Hearing conducted on January 29, 2007, Blackfoot Idaho Before Presiding Officer, Tim Luke Idaho Department of Water Resources

PRESIDING OFFICER TIM LUKE: Good afternoon, I am Tim Luke, Water 1 2 Distribution Section Manager of the Idaho Department of Water Resources. I'm 3 serving as the hearing officer in this matter today. This matter concerns the 4 proposed revisions of WD120, specifically the department proposed expansion of 5 WD120 to include ground water rights with in the departments administrative 6 basin 27, overlying the Eastern Snake Plain Aquifer 7 The provisions of Idaho Code § 42-604 require this hearing to be held prior to the 8 9 revision of a water district by the Director of the Department of Water Resources. 10 11 The hearing is being conducted on January 29, 2007, commencing at 12 approximately 3:35 P.M., at the Blackfoot City Council Chambers, located at 157 13 N Broadway, in Blackfoot Idaho. 14 15 The purpose of this hearing is to provide affected water right holders or their representatives, an opportunity to make oral statements, on the record stating their 16 position, views, or concerns on the proposed revision of WD120. 17 18 19 For the purposes of this hearing, persons making statements do not need to be 20 sworn, nor will they be subject to cross-examination. All persons signing up to 21 speak will be heard before others are heard, all persons wishing to speak will be 22 heard once before anyone speaks a second time 23 24 Notice of this hearing was mailed to each affected water user in the proposed 25 district as required under the provisions of section § 42-604 Idaho Code. In 26 addition, notice was published in the Morning News, which is a local Blackfoot 27 newspaper of general circulation in the area of the proposed district. 28 29 If there are no further questions, we are now at the point where we may begin 30 taking statements and comments from those persons who desire to be heard in this 31 proceeding. For the record, we started this meeting at 2:00 P.M. and presented 32 some background information and took a series of questions and discussion for 33 about 90 minutes 34 35 At this point I would go through the roster and checking those that have indicated a willingness to testify and ask if Mr Lavelle Strickland would like to testify. 36 37 38 **UNIDENTIFIED PERSON**: Inaudible (Something like) No, just a couple of questions 39 after this 40 41 PRESIDING OFFICER TIM LUKE: OK....Uh....Clarice Villa. If you could please 42 come to the front and make a statement for the record. Before proceeding with 43 your statement could you please state your name and address and also please 44 indicate if you are speaking for yourself only or representing others.

CLARICE VILLA: Good afternoon.

45 46 **PRESIDING OFFICER TIM LUKE**: Just sit over there so the audience can hear you as well. Thank You.

CLARICE VILLA: Good afternoon. My name is Clarice Villa. I am with the Tribal Water Commission and I'm testifying on behalf of the Shoshone-Bannock Tribes and here is a copy of the testimony and this is the testimony of the Shoshone Bannock Tribes before the Department of Water Resources of the State of Idaho in the matter of revising the boundaries of water district 120, American Falls Area, within the Eastern Snake Plain Aquifer, in Administrative Basin 27.

 The Shoshone-Bannock Tribes and the State of Idaho and the United States entered into an agreement in 1990, entitled the "1990 Fort Hall Indian Water Rights Agreement" to quantify the rights of the Shoshone-Bannock Tribes in the upper Snake River Basin. The Agreement was congressionally mandated agreement and was subsequently entered into a Decree by the Snake River Basin Adjudication District Court in 1994. The Agreement and subsequent Decree recognizes and respects the sovereignty of each of the entities that are party of the Agreement.

In the Agreement the parties agreed to cooperate in the administration of water resources. The parties agreed to administer water rights within the Reservation as follows: the Tribes administers the distribution of all Tribal water rights within the Reservation; and United States administers the distribution of the Fort Hall Irrigation Project water rights and the Fort Hall Agency water rights; and the State administers the distribution of those water rights acquired under state law within the Reservation that are not part of the Fort Hall Agency Tribal or Fort Hall Irrigation Project water rights.

It is critical that the proposed boundary revision of Water District No. 120 does not interfere with the Tribes ability to develop and manage future points of groundwater diversions for utilization on any Indian lands pursuant to the Agreement.

Furthermore, the Agreement provides that the Tribes, State and United States will work cooperatively, pursuant to provisions of the Agreement, to coordinate and monitor water use to the same extent as required of other users in Idaho. The Tribes are willing to work cooperatively with the other parties provided that any monitoring equally benefits and protects each party's interests.

 The Tribes believes that the inclusion of portions of Basin 29 overlying the Eastern Snake River Plain Aquifer must not interfere with the provisions, nature, scope, or spirit of the "1990 Fort Hall Indian Water Rights Agreement" and rights decreed and protected under the Agreement. The Shoshone-Bannock Tribes maintain jurisdiction to implement and administer the water rights on the Reservation that would be potentially impacted by this change pursuant to the "1990 Fort Hall Indian Water Rights Agreement."

The Shoshone-Bannock Tribes reminds the State of Idaho and water users that the 93 94 Shoshone-Bannock Tribes have a "unique status" with the United States Government 95 consistent with the Fort Bridger Treaty of 1868, a congressionally ratified treaty 96 which guarantees a trust responsibility to Tribes with the Federal government. The 97 Tribes further assert that civil regulatory authority is vested with the Shoshone-98 Bannock Tribes within the exterior boundaries of the Fort Hall Reservation; all 99 monitoring activities will be in cooperation with the Tribes and the State relating to non-Indian lands 100 101 102 We, therefore, demand that the State implement enforcement measures, on both non-Indian surface water and non-Indian groundwater use, within said district to ensure 103 104 that Tribal groundwater rights are preserved. 105 Dated this 29th day of January, 2007 106 107 Respectfully Submitted, 108 Clarice Villa Shoshone-Bannock Tribes Water Resources Commission 109 110 PRESIDING OFFICER TIM LUKE: Ms. Villa, before you leave, I wanted to ask one 111 question.
