appointment of a temporary organization.
3. Reading of minutes of previous minutes (omitting the resolutions.)

4. Recess for caucus and selection of committees.
5. Report of committees.
6. That the temporary organization be made permanent.
7. Election of Committee of Nine.
8. Financial Report of the District.
9. Resolutions.
10. Election of Watermaster.
11. Unfinished business.
12. New business.
13. Committee of Nine shall serve as a permanent resolution committee and anyone desiring to present a resolution is requested to present it to the Committee of Nine on or before their last meeting prior to Water District No. 1 general meeting.

The motion was made to adopt the Organization and Order of Business, passed.

The 1981 Report of Committee on Credentials was given by Bob Burks:

"We, your Committee on Credentials, recommend the following for your consideration:

1. That the rights represented be determined by roll call in advance of voting. In addition, the officer authorized to vote on behalf of each organization, canal company, or irrigation district also be identified prior to voting.
2. That the companies or other organizations owning decreed or licensed consumptive rights shall be entitled to vote through their duly elected representative or by written proxy. Each stockholder or any company not represented by a duly elected officer or by written proxy shall be entitled to vote the stock held by them.
3. That non-consumptive rights not be recognized in voting.
4. That no person be elected to membership and service on the Committee of Nine, Committee on Organization and Order of Business, or Credentials Committee unless he be a landowner and water user in the canal company or district which he represents during the term of his office.

The motion was made to adopt and passed.

The Committee reports were read by Ron Carlson. The motion was made to elect the members of the Committee of Nine recommended by the committees. The motion was seconded and passed by acclamation.

Les Saunders gave the report for the Committee of Nine. Thanked the committee members for their help.

Leo Busch gave the report on the water outlook for 1981. His report indicated runoff would be about 65% of normal but water supply should be adequate with conservation and proper management.

The meeting was recessed until 1:00 p.m.


Lyle Swank gave a report on the hydrographs of natural flow and diversions for the 1980 irrigation year and presented a graph showing the relative magnitude of the different water right priorities within Water District No. 1.

John Rosholt talked on the responsibilities of the watermaster.

RESOLUTIONS

Water District No. 1
March 2, 1981

1. That the watermaster continue to apply the best available methods and technology to better assure: more accurate deliveries of natural flow and stored water, improved regulation procedures, the availability of water supply and diversion records to the water users, and that all water users are charged for water deliveries on an accurate and equitable basis.

Be it further resolved that the watermaster proceed toward automated data collection where it can effectively reduce personnel costs, travel costs, or result in cost-savings to the water users through better and more current data.

2. That the water users of Water District No. 1 continue the cooperative program with the Idaho Department of Water Resources as outlined in the Memorandum of Understanding previously signed by the Chairman of the Committee of Nine and the Director of the Department of Water Resources.
3. We recommend that Ronald D. Carlson be re-elected watermaster for the ensuing year, including a staff of a deputy, assistant, and a clerk, with an aggregate salary of \$64,000.00. This amount represents the entire salary of the clerk, assistant, and deputy, and 67% of the salary of the watermaster. Thirty-three percent of the watermaster's salary and benefits shall be paid from non-water district funding provided by the Idaho Department of Water Resources.
4. That the duties of a watermaster shall begin on this date and continue for a period of one full year.
5. Proposed Budget for Water District No. 1 for the year beginning April 1, 1981.

6. WHEREAS, it is the watermaster's responsibility to assure the proper delivery of both natural flow and storage supplies to all water users, and

WHEREAS the normal cost of delivering water to many diversions is less than their normal assessments when based upon their total seasonal use of water:

Now, THEREFORE, be it resolved that the watermaster of Water District No. 1 is hereby authorized to assess a \$15.00 minimum charge for every diversion within his jurisdiction.

7. Resolved that the watermaster shall prepare a report in accordance with Idaho Code, Section 42-614, which shall become the official billing to the individual water users, canal companies, and irrigation districts, and is hereby authorized to collect all of the expenses of delivering the waters of the district, including his salary and that of his assistants, and shall make all disbursements necessary to the conduct of the business of administering and delivering the waters of the district.

