

Water District 100
Annual Meeting Minutes (Draft)
January 27, 2026

Fremont-Madison Irrigation District, St. Anthony ID

At 1:00 pm the Water District 100 ("WD100") annual meeting was called to order. Mike Rasmussen nominated Aaron Dalling as chairman and Christina Henman as meeting secretary: Motion passed.

Copies of the minutes for the 2025 annual meeting were provided, and time was allowed to review them. Jaron Raybould moved to accept last year's minutes; seconded by Mike Rasmussen: Motion passed.

Tanner Wood presented the financial report. Tanner noted the Balance Sheet Prev Year Comparison page showed less retained earnings, which lowered the net income by \$2,849.14. The Profit and Loss Budget vs. Actual sheet reflected an IDWR contract of \$19,453.34; however, Tanner mentioned that this number did not reflect the final two months that had not yet been billed by IDWR. Randy Hillman moved to approve the financial statement; seconded by Kieth Davidson: Motion passed.

Blake Jordan took some time to introduce IDWR staff that was present and explain their roles in working with the water district. IDWR staff present were Blake Jordan, Ryan Tracy, Tanner Wood, Christian Stewart, and Christina Henman.

Blake Jordan presented the proposed budget. There was a lot of curtailment work needed this year, but the majority of WD100 water users have joined groundwater districts with mitigation plans in place. There were only a handful of water users who needed to be worked with over the year to bring them into compliance with curtailment orders. Blake proposed that the district collect the same amount as the previous year, with an increase of .01¢ to the acre-foot assessment due to the number of diversions. The total expense budget requested is \$35,000.00, which would reflect an anticipated net income deficit of \$4,091. The district currently has approximately two years of operating expenses in the bank. Blake opened the floor for questions; none asked.

A copy of current resolutions with proposed changes was provided. The Watermaster (Blake Jordan) and Treasurer (Jeff Raybould) appointments are reflected in the resolutions. Blake Jordan reviewed the proposed changes, which included updated dates to reflect the year 2026 and the change in assessment amounts as reflected in the proposed budget. Assessment amounts were increased by .01¢. Blake opened the floor for questions; none asked.

Keith Davidson moved to accept the budget and resolutions; seconded by Mike Huskinson: Motion passed.

Tanner Wood presented the water master report. The report covered a review of the 2024 irrigation season, annual volume report, updates from IDWR, enforcement efforts within the district, and a water outlook for the 2025 water year.

Blake Jordan explained that the majority of unreadable meters were due to blank displays, which could be caused by a variety of issues. Water users who have had repeated instances of unreadable meters


will begin to receive notices of violation. Blake reminded water users that having a working flow meter is a statutory requirement; and that the responsibility of ensuring that they are working falls to the water right owner. Blake urged water users to ensure that their meters are in working order and have power turned on to them through the end of the irrigation season, which ends 10/31. Question 1: How will this year's WMIS data be collected for blank meters? Blake answered that there were multiple options, such as using power records to calculate an estimate, waiting until spring to see if readings can be obtained when powered back on, or rely on ground water district data. If none of those options work, then using the water right volume may be necessary. Question 2: Does the state send notices regarding bad meters, and will they send them again? Blake answered that IDWR used to send notices when meters don't work as a courtesy, but due to heavy demand and the amount of labor required, it was not sustainable and the practice was stopped. Blake also clarified that the ground water district agreement requires monthly reporting, so water users should be ensuring that their meters are working anyway.

Blake Jordan provided an update on curtailment and enforcement work in the area. Throughout the year, various curtailment orders were issued. Only a handful of water users within WD100 were found to be in violation, and most were able to work with IDWR to reach a full resolution. Two notices of violation were issued to water users who did not curtail. Unfortunately, due to current weather conditions, it is likely that there will be upcoming spring curtailments. Question 1: How does the curtailment process work? Blake answered that IDWR follows a methodology order to identify whether the Director of IDWR needs to issue a curtailment order. Once identified, IDWR and watermasters contact affected water users to notify them of the curtailment order and work with as needed. Second warnings are provided before notices of violation are issued to water users who do not cooperate. After a notice of violation is issued a consent order is created detailing any fines or further actions required. Question 2: If a curtailment letter is received, what should a water user do? Blake answered that the water user needs to either turn off their water or join a ground water district. They can also contact IDWR for guidance as needed. Aaron Dalling explained that their ground water district has a 4-year block of water, and that they attempt to work together to help cover the needs of water users within the district. Mike Rasmussen agreed with Aaron and stressed the importance of being mindful about conservation. Question 3: Are there any grants or financial aid available to aid efficiency efforts? Aaron answered that the Idaho Water Resource Board does have some grants and cost-sharing options available for larger scale efforts to convert from ground to surface water use, but that he isn't sure about options on the individual level.

The Advisory Committee currently includes Aaron Dalling, Jeff Raybould, Keith Davidson, Nick Ricks, Randal Hillman, Mike Huskinson, Cade Crapo, Jason Webster, and Bevan Jeppesen. The floor was opened for nominations or changes. None were made. Aaron asked if those present were still willing to serve. None in attendance objected. Larid Robinson moved to accept the advisory committee; seconded by Randy Hillman: motion passed.

Aaron Dalling opened the floor for new business. No new business was brought up.

Aaron Dalling moved to adjourn the meeting. None objected: the meeting was adjourned at 1:53 pm.