Resolved that no ditch, canal company, or other water users shall have the right to demand and receive water, and the watermaster shall not deliver to such person until receipt of the amount due and payable from such user.

Resolved that copies of the minutes of the annual meeting, the budget as approved, all resolutions approved, and the report prepared in accordance with Section 42-614, shall be filed with the county clerks of Bonneville, Madison, Teton and Fremont Counties.

8. WHEREAS, the Committee of Nine has been appointed by the Idaho Water Resource Board pursuant to Sec. 42-1765, Idaho Code, and

WHEREAS, the watermaster of Water District No. 1 has traditionally acted on behalf of the Committee of Nine in leasing stored water within Water District No. 1, and

WHEREAS, it is necessary to an orderly rental program that the watermaster continue to have the authority to act on behalf of the Committee of Nine,

THEREFORE, be it resolved that for the purpose of renting water the watermaster be considered a member of the Committee of Nine.

9. With the exception noted in Resolution No. 8, we recommend that the Committee of Nine be continued with nine regular members. The members representing the Burley and Minidoka Irrigation Projects are to alternated between the two districts as

they may arrange. In addition, advisory members representing the Water and Power Resource Service, Teton Basin, Gooding Canal, A & B Irrigation, and a member from the Burley or Minidoka District, whichever is not currently represented on the regular committee, be included. Any canal company or district desiring to have representatives attend meetings of the Committee of Nine should notify the watermaster, who will then advise them of dates and time of committee meetings so that they may have an opportunity to attend such meetings.

10. WHEREAS, it is in the best interest of the water users of Water District No. 1 to account for all diversions which might adversely affect any prior natural flow or storage diversions be it resolved that the watermaster shall collect records of water diversions during the entire year.

11. WHEREAS the rental of stored water is the responsibility of the Committee of Nine, and

WHEREAS, certain rules and regulations for the administration of rental water is essential to an orderly rental process, now

THEREFORE, be it resolved that the following rules and regulations for administering storage rentals be adopted.

Rule 1. A rental committee composed of three members of the Committee of Nine and the watermaster shall be appointed by the chairman for the following purposes:

1. To determine general policies regarding rental water not covered by the adopted rules and regulations.
2. To assist the watermaster in the allocation of rental water.
3. To consult with the watermaster on ways to most fully utilize available storage water.
4. To advise the Committee of Nine on rental activities.

Rule 2. The operation of the "Water Bank" shall be consistent with the statutes creating the Water Supply Bank and the Rules and Regulations of the Water Resource Board.

Rule 3. Water accepted into the water bank is on a contingency basis with payments to be made to the lessor only if the water is subsequently leased from the water bank.

Holder of space in Palisades Reservoir or in any other reservoir may notify the Upper Snake River Watermaster by July 1 of each year of water they designate as available for rental from the Water Rental Pool for that year's irrigation season. All such holders will share proportionately in the proceeds from the rental of all or any part of the water offered by July 1 for use in that year.

Holder of space in Palisades Reservoir or other reservoirs who notify the Upper Snake River Watermaster after July 1 of any year of water they desire to designate as available for rental from the Water Rental Pool for that year's irrigation season shall share proportionately in the proceeds from the rental of all or any part of the water rented which was designated for rental after July 1 of that year.

All of the water designated for rental before July 1 of any year will be rented before any of the water designated for rental on or after July 1 will be rented.

The lessor shall be entitled to receive payment for the percentage of his water rented from the water supply bank according to the following formula:

$$\text{Lessor's payment} = \frac{\text{Res. O \& M \& const.} \times \text{No. AF leased}}{850,000} + \text{Avg Canal O \& M}$$

Rule 4. Any water available through the water bank shall be provided on a priority according to the following priorities:

a. First priority in the rental of available water shall be given to those water users owning rights in the various storage reservoirs of the Water and Power Resources service in the Snake River Basin above Milner Dam.

b. Second priority in the rental of available water shall be given to other irrigation water users in the areas of beneficial use described in the licenses issued by the State of Idaho for use of the waters from the storage reservoirs described in (a) above.

c. Priority among water users of each priority listed in (a) and (b) above and who execute leases to rent water during an irrigation season shall be determined by the date on which that water user's executed lease is received at the office of the Upper Snake River Watermaster at Idaho Falls, Idaho; the earlier in the year the executed lease is received by the watermaster, the higher priority in that priority group the entity will receive.

d. Any water user having once initiated a lease agreement may request water in subsequent years by confirming,

in writing, that all of the information on the original lease is true and correct and identifying the amount of water he wishes to lease.

e. Administrative charges adequate to defray the costs of the Committee of Nine and Water District No. 1 may be added to the lease price.

f. Any water not leased by August 15 may be provided to the highest bidder for such uses as may be determined beneficial by the Committee of Nine. Any lease of water which shall result in a price in excess of that calculated using the formula in Rule 3, plus administrative charges, shall be used for the general benefit of the water users in Water District No. 1.

12. WHEREAS, it is in the interest of all the water users to have the water rights within Water District No. 1 delivered according to the priority system, and

WHEREAS, the accounting system now used by Water District No. 1 requires that each diversion have assigned to it a specific list of decreed, licensed, and storage entitlement, and

WHEREAS, those diversions which have no record of water rights on file with the Department of Water Resources or the Water District Office will necessarily be taking storage water any time a diversion takes place.

Now, THEREFORE, be it resolved that no diversion shall be allowed to divert water unless the proper list of rights for that diversion are found in the watermaster's records or proper arrangements have been made to procure storage water from the rental pool prior to the start of the irrigation season.

13. WHEREAS, there have, in the past been many actions to quiet title which involve the waters of the Snake River that have entered in the adjudication of water rights without effective notice being given to either the Director of the Department of Water Resources or the Watermaster; and,

WHEREAS, the Snake River and tributaries are fully appropriated during the irrigation season, and

WHEREAS, water rights adjudicated by the court without complete information available will necessarily result in the injury of other established water rights.

Now, THEREFORE, be it resolved that the Idaho Legislature be encouraged to support such changes in the statutes as will make it a mandatory requirement that the watermaster

of the appropriate water district and the Director of the Department of Water Resources be notified and made party to any action which will result in the adjudication of water rights.

- AMENDED 14. WHEREAS, water district records indicate that the cost of distributing water is substantially greater during periods of drought, and

WHEREAS, the magnitude of these additional costs can not be known at the time the budget is adopted at the annual meeting in March, and

WHEREAS, the water district presently has nearly \$30,000.00 in certificates of deposit which were carried over by resolution of the water users from 1979,

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED that the watermaster be authorized to create and manage a drought contingency fund of \$60,000.00 and maintain these funds as a drought reserve.

RESOLUTION NO. 15

WHEREAS, it has been almost five years since the collapse of the teton Dam, and

WHEREAS, during that period of time the United States Government has made extensive investigations and studies to pinpoint the cause of its failure, and

WHEREAS, we have been informed by representatives of the United States Government that a safe dam can be built by the United States Government at the present dam site, and

WHEREAS, the need for the multi-purpose dam and the benefits to be derived therefrom was decided by the Congress of the United States when it authorized the Teton Project without one dissenting vote, and

WHEREAS, although costs of construction have increased since the failure of the dam, the citizens of the Upper Snake River Valley and the nation should not be penalized by reason of the failure of the dam, (over which they had no control) and deprived of the benefits which would accrue to them from the reconstruction of the Teton Dam of the Lower Teton Basin Federal Reclamation Project, and

WHEREAS, the Water and Power Resources Service has the competency and integrity to design, construct and operate a safe dam at the present dam site, and in addition to the new construction required, at a savings of millions of dollars by utilizing the acquired land and easements and the remaining usable constructed facilities, and

WHEREAS, the need for the Teton Dam and Project has not diminished but has increased by reason of growing demands for upstream storage, power and recreation, and

WHEREAS, the citizens of the Upper Snake River Valley, ever since the failure of the Teton Dam, have expressed their desire that the dam be reconstructed and have urged its reconstruction by resolutions unanimously adopted every year at local, district and state water meetings, copies of which have been sent to the Idaho Congressional Delegation, the Secretary of Interior and the U.S. Water and Power Resources.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED by this Assembly representing the water users of the Upper Snake River area of Idaho, that the U. S. Government immediately commence reconstruction of the Teton Dam of the Lower Teton Basin Federal Reclamation Project.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that copies of this Resolution be sent to Water District No. 1, of the Department of Water Resources, requesting that this Resolution be adopted at the meeting of the Water Users March 2, 1981, in Idaho Falls, Idaho; that a copy also be sent to each member of Idaho's Congressional Delegation; to the Honorable James G. Watt, Secretary of Interior; and to the U. S. Commissioner, Water and Power Resources Service.



The Rental Committee of Water District No. 1 met at the Twin Falls Canal Company, Twin Falls, Idaho, on June 23, 1981. Present were: Reed Oldham, Chairman of the Committee of Nine; Ken Anderson, Chairman of the Rental Committee; Bill Watt, Rental Committee Member; Don Tracy, Burley, Rental Committee Member; Ben Brooks, Field Solicitor; Neil Stessman, Boise, Bureau of Reclamation; Keith Ebersole, Burley, Bureau of Reclamation; Ken Dunn, Director, Department of Water Resources; Ron Carlson, Watermaster; and John Rosholt, Attorney.

The meeting was called to discuss the application by Canyon View to lease water to Idaho Power Company under the new State statute. The Committee's chief concern was that the approval of the rental of water stored in federal reservoirs is within the jurisdiction of the Palisades contracts and can only be made upon approval of the Advisory Committee and the Secretary. For the purposes of the contracts, the Committee of Nine serves as the Advisory Committee.

After substantial discussion, Tom Schafer, Canyon View's representative, appeared at the meeting and agreed to withdraw the application to the Department of Water Resources insofar as the storage water was concerned upon a determination by the Committee that proper application would be made to the Lease Committee to lease Canyon View's storage water. Mr. Schafer then prepared a proper application and the Committee agreed to give it a priority date of July 1, 1981, and thereafter indicated they would recommend approval of the lease to Idaho Power Company of Canyon View's water. Canyon View consented to a rental in accordance with the Rental Pool regulations. The Committee also indicated they would poll the remaining members of the Committee of Nine to determine whether or not the Committee agreed to lease up to 100,000 acre feet of water to the Idaho Power Company during the remaining months of the irrigation season of 1981. The same was approved by the Committee members, the Watermaster was given the go-ahead, if the members did not approve, Chairman Oldham agreed to call a meeting to discuss the matter.

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The Committee discussed the possibility of amending certain rules for the coming season for rental water. Some of the ideas discussed were as follows:

1. To consider amending the date to allow water to be sold for power purposes earlier in the year.

2. That if a lessor leases for power purposes or for other uses than irrigation, it be acknowledged that his re-fill right will be junior to the remaining space in that particular reservoir.

3. That all leases be for the same price, regardless of the use.

4. That all persons who make their lease water available continue to share on a pro rata basis in the revenues received from the leases and that they also continue to share in the exposures. For example, of 200,000 acre feet were available for lease from five companies, and half went to irrigation and half went to power, the five companies would share pro rata in the revenue after the district's administrative charges were paid and the five companies would share pro rata in the exposure of re-fill for the 100,000 that was used for power purposes.

5. The Committee considered the possibility of seeking a Solicitor's Opinion and/or re-designing the rate structure to reflect more of the use value rather than the cost in setting rates.

6. That the Committee consider amendments to the water bank so that all applications to lease natural flow also are handled through the water bank for the protection of the other users, it being understood that the Committee has no jurisdiction over leases of natural flow at this time.

Substantial discussion was held concerning variable rates depending on the nature of the use. It was determined that this would be probably contrary to the spirit of the existing Palisades Contracts and would require a contract amendment approved by the Secretary of Interior. It appeared to be the consensus that the variable rates not be supported.
